

COOKS RELEASES MOST COAL PITTS

WASHINGTON, June 1 (AP)—A majority of the nation's bituminous coal mines resumed operation under private management today, with management and labor charged with the responsibility of meeting record production goals.

Coal Administrator Harold C. Ickes referred the mines after a seven-month period of government control while final settlements were negotiated to end a prolonged dispute between owners and the United Mine Workers.

Returns Expected
The return to anthracite and the remaining soft coal mines was expected to follow soon.

Those already released included most of the bituminous coal mines controlled by the wage contract recently approved by the United Mine Workers. Control was retained over a few of the mines, covered by that agreement, writers for months.

Southern Appalachian operators who had rejected the contract have indicated willingness to meet the wage provisions but have asked safeguards to prevent dismissal of pending litigation over whether underground travel time is work time under the wage-hour law.

Confidence Expressed
A UMW spokesman expressed confidence that at least 90 per cent of the southern operators would be ready next Monday to sign contracts explaining a minor revision proposed by the union to amend the law.

Anthracite mines will be released when the anthracite wage contract is ratified by a special convention to be called by the UMW.

The government that seized the mines after a nationwide strike May 1, 1942, released the mines during the summer. They were seized again last Nov. 1 after another shutdown.

PROBE SOUGHT TO SET DEC. 7 BLAME

WASHINGTON, June 1 (AP)—A proposal for creation of a "court of inquiry" to bring out the story of Pearl Harbor as a preliminary to a permanent fact-finding commission E. Kimmel and Maj. Gen. Walter C. Short, in under congressional consideration today.

The court of inquiry approach, it was learned, has been suggested informally to certain congressmen as an alternative to immediate court martial proceedings which both the war and navy department resist. The court would be composed of officers whose testimony would be essential in court martial proceedings as even more essentially employed now in the war effort.

By President
The "court of inquiry" under the new suggestion would be a special group established either by congress or by the president, with authority to take any part of the court to take the testimony of three officers.

Meanwhile, the senate judiciary committee is scheduled to act on a resolution which would seek to extend May 7. The law in which court martial proceedings could be instituted against Kimmel and Short. Judiciary committee approved it yesterday despite a declaration that it would not be held until Dec. 7. That it is impossible for congress to extend it, and that the question of whether they can be tried after an act of congress is still open.

Ask Speedy Trial
Kimmel is insisting on speedy trial. Sen. Homer Ferguson, R., Mich., this week requested a letter from Kimmel demanding a trial and charging that the "whole story of Pearl Harbor" has not been told. Kimmel also wrote the navy department on Feb. 29, 1944, asking to be tried and commanding that he never had been advised of the charges against him. Neither has Short been told by the department the details of the charges.

Both Kimmel and Short are in a restricted military procedure subject to speedy trial of evidence. Supporters of the court of inquiry approach point out that such a court would be held in secret, in order of evidence could apply. It would be more like a congressional investigation in which the testimony of witnesses can go in any direction desired by questioners members of congress.

It is felt that this proposal motivated in part Churchill's kind words to the British government. Churchill said that he "did not feel that it is right to demand any military action against the British people" and his appreciation of the "good services."

Idaho Can Become "Giant" in Production, Bott Tells Jerome

JEROME, June 1.—Graphically describing Idaho as the fourth ranking state in the total production of all crops, Gov. C. A. Bottolfsen, speaking here last night before the Jerome Chamber of Commerce, told his audience of the state's past accomplishments and plans for the future.

"Why should we stand idly by and allow other manufacturing centers return to us goods processed from raw materials grown in Idaho?" he asked.

"We have the natural resources to become a giant among our neighbors," he stated. "The future lies not in geographical area, but in progress and become the massive number of goods together with being the massive producer of materials."

"Pointing toward Idaho records of accomplishment during 1943, Governor Bottolfsen said that the state's produce was valued at \$1,400,000,000 and that it could easily have been \$500,000,000.

35,500 Trains
He said that Idaho last year shipped 35,500 trainloads of materials from the soil. He pointed out that the state produced 220,000,000 pounds of dried peas, 220,000,000 pounds of dried beans, 1,570,000,000 pounds of potatoes and 100,000,000 pounds of all the sugar consumed in the nation.

"One dehydration plant alone produced 2,500,000 pounds of dehydrated potatoes, 100,000,000 pounds of dehydrated apples," he said.

DEFEATS CHANGE JAPS' STRATEGY

By RUEL S. MOORE
WASHINGTON, June 1 (UP)—Japanese grand strategy, once directed at holding the electric for eastern Europe, has shifted under the blows until its main purpose now is to maintain an entrenched position on the Asiatic mainland, military observers believed today.

The new drive of 150,000 Japanese troops in the vicinity of Yung Ting toward the important Chinese city of Changshu, was interpreted as a move to establish a permanent Japanese base in China, Chinese advisers said the Japanese attack

represented an effort to cut eastern and western China by a drive down the railway towards Canton and Hankow.

Japs Doubt Power
Observers here said the long string of American air land and sea victories in the Pacific appeared to have created serious doubts in the minds of the Japanese whether they possessed the power to hold any of their island holds. The Japanese once hoped that the Americans would be before recovering lost possessions in the Pacific and led them to go to Japan by default.

But the progress of recovery has not been so lullish as the Japanese had hoped to make it. General Douglas MacArthur's forces are steadily moving from New Guinea towards the Philippines while Admiral Nimitz's forces are moving toward the Chinese mainland bases which he said would be taken to strike at the Japanese homeland.

WORLD NEWS

For years the Japanese were content to hold key rivers, harbors and cities in China, apparently considering the Chinese effort in the Philippines inconsequential. After Pearl Harbor, they concentrated on American and allied areas on the outer perimeter of Japanese defenses in the Pacific.

But with the Pacific war now going against them, the Japanese appear to be looking more favorably at the alternative of establishing new lines on the Asiatic mainland, where circumstances are more favorable to them.

In a letter to his wife who lives at Hollister, Vest tells how the Jap prisoner was flown into a New Guinea base recently. He with many others and worn out from months of fighting, the prisoner ate a complete ration the boys gave him, including vitamin tablets.

He accepted cigarettes offered him in exchange for his autograph, and walked from the plane to the hospital, chatting the while with allied soldiers. The NIP who had him in charge carried his bed roll, says Private Vest.
