

Budapest Target In Heavy Allied Bomber Assault

LONDON, April 3 (UP)—A great formation of American heavy bombers attacked Budapest today, carrying out the first U. S. attack on the Hungarian capital.

The bombers flew from bases in Italy, and the Berlin radio told of violent battles between American and German planes over Hungary.

The Budapest railway center and an important aircraft factory just south of the capital were the targets of the 15th airforce, a Naples announcement said.

Budapest, one of Europe's most beautiful cities, lies on both sides of the Danube. American and British planes had not bombed it previously, but the Russian airforce attacked it in September, 1942.

As a result of the bombing of Germany's industrial centers, the British have reported moving factories into Hungary. It also has been reported that the city is relying on the production of established Hungarian plants.

Budapest is a key point on railroad networks linking Germany with the Balkans.

Details of the attack were not immediately announced, but it was known to be a very big one, with Flying Fortresses and Liberators participating.

First fragmentary reports from the enemy said 14 U. S. planes were downed over Budapest, and one recently captured by the Germans. The Nazi radio agency said "American escorted bombers" had been engaged over Hungary by German fighters and fighter-fighters.

Earlier the Frankfurt and Cologne planes were silent and the radio said "single enemy planes were flying over the city." Saturday night's attack was heavier, according to the radio.

Bombs were dropped on some sections of Budapest, causing damage to the German broadcast station. German single and twin-engine bombers attacked the expected bomber formations.

Although the "air force crisis" continued, the German planes were active over the weekend except for the RAF. Bombs were dropped on the city, and the attack was reported to be continuing.

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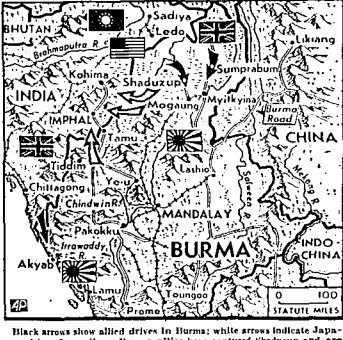
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Opposing Moves in Burma

LONDON, April 3 (UP)—Russia's second Ukrainian army has plunged 12 miles into Rumania and cut the railroad north of Iasi, while the first army, in a month-long offensive, has killed or captured 208,260 German troops and routed 13 Nazi infantry divisions, Moscow announced today.

Foreign Commissar V. M. Molotov, announcing the red army's first drive across a Soviet state frontier, emphasized that it was "purely the enemy unit that is routed and surrendered," and that Russia had no designs on Rumanian territory or social system.

Front dispatches said Soviet striking forces were stepping up the pace of the sensational advance. The southern front, taking advantage of increasing enemy disorganization to extreme that German units were turning their guns on some units which had lost all semblance of discipline.

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AIRCRAFT OUTPUT AT RECORD PEAK

WASHINGTON, April 2 (U.P.)—Aircraft assembly lines moved record speed in March to bolster the growing United States air fleet with 9,118 new planes. Aircraft Production Chief Charles E. Wilson reported today.

Nearly 87 per cent of the planes

Wilson said the "remarkable" March output may represent the peak of the production schedule, but said that the production schedule for April was "considerably below" the March total because of the increasing emphasis on larger planes.

Aircraft production in March exceeded 100,000,000 pounds for the first time, reaching 103,400,000. The figure is the highest since the war, production in March 1944 and March 1945 in production in numbers was 35,000 planes above the preceding month.

Wilson said that production in March was 100,000 pounds above February output, and that the four-motored bomber program exceeded the 1943 schedule by five per cent.

He said the new B-29 bomber was "substantially on schedule" as reported, and practically every
