NEW CARRIERS TO BE MIGHTY CRAFT

WASHINGTON, May 8.—The two 45,000-ton "super-carriers" now under construction should be ready to participate in the next Japan undersea attack, it was learned today.

Construction on a third ship of the same type is scheduled to start this summer.

First of kind—These ships, the first of their kind in any navy, are designed to carry multi-engine bombers as part of their regular complement of planes. Thus, they will enable the navy to extend its sea-borne air striking arm by hundreds of miles and with a heavier punch.

The first of these aircraft—officially designated as CVE-57—was scheduled to be launched in this week. The second is due to be launched the next week.

The navy apparently gave these carriers high priority because the keels of the first two were laid down only last year.

These ships will be able to launch more than a year's worth of aircraft in the construction.

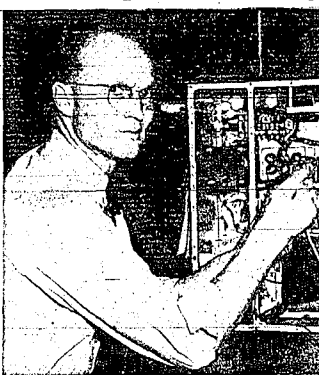

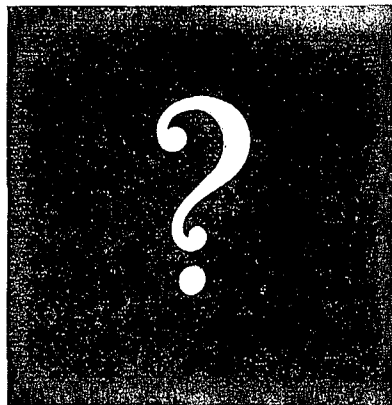
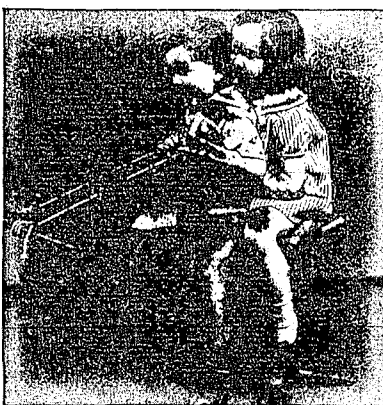
