

Churchill Teases Commons Allied Victory Nearing

LONDON, Aug. 2 (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill said today he felt that the final end of the war against the axis was close, perhaps much sooner, than he once expected.

"On every battle front over the world," he told the house of commons, "the armies of Germany and Japan are receding. I am increasingly led to feel that the victory between the defeat of Hitler and the defeat of Japan will be shorter—perhaps much shorter—than I had at one time supposed."

He mentioned no dates, but, confident and cheerful, he sketched bright pictures of a swiftly approaching victory. He spoke one hour and 45 minutes before the house.

He said that the Japanese reference, the most definite statement he made on this score was: "I fear greatly the raising of false hopes, but I no longer feel bound to deny that victory may come perhaps soon."

In the same vein he said that he cannot see more than a sweeping glance of the world as it approaches the end of its fifth year, and it approaches with its closing stage.

MOSCOW, Aug. 2 (AP)—Thousands of Germans trapped in Latvia and Estonia by a swift Russian plunge to the Baltic sea 30 miles west of Riga thrashed at the Russian noose today while other nazis fought violently on a 20-mile suburban area in defense of besieged Warsaw.

Northeast of the invested Polish capital, Gen. Ivan Cherniakhovsky reported a huge drive toward East Prussia on a 200-mile front, striking within 10 miles of the pre-war frontier of the land of the Junkers.

The German communique suggested that Russian troops were pouring across the broad and swift Vistula river north of Warsaw, asserting that nazis plans "sank on the Vistula 28 Soviet ferries crammed with troops." The communique said "heavy fighting" was continuing on the approaches of East Prussia.

RUBBER—An American model operating of industrialists and administration officials will be dispatched to London to negotiate with their British counterparts about the importation of rubber goods. Their errand emphasizes the complexities of the economic situation which the United States must try to solve before their formal negotiations can begin. Rubber is a vital material in the war effort.

But discussions have become necessary at this time. The United States, in a few short years, has miraculously mastered the previously impossible task of making an adequate synthetic product in volume.

Our army and navy, as well as civilian motorists, will never again feel the dread pang of the rubber rationed when the days of our rubber supply, on the basis of the British and Dutch fact.

The average price per pound of the natural rubber is around 12 cents, although a few factories have received as high as 15 cents. It is not a new record.

In the imported raw material can be as high as 25 cents, and during operation of the Brazilian rubber plantations, imported by Britain in the last year, it was 30 cents. This is a new high of about 25 cents.

It is estimated that the United States has a rubber supply of about a million tons, of which can be produced right here.

OLD CROP BEAN CEILING RAISED

Ceiling price on old crop beans—beans grown prior to the 1943 crop—will be raised by the government to \$4.65, thus permitting a price increase of \$0.35 per hundred for No. 1 and \$0.20 per hundred for No. 2. It was announced here Wednesday.

Under the new setup for the old crop beans, the government has agreed to pay a subsidy to the dealer of 45 cents. This subsidy, which is based on the acreage added for cleaning, handling and marketing the beans, will be paid to the dealer who will then pass it on to the consumer. The government's new ceiling on the price of old crop beans is \$4.65 per hundred for No. 1 and \$4.45 for No. 2. This is a 10-cent increase over the old ceiling of \$4.55 and \$4.35 respectively.

Judge Rules Parents Unfit; Grandparents Given Children

Two minor children, taken from Idaho by their father on Christmas Eve, 1940, and not located by their mother until November 1941, at Spokane, Wash., were turned over to the custody of their grandparents as the outcome of a contempt of court action which concluded Tuesday in district court.

District Judge T. Bailey Lee found the father, Arthur E. Brown, formerly of Twin Falls, Mo., to be a drunken degenerate, and that he was guilty of failure to pay his former wife \$40 a month for the children's support, as stipulated in the divorce decree granted to V. Brown, now Velma Bodesta, in 1937.

According to court records, Sheriff Lee, of Owyhee, Idaho, had a warrant for Brown's arrest on a charge of kidnapping when he was made to extradite from the state of Washington on the charge. The mother was allowed to promise to return to Twin Falls county six months later.

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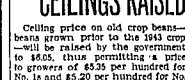

THIS LUMBER WILL BE RELEASED BY STATE AND COUNTY FARM BOARDS FOR FOLLOWING PURPOSES:

- Construction of farm buildings—not dwellings—come within \$1000 limitation of L-11.
- Rebuilding or restoring of farm buildings—not dwellings—come within \$1000 limitation of L-11.
- Rebuilding or restoring of a farmhouse damaged or destroyed after July 1, 1943, by fire, flood, tornado, earthquake, act of war, or the like, if the cost of building or restoring is less than \$5000 where immediate reconstruction is determined by State AAA Committee to be essential to the agricultural program.
- Construction necessary to prevent threatened loss of farm products—where immediate construction is determined by State AAA Committee to be essential.
- Rebuilding or restoring of a farmhouse damaged or destroyed after July 1, 1943, by fire, flood, tornado, earthquake, act of war, or the like, if cost is less than \$5000. This does not apply where there is widespread damage—in such a case the Red Cross has authority to issue certified rated orders to secure lumber for reconstruction.
- Construction of farm labor buildings required for housing seasonal labor which come within the \$1000 limitation of L-11.
- Maintenance and repair of farm buildings—not dwellings.
- Maintenance and repair of farm implements.
- Other essential uses contributing to food production.
