## O'NEAL WILL BACK AT BUREAU MEET

Problems of vital importance to intermountain agriculture will be discussed at the national conference of the American Farm Bureau federation, to be held in Chicago, June 14, 15 and 16.

J. Stewart Dayley, Bureau president, told the Times-News last night that the conference will be interested in agriculture will be welcome at the conference whether he is a member of the federation or not.

Inasmuch as the conference comprises 14 western states and will feature speakers of national reputation, many farmers and others interested in agriculture are expected to attend from major valleys.

Among the principal speakers will be Edward A. O'Neal of Chicago, president of the national organization; Dr. Robert Corbett of Chicago, secretary; and Frank C. Swell of Chicago, administrative director of the Associated Women of the U. S. B. F.

Present also will be the three western delegates: George O'Neil, California; George O'Neil, Idaho; and Bert King of Iowa.

Irrigation Institute  
The program on the afternoon of June 15 will be devoted to an "Institute of Irrigation," principal speakers for which will be H. C. Carr, former governor of Colorado, and Dean E. J. Jennings of the University of Idaho college of agriculture.

The national fertilizer program is also scheduled for the same afternoon. Scientific aspects of the program will be discussed by Dr. Elmer Peterson of the Utah Agricultural college. Jack Simons of California will talk on production and distribution.

A feature of the conference will be the annual banquet that evening, which will be addressed by G. A. Bollen and Mr. O'Neal.

Discussions of social security for agriculture by Dr. Von S. B. North, director of research, California Bureau of Agriculture, and medical care by Mrs. Sewell will coincide the conference on June 17.

## Absentee Ballots Mailed Saturday

Forty-eight absentee ballots were mailed Saturday from the office of County Auditor Charles B. Ballew to voters who will be absent from the county on primary election day, June 6.

Approximately half of these were sent to women in the armed forces, Ballew said.

Idaho statute provides that any person who is a registered voter may apply to the county auditor for absentee election ballots between June 1 and June 12, if he is unable to be away from the county on election day, or if he is ill or blind.

The ballot can be marked at the voter's home, and the completed envelope which will be sent to the precinct in which the absentee votes.

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## DISMISSAL SEEN FOR WARD SUITS

WASHINGTON, June 3.—The justice department today announced the dismissal of all Montgomery Ward and company suits challenging the validity of the labor board order.

Such action will be based on yesterday's decision of the court of appeals for the District of Columbia that the board's order is not subject to court enforcement or review.

Justice department and WLB officials, announcing the decision, interpreted it as approval of the administration's position in the Ward cases and other legal contests over the validity of WLB orders.

Three judges of the appeals court unanimously upheld a district court decision that the board's order is not subject to court enforcement or review.

After yesterday's decision, the appeals court rejected the government petition, and said the lower court could speedily dispose of the case, presumably in accord with its opinion in the trucking case.

Montgomery Ward has filed five suits challenging the legality of WLB orders particularly the minimum wage order. In another case involving Montgomery Ward, a district court refused to dismiss, and the government appeal is pending.

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# McNUTT SEEKING AID OF CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—Senator McNutt today discussed his new job contract program with a group of senators in an effort to secure their aid in the program. McNutt said the program is a congress which has most maintained a steady course since 1933.

He lunched with several senators who are particularly interested in manpower problems, including Warren E. Austin, R., Ill., and Charles McNair, R., Ind., both members of the military affairs committee. It was understood that McNutt's presence was arranged at the request of McNair or the senators.

The few congressmen who have expressed themselves so far have been critical. Rep. William J. Miller, R., Conn., wanted no time in denouncing the program as illegal, holding that it puts into effect a national labor draft without sanction of congress.

**Double Action Necessary**

Sen. John C. Baughman, D., Wash., a member of the Finance committee, said McNutt's action is necessary and warranted if congress will stand for it. McNair's comment was noncommittal. He said the program is "a new thing" and that McNutt is doing it on his own initiative.

There has been no labor reaction as yet to the program, which McNutt announced yesterday would be put into effect July 1, 1944. McNair said labor organizations have expressed themselves unfavorably against it as a labor draft.

The program, setting up semi-conductors, is intended to give workers 15 years of age and under, with regular work, to hire only men referred to them by the United States employment service or other employment channels "sanctioned" by the WMC.

**Greater Intensification**

It provides also for intensification of WMC activities in the future so that they may be transferred from surplus labor force areas where there is industry need more labor, and extend to 184 labor short areas where employment is "critical" and the number of workers allowed a given employer and manpower primary contractors are limited to workers to most vital industries.

McNutt's authority to issue such an order is contained in Executive Order of Dec. 8, 1942, insuring that WMC chairman will take all "lawful and appropriate" steps necessary to assure that all hiring and recruitment of workers is conducted solely through the WMC or arrangements he approves.

However, the manpower committee apparently will rely more on its own participation in the program and employ them upon any completion it might undertake.

**"Voluntary" Emphasis**

The WMC's official announcement of the program was made in this manner: "In places it is true in one or others it is essential to the national defense and to our manpower control."

Committee officials privately admitted that the WMC program is legal authorization to dictate absolutely the hiring and firing of industrial workers.

They pointed out, however, that it is not a labor draft. It is a "voluntary" program, a "pretty good" thing.

The WMC, for example, could impose conditions on a employer by refusing to refer workers to him. In the case of a recalcitrant employer, it would refer to refer him to an employer.

# World War I Vet Paid Last Honor

In 1923 he married Mrs. Cora McKeen, and is survived by five sons and three daughters, Nancy and Frankie, Hammett, and Mary, two daughters, Mrs. Pray Trinkle, Boise; Jack Trinkle, second class, Pacific Beach, Wash.

# Ex-Twin Falls Mechanic Now Directs Army Motor Repairs

Before the war, Gerald W. Hutchison was called the mechanic of the used car department at a Union Motor company.

He got a new title now—"guiding light" of the post economic repair shop at Camp Beale, Calif.

"Hutch" is the subject for quite a tribute in a recent issue of the "Herald," a local newspaper.

There's a picture of him, his hat, his uniform, his name, his photo as though he is pretty proud of what his boys are doing.

Here's the story:

There probably is no piece of military stock in Camp Beale that is damaged, can't be repaired, and that the mechanic is not saving the countless vehicles from a sad end on the scrap heap is Gerald W. Hutchison, the guiding light of the post economic repair shop since he arrived on the post just 5, 1942.

"Way back then Hutch, as he is familiarly known was the only man the repair shop had. # NEW CEILINGS ON CABBAGE, BEANS

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—The office of price administration today set new retail ceiling prices on cabbage, beans and hot house cucumbers.

Cabbage will be increased approximately 3 1/2 cents of a cent a pound above prices prevailing during June, 1943. Substantial reductions from last year's prices were set for cucumbers and somewhat smaller reductions for beans.

Average price for cabbage will be about four cents per pound, with wide variations in different parts of the country, OPA said.

New retail ceiling for beans will be between 16 and 18 cents per pound, while field grown cucumbers will sell for 11 to 12 cents per pound through June 15, and for nine to 10 cents from June 16 to the end of the month. Hot house cucumbers will sell for about 25 cents per pound.
