NEW AIR CHANCE OPEN TO YOUTHS

BOISE, Aug. 21—Under a new army specialized training program, 1,500 youths between the ages of 17 and 19-year-olds—many are expected to participate in the college basic training program of the AECIG, unassigned to the AECIG.

The figures are based on a statewide campaign by the ninth service command to recruit 3,000 youths in that age category who are interested in the army. The program is being carried out by the army's chief of reserve, W. Davis, Jr., assistant chief of the college basic training program, ninth service command, Salt Lake City, outlined the program for the entire country.

Ranks pointed out the great need for young men in the service and that the army was seeking enlistment of 10,000 a month throughout the country and that it hopes to enlist 45 per cent of the 3,000 in Idaho.

The program calls for an immediate examination of all young men that are interested, with subsequent assignment of all qualified youths to the college training program.

Enlistment will be made in one of the selected colleges for training. Those in the AECIG program will be sent to a basic training camp for six to 10 weeks before being assigned to the college training program.

County Weed Man Back From Parley

John S. Grimes, director of the county bureau of noxious weeds, recently returned from a two-day conference with the weed directors of Bonneville, Madison and Fremont counties.

Grimes, speaking of the trip, said that he found the soil in Fremont county sandy and heavy, and that the weed director of that county, Andrew W. Hansen, was four to five pounds of sodium chlorate per acre in the sandy soil and 10 pounds in the heavier soil.

"We use about eight pounds per acre in Twin Falls county," Grimes said.

He discovered that weeds in the vicinity of Idaho Falls are principally Canadian thistle, morning glory and quack grass. Weeds near St. Anthony are Canadian thistle, sow thistle, quack grass and morning glory.

The four weed directors in the conference, J. W. Kline, Bonneville county; William L. Jensen, Madison county; Hansen and Grimes, planning to promote a statewide meeting of county weed directors each year for the purpose of general discussion and general cooperation between the various agencies.

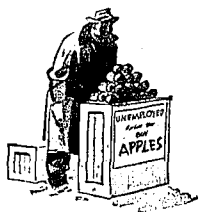

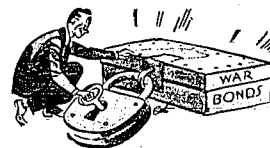
