

TROUPE SAFE IN FORCED LANDING

SYDNEY, Australia, Aug. 14 (UPI)—A transport plane carrying 400 U.S. military troops and 100 U.S. military officers of the USO camp show was forced down 225 miles north of Sydney today but all aboard escaped uninjured.

The transport en route from Brisbane to Sydney, developed engine trouble and made an emergency landing on a sand bank near Lawrentia, a village of about 350 people.
