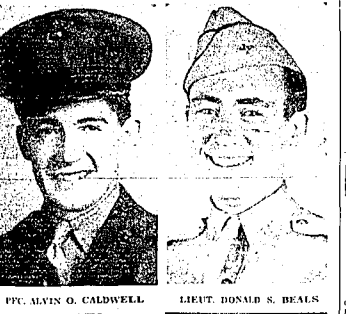

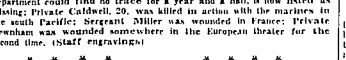

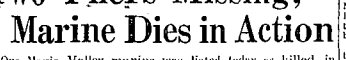

SAIPAN SUICIDE ATTACK BLASTED

WITH THE 27TH INFANTRY DIVISION, Saipan, July 4 (Delayed) 02-20 July 1944), 30 Japanese soldiers, including a full colonel and three other officers of his staff, were killed in an unsuccessful, fanatical attack on an infantry regiment command post.

The officers wore clean uniforms and carried rifles, bayonets fixed to their rifles, and other combat equipment. They were reported to have been killed in a hand-to-hand struggle near the command post.

Only one American infantryman was wounded as the tough douglos-bayoneted charge raged and machine-gun fire and grenades with the Japs.

The Japs approached in three groups, one of which was marching in double column, single file. Pvt. Louis L. Worley, 25, Wichita Falls, Tex., at first thought they were friendly.

They in the pre-dawn light, Worley suddenly saw they were Japs. A coup's burst from his Garand killed three.

The remaining Japs rushed the command post where Private First Class Albert DeWitt, 28, West Point, Miss., and W. Morris Adams, private, Memphis, Ill., and John Crowl, private, City, Ill., fought off the suicidal attack, killing 14 more of the enemy within a 50-foot radius of their emplacement.

Cpt. Arthur Hays, Chicago; Pvt. Arvid Latta Walker, a Punon Indian from Kaw, Okla.; and Pfc. Al Genial, Madison, Wis., killed three Japs within 25 yards of the regimental commanding officer's footlocker.

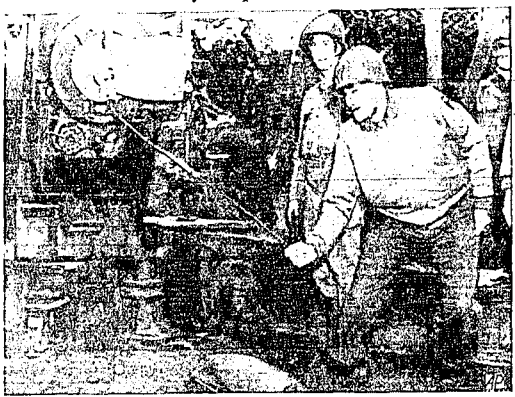

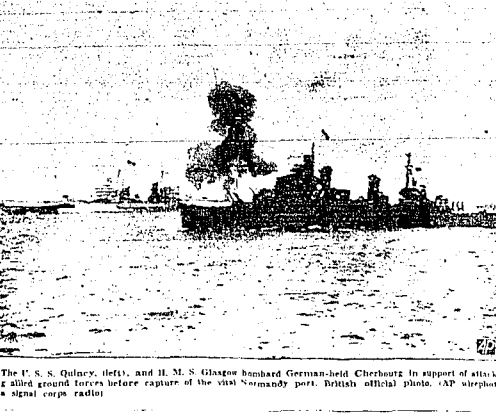

FORMER PREMIER OF FRANCE DIES

LONDON, July 12 (AP)—Edouard Herriot, former French premier whose government fell in December of 1932 because he insisted on paying the French war debt to the United States, died at the age of 72, the German DMB news agency reported today. The agency did not disclose the time, place or cause of death.

Herriot was known to his admirers in the years before World War I as the "French Roosevelt."

He first became premier of France in 1924 and his cabinet of radical socialists and socialists held power from June 24, 1924 to April 17, 1925. After his government was overthrown he became president of the chamber of deputies.

In June of 1932 he was called back to the premiership but he resigned and refused to form a new cabinet six months later when the chamber of deputies overthrew him on the debt issue.

At that time he declared: "I will continue to devote the premiership and all refuse the foreign affairs or any other portfolio until France has paid her debt."


