Reds Drive To End Romania War Aid to Nazis

MOSCOW, Aug. 23 (AP)—A new red army offensive, probably designed to knock Romania out of the war and break Hitler's grip on the Balkans, smashed forward today on a 160-mile front beyond Iasi to within 180 miles of jittery Bucharest and 155 of the great Ploesti oil center.

An official German broadcast said the Russians had reached the beaches of Riga, Latvian capital and largest Baltic state city, indicating a new trap for the German 16th and 18th armies.

Nazi Losses Cited
Advancing over the bodies of 25,000 German slain in three violent days, 100,000 more trussed and nearly bound to prison camps, red army groups under Gen. Hottel, V. Malinovsky and Fedor I. Tolbukhin drove within 50 miles of the mouth of the Dniester river.

German shock troops tried to stiffen war-weary Romanian divisions on Russian tanks rolled to end in miles south of Iasi. Tolbukhin drove through Bessarabia, then crossed a junction with Malinovsky in the Galati gap, the capture of which would make caucuses of the Balkan area untenable for the enemy. Advances ranged to 44 miles in the Dniester valley.

Patriots Seize City; Allies Tighten Trap On Battered Enemy

SUPREME HEADQUARTERS, AEF, Aug. 23 (UP)—French patriots have liberated Paris, it was announced today while allied armies tightened a great noose around 93,000 survivors of the beaten German seventh army and American flying columns lashed out far beyond the capital to within 160 miles or less of the German border.

As the armored might of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's invasion armies battered the life from remaining enemy forces in northern and central France, hundreds of thousands of French patriots poured through the streets of Paris, waving the French flag and shouting "Vichy" and "Liberty."

The city fell yesterday, four years and 70 days after the triumphant Wehrmacht marched through the Arc de Triomphe and seized the French capital without firing a shot.

Gen. Pierre Koehn, commander-in-chief of the French forces in the interior, announced that his patriot army, 50,000 strong and supported by countless thousands of unarmed Parisians, won back the capital in four days of bloody street fighting that began last Saturday when the call for a general uprising in Paris was sounded.

Reached Climax
The battle raged at its climax yesterday when the patriots captured the Arc de Triomphe, the heart of the city and turned it into a brilliant fortress against which the Wehrmacht had lost in a series of bloody and fruitless attacks.

Advances Swiftly
With the island in the Seine securely in their hands, the patriots moved swiftly through the rest of the city, overwhelming isolated German rear guard covering behind the city.

It was announced that a number of Vichy government representatives were arrested, although the puppet mayor fled before the city's fall.

There was no confirmation of any of the reports from supreme allied headquarters.

The German account claimed that attempts to reinforce the German party under the protection of naval guns were driven back by naval coastal batteries.

ARMY RELEASE OF HOTEL ASSAILED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22 (AP)—The army was investigating the release of the hotel at Palm Beach, Fla., said "civilian pressure" partially prompted the action.

The hotel now being used as a hospital, is to be returned to its owners by Dec. 14, the army has announced.

In a strongly worded report on the dealing, the committee quoted an unidentified army official's memorandum as follows: "Considerable pressure is being brought upon this case by the fact that the owners of the hotel have been returned for their use."

Owners Listed
The memorandum named a railway line, the Florida East Coast road as owner, but the committee elsewhere in its report listed the owner as the Florida East Coast Hotel Co.

The report recommended that the hotel "not be returned to civilian use at this time," and suggested it would be a good idea to "keep it in the center."

After the report was filed, Senator Ferguson, R. Mich., told the senate that Attorney General Biddle had "shown a reluctance to supply the information with factual material," which it was entitled to see. He said it was true because of the subpoena information from the attorney general.

Points Stressed
Points stressed in the committee report included:

1. The army "never should have acquired the property." It was "a poor original investment." The most expensive property in the vicinity.
2. But inasmuch as the hotel has been converted to a hospital, it should be retained.
3. Administration throughout the deal was called bad.

The Structure
The hotel is a 300-room, nine-story structure regarded as one of the nation's finest. It was taken over by the army through a court order in December, 1942, and operated until July of this year, when patients were removed so it could be returned to the owner.

It declared that simultaneously with abandonment of the hotel, a hospital had been opened at Camp Axtell, Ind., although the location and general construction does not compare with the other.

In its senate discussion, Ferguson said "at this very moment, the war department is acquiring the hotel at \$10 a year, while the army is well as hotels in Nashville, Tenn., and in Hot Springs, Ark."

FOOD, JOBS BADLY NEEDED IN ITALY

ROME, Aug. 23 (AP)—Gen. Sir Henry M. Wilson, allied commander in chief of the Mediterranean theater, told a conference of military and political leaders of the allied control commission today that food and employment were the commission's two major problems.

"On these the reestablishment of Italy mainly depends," he said.

Wilson said the ACC must keep its eyes on the administration of the country and not become involved in politics. He said some Italians were below the subsistence level in food supplies and that this situation must be rectified.

Example for Future
The Italian situation was an example for future occupations, Wilson said, and the warheads must be "intuitive, impartiality and integrity."

Addressing the same conference, Col. Charles Pottier, allied military government commissioner for Rome, declared: "Up to the present the allies have not given Romans freedom from want."

He said the Romans were bitterly disillusioned by allied promises of food supplies not kept to the extent they visualized.

High Two High
He said that the transportation problem was serious, and added that the Roman houses were too high, requiring food, and that Rome required food and shelter. He said that the war continued.

Brig. Gen. William O'Dwyer, head of the economic section of the ACC in Italy, said he was "quite absolute agreement" with Pottier that Rome was badly in need of food, adding that Britain and the United States would be judged by "the job we do here."


