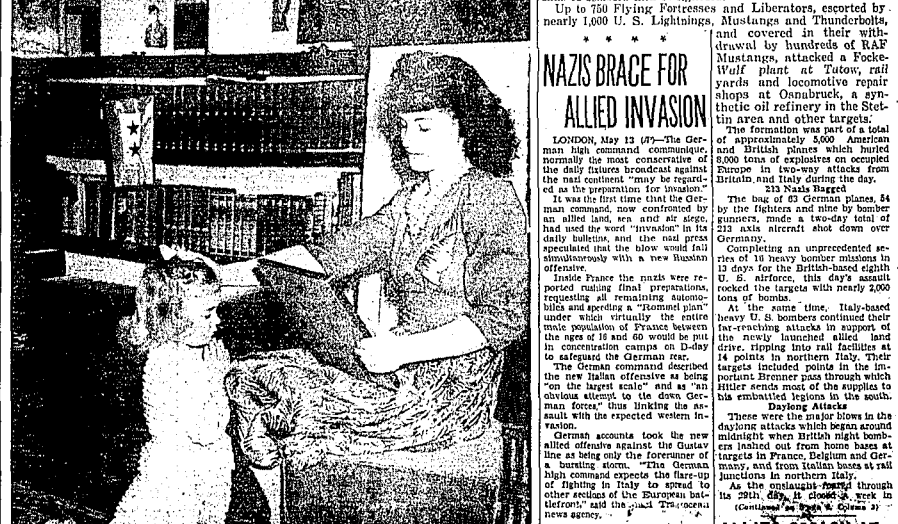

PRIEST WHO SAW STALIN PENALIZED

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., May 13 (AP)—The Rev. Stanislaus Orlemanski was suspended indefinitely as a parish priest and pastor by his bishop today after he returned from Moscow.

Only a few hours after the Polish-American was greeted with cheers by admirers at union station, the Rev. Orlemanski, head of the diocese, issued the following statement:

"Bishop Thomas M. Orlemanski has applied the penalty provided in the laws of the case. Polish Orlemanski has been suspended."

Chancellor Shea said that as a result of the suspension Father Orlemanski would be unable to preach or take part in any public acts of service anywhere.

Previously, Bishop Orlemanski had declared that Orlemanski let the diocese without the required permission of the superior while on the Soviet union a month ago. The bishop had hinted that summary action would be taken upon the priest's return to Springfield.

The 54-year-old Rev. Orlemanski had retired to his rectory upon return, and was not contacted immediately for comment on his bishop's action.

Earlier, Father Orlemanski had announced that he will go to Washington to report on his conference with Premier-Walsh Joseph Stalin.

His report to Washington at a later date, the Polish-American priest, said, "I think my government has the privilege and is fully entitled to be informed of my trip. It is not away for a while because of the adverse criticism of President Roosevelt and Secretary of State Hull."

Father Orlemanski emphasized that he did not intend to be regarded as the secretary of state, "I made the trip on my own responsibility," he said. "Nobody ordered me to go. I had no interest in the journey."

NAZIS' DEFENSES CALLED NO MYTH

COLUMBIA, Mo., May 13 (AP)—Germany's main defense systems in the west actually exist and should not be considered a myth, Hitler's secret weapons, Britain's defense forces, former United States Ambassador for France, said last night at the University of Missouri's 25th annual Journalism week.

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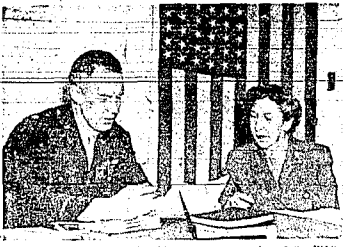

War Production Threatened by Drive to Unionize Management

- ★ The drive of union leaders to unionize management, beginning with foremen, is a threat to the war production effort.
- ★ It is a long step toward putting industrial management in the hands of union leaders.
- ★ What kind of collective bargaining is it when union leaders sit on both sides of the table?
- ★ It raises an issue which congress must clarify by amending the necessary laws, including the War Labor Disputes Act.
- ★ Unless congress acts, this crisis will further obstruct an all-out war production effort.

