FDR SEES FIRST ENEMY CAPTIVES

HONOLULU, July 29 (Delayed)—President Roosevelt today made his first visit to Hawaii.

Mr. Roosevelt saw Japanese war prisoners for the first time on his visit here.

Going through Camp Collins, a military reception center, he drove by a large, heavily guarded compound where Japanese prisoners in military uniforms were being billeted amicably around behind the barred wire fence, sitting on cots in their tents.

Most of the prisoners appeared to be young and in good health. They seemed to recognize the President or show any interest in the procession of cars.

Many people in Oahu Island were crowded that Churchill, Chiang Kai-shek and Stalin were here for the conference. Some appeared to have been riding down the street.

The Honolulu Advertiser, the morning newspaper, carries a special daily feature called "Ten Years Ago in Honolulu." STATE TO LOWER AD VALOREM TAX

BOISE, Aug. 10 (P. M.)—Governor Bottelstein today reported that the state board of equalization at its annual meeting Monday would reduce the state ad valorem tax probably two mills.

The state's portion of the levy is now three and one-half mills. The governor said he felt the board would be justified in reducing the tax to two and one-half mills.

The board, made up of the governor, the state auditor, the state treasurer, Myrtle E. Rasmussen, secretary of the State Board of Equalization, and the state auditor, will act on county assessments Monday and Tuesday, but will not act on assessments Wednesday and decide the remainder of the week to submit recommendations.

Bottelstein reported the state has approximately \$1,000,000 on hand which can be used for general fund expenses. Idaho is prohibited by the constitution from accumulating surpluses.

At yesterday's preliminary session, C. H. Peterson, tax agent for the Idaho Power company, stated the company's valuation is maintained at \$15,000,000, according to the company's records.

Wild-Boar Hunting Interesting Experience to Burley Sergeant

BURLEY, Aug. 9—Staff Sgt. George Nielsen, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. Nielsen, goes wild boar hunting in the Hebrides islands of the south Pacific and finds it quite an experience.

He left here in 1943 with the national guard unit and is still with a group of local men in the islands. He has been a sportsman since before leaving Port Latta for overseas more than two years ago. Now he operates a bakery school in the island.

A recent letter to his parents told of the boar hunting as follows: "I've been hunting no more and the wild boar that are so plentiful hereabouts."

"For the past two Sundays four of us Burley boys have killed the shaggy parker in the thick underbrush. We use mounted island dogs to bring the pigs to a halt, then the fun begins."

"If we do not arrive on the scene soon enough the dogs may try to kill the pig themselves. That is when disaster, for the animal can pick his back-end into the ground, back of a human eye and with his head and vicious tusks exposed, keep any number of dogs at bay."

Boar May Charge

"When we arrive on the scene we have learned that it is best to approach quietly and unattended, for an excited pig will charge a man, regardless of the number of dogs slung at his rear. The above situation gave me a clue to the fact that I have seen squirrel blood in my veins, for I made it to the safety of a small tree in the best of my manner. Perhaps you think I'm a coward and maybe I am, though I've never seen pigs that look to be as large as crows unless it was a pig coming my way."

Use Machine

"We only have machine for protection, though perhaps it's just as well for I doubt if I could hit a pig with a handful of rocks. How then, you ask? We the brave men kill the dangerous brutes?"

"Well, the dogs either slash him to pieces, or we make him a spear, using a machine for the blade, and spear the pig from the safety of an overhanging limb. Too, I have seen better use of machine to break the pig's back. The smartest thing to do is to carry a 45 for that purpose. Sometimes the dogs get hell and out of them, but, if the firing continues long enough, the pig will drop."

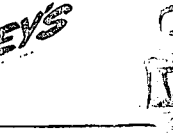

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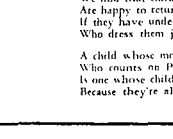
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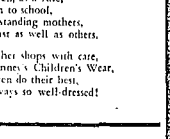

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FRESH PEACH JAM IS EASY TO MAKE

Here's a Recipe That Saves Sugar and Fruit

4 Cups Ground Peaches
4 Cups Sugar
1/2 Cup Lemon Juice
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash, peel, and remove pits from 4 pounds fully ripe peaches and grind the fruit. Measure exactly 4 level cups of the ground peaches (add water to a large cup if necessary) in a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin and lemon juice, stir well and bring to a full, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar, (which has been previously measured), continue stirring, and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire. Let the jam subside, stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.
