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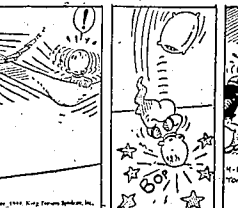
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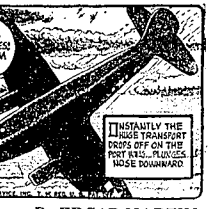
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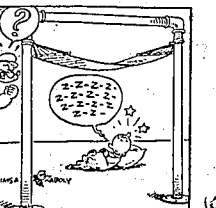
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DISTRIBUTION OF SNOW FREAKISH

BURLEY, April 14.—Snow measurements on the Albion mountain peak recently made by rangers indicate a freakish snow distribution with snow depths and water contents ranging from far below average on the Cassia divide to above normal on the adjacent Albion mountain division.

Measurements made by Ranger C. E. Jensen, Burley, on the Bonanza ranger station snow course show an average snow depth of 22.3 inches with a water content of 11.3 inches. This is 63 per cent of average snow depth since 1933 and 60 per cent of average water content over the same period. It represents just 30 per cent of snow depth and 43 per cent of water content compared to the 1943 record year.

Ground under the snow mantle was unfrozen and moist indicating that the soil is in condition to allow snow water to percolate into the sub-soil from where it would later appear as spring water. Ranger Jensen estimates that the maximum spring flowage will occur about May 15.

The 27.3 snow depth measurements made by Ranger E. C. Ross show a 1944 snow depth of 2.9 inches with a water content of 11.8 inches as compared to 53.9 inches of snow and 23.9 inches of water in 1943. This indicates that 5 per cent snow depth and 50 per cent water content in relation to 1943 last year was a year of unusually heavy winter precipitation.

No long term record is available for snow depth or water content. Records have been established but two years. Ranger Ross reports that the snow depth is less this year than any year since he took charge of the ground. The snow depth is less and the snow was not frozen and was already absorbing snow water. He estimates that maximum spring flowage will be later than in 1943 due to presence of snow in the soil.

At the Albion mountain snow measurements made by Ranger Walter A. Jensen, Burley, indicate an average snow depth of 19.4 inches with a water content of 11.3 inches. This is 63 per cent of average snow depth and 60 per cent of average water content in relation to the long time average of 30.6 inches of snow and 23.9 inches of water in 1943. This represents 19 per cent of 1943 snow depth and 50 per cent of 1943 water content.

Snow depths on the Albion area are only 92 per cent of the average since 1933 with a water content of 44 per cent of average. This is 3 per cent of 1943 snow depth and 41 per cent of 1943 water content. Ranger L. H. Garner, Malia, who made the measurements states that the ground was partly frozen on the Sublet snow course. He estimates that the water reservoir probably will be fairly full before spring melt.

Little or no surface run of melting snow is predicted for the Albion area. The maximum stream flow is estimated to occur in the latter part of May and should be considerably less than in 1943.

Unless substantial rain fall occurs during the summer season, irrigation water supplies for those dependent on direct stream flow from the forest will be short in late summer except on the Albion mountain division where irrigation water supplies should be normal.

Idaho Power Co. Declares Dividend

BOISE, April 14 (AP)—Idaho Power company directors today declared the regular quarterly dividend on the company's seven per cent and 40 preferred stock and a dividend of 40 cents per share on common stock.

The common stock dividend brings to 80 cents the amount returned this year, a 40 cent payment having been declared in January. The common stock was offered to the public for the first time last year.

Preferred dividends are payable May 1 to stockholders of record April 15. The common stock dividend is payable May 20 to owners of record April 25.

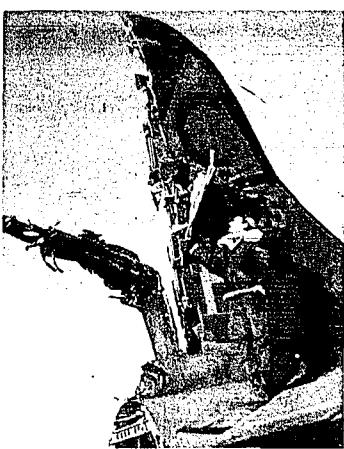

He has been in the armed forces since October, 1942.

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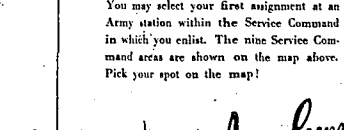
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Post-war Water PLAN ON AGENDA