The Automotive Council for War Production, representing 550 established companies employing 1,200,000 workers and delivering 20% of the nation's war production, has authorized its president, Alvan Macauley, to make the following public statement and send it to the President, other government officials, and all members of congress:

At this most critical moment in history, on the eve of the great invasion of Europe which may settle the issue of human freedom for years to come, the public is entitled to know of a situation which threatens the success of that great effort.

The Council has given careful consideration to the adverse effect on war production of the strike of foremen in the twelve plants of major war producers in the Detroit area and the still greater threat inherent in the organized drive to unionize management, beginning with foremen.

This is a long step toward putting industrial management in the hands of union leaders.

Successful business undertakings and great achievements depend on an organization responsive to the decision of those in charge. The commanding officers of production, like those of the army, must have their captains and lieutenants, their sergeants and corporals. Foremen, supervisors and managers are officers in the production army.

The division of their obligations and responsibilities between management and any outside organization will be just as disastrous to our war production front as outside organization of the army's officers to bargain and debate with their superiors would be at the battlefield. "No man can serve two masters."

The issue now is: Can union leaders untionize management and take over control of war production?

Are their organizing drives for this purpose to be allowed to interfere with the efficiency and effectiveness of this production? Will they be allowed to disrupt

The Council has never intervened in the collective bargaining problems of employer-employee relations, and there is no intention to depart from this practice.

BOMB GROUP SETS UNUSUAL RECORD

By DAN ROVERMAN
PEARL HARBOR, T. H., May 13—A group of pleasant, quietly destructive young men, homebound to the mainland after five to 10 months duty overseas as carriers, today revealed an amazing record of major victories over Hiroshima, Nagasaki and other targets in the Pacific theater.

Youthful group commanders, and even more youthful fighter, torpedo and bomber pilots, the 51st and 30th air groups took their first part in the Pacific attack on May 13, 1944, as they were being transferred here while awaiting transportation home.

They revealed that their units—only a capsule of the total carrier plane strength under the command of 51st Bomber Command—have sunk 13,000 tons of enemy shipping, destroyed the enemy aircraft carrier and destroyed at least 167 other planes, as a result of their major part in the Pacific attack on May 13, 1944, as they were being transferred here while awaiting transportation home.

The story begins with the 51st air group's entry into action on the Marianas island of Tinian on the 23rd of the battle at Makin Island, Sept. 18, 1943, at the station at the Gilberts and Makin the following day. It continues through their duty on the 2nd and 3rd bombing attacks on Japan, "Pearl Harbor" base of Truk April 30.

Included in the group was Lieutenant D. Schellie, 22, POW, USA, a modest, baby-faced former Madison Young University student, who recalled how he and the other boys he shot down his first jet on April 10, 1944, as they were being transferred here while awaiting transportation home.

He was shot down by a Japanese plane above, tried to land on Truk airfield, but was whisked into a row of parked planes and set three more off.

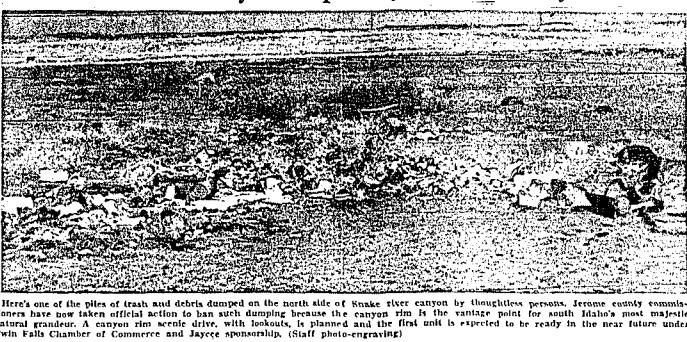
