# FDR SKIPS PAST 4TH TERM 'TRAP'

WASHINGTON, May 27 (AP)—Connecticut's unanimous party endorsement brought President Roosevelt's second term to a close today without persuading him to acknowledge or deny that he is a fourth term candidate.

Franklin D. Roosevelt was committed to him as approximately 800 delegates from 20 states.

The question of his candidacy has become a matter of friendly, academic discussion in Mr. Roosevelt's news conferences these days. Four years ago he was successful of efforts to obtain a third term statement. Now the questions are put carefully and in a form intended to make them difficult to parry.

At yesterday's conference Merriam Smith, United Press White House correspondent, thought he had succeeded one that could not be avoided, and outlined it to the president before the conference began. They thought it a good one. It went this way in Smith's strong baritone:

Smith's Question  
"Mr. President, more than enough delegates to the Democratic national convention have been committed to you to give you a large majority and to assure your re-election. My question is not whether you intend to accept or decline, but whether you have made your decision whether to accept or reject."

Some of the 100 or so correspondents began laughing and Mr. Roosevelt told them the story. He said it is pretty good, he finally said, explaining he got that question in a different form each week. This was a new one.

"To the Smith agreed, 'but what's the answer?'"

The president replied that he was not going to answer the question, but the question could be asked. This would tell, he said, whether he would answer all the questions one time.

Go into Lincoln, political expert of the Washington Star, broke in to remind Mr. Roosevelt:

"The liberal party in New York has just nominated you for president. Do you feel justified of that nomination?"

Mr. Roosevelt directed that question. And after there are few better answers than the one which Lincoln and Smith, the two chairs of the president, he said he did not consider the time appropriate.

Other words were said. The president's second term, on the second of the Democratic national convention which meets in Chicago July 19 in the town in which the president obtained his first and third nominations.

Mr. Roosevelt was actually considering meeting Churchill late in the spring, it might be taken as an inadvertent admission that he expected to be in the White House at that time.

## Kimberly's Bible School Underway

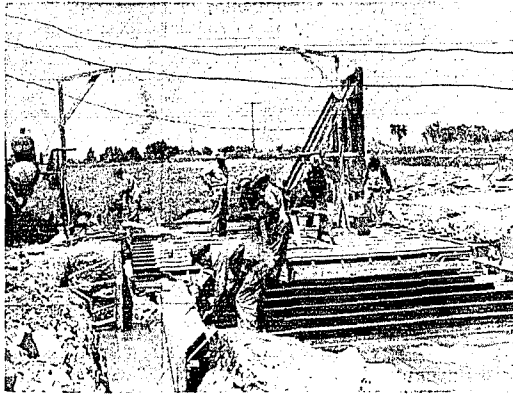

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, May 27—At its 60th commencement this week-end, May 27 to 29, the University of Idaho will honor the 66 alumni and former students who already have given their lives in World War II. The war memorial exercises, which will be part of the regular commencement services Sunday morning, May 29.

President Dale has written to the families of university men killed in action, enclosing them of the memorial plans and the response indicates a large number will attend. 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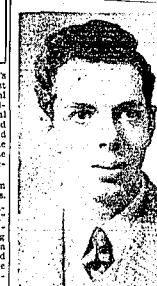

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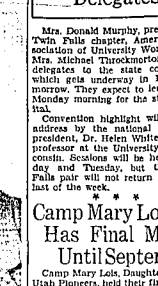
