

# Russians Drive For Key German Oil, Wheat Area

MOSCOW, Aug. 24.—Captives reported hostilities spreading between the troops of Germany and Romania today while two great Russian army groups swept toward the heart of the oil and wheat kingdom in drives apparently aimed at trapping any army still in the path.

Companion offensives in south and north Poland continued apace.

Troops which seized Lublin were declared overrunning hundreds of miles of German factories, 150 of them in Lublin alone. Red Star said the Lwow-Krakow railroad bristled with German war plants of all kinds. The advance moved within 17 miles of Tarnow. Further north, Russian columns were within 35 miles of Krakow and 75 of German Silesia itself.

**South East Armies**

Northeast of Warsaw, the red army drove within 10 miles of the important communications hub of Lomza, 30 miles below the east Prussian frontier. In an offensive against the German army's defense, the Red Army drove to reach that province and Warsaw.

Captured Romanians said the Germans had failed their retreat in some places. Many Romanian units were reported to be in the hands of the Red Army.

German advance continued uninterrupted toward the Danube basin and Galtai gap. At midnight, Soviet troops had advanced within 167 miles of Bucharest and 140 of the Ploesti oil center, and less than 40 miles from the mouth of the Danube, a principal transport artery for Hitler.

**Great Area Seized**

Gen. Rodion Y. Malinovsky's second Ukrainian army group has captured 6,000 square miles of Romanian territory in a push from Galtai gap. His troops were within 35 miles of the mouth of the Danube, driving down from Iasi, and the army appeared to be throwing a great offensive around the city.

# Bulgaria Reportedly Seeking Peace As Romania Joins Allies in War On Axis: Hungary Army Revolts

LONDON, Aug. 24 (UP)—The Hungarian army was reported in revolt today, and press dispatches said Bulgaria had asked the allies for their peace terms in the wake of Romania's stunning break with Germany and her proclaimed decision to join forces with the allies.

A flood of reports from allied and axis sources on the continent made it clear that all three of Hitler's Balkan satellites were in the throes of a political upheaval almost identical to that which collapsed the central powers in 1918.

The German-UNG news agency announced that Hungary's Nazi puppet Premier Domsztojay had ordered the immediate dissolution of all political parties in that nation, and Swiss press dispatches to London said mutiny had broken out in the Hungarian army.

## EXPERT ANSWERS READER QUERIES

1. A reader of this column asks, "If a straight pole is made to extend through the earth and a rock dropped into it, would the rock go down to the center of the earth where gravitational pull is equal on all sides and it is in a state of air resistance?"

There are many things which cannot be tested, but from the well-known laws of force and motion, the results can be calculated by mathematics with complete confidence. A swinging clock pendulum does not stop where it reaches the lowest point in its path but elicits upbill on the opposite side. A weight suspended from the end of a long coiled spring will, if pulled down below its point of rest and released, oscillate up and down past the place where it will finally come to rest. For the same reason the rock in question would oscillate back and forth through the hole—much as a cork bobs in a tank of water.

As in the examples given, the rock would be moving with greatest speed at the midpoint, then gradually slow down until it came to rest momentarily at the top of the hole. It would then oscillate on opposite sides of the earth. Calculations indicate that the rock would take approximately 42 minutes to pass entirely through the earth and that it would at the far end be almost exactly the same speed.

Another asks, "Do your observations with telescopes indicate that the constellations of the present have made any change in the past?"

Actually, none. The grandeur of the heavens is so far removed from the tumults of the earth that stars and planets sensibly are undisturbed. Theoretically everything in space acts upon everything else, yet unchanging in France would have as little effect on a man on Mars as a mosquito rising from a swamp about the Pacific coast would have on an inhabitant of New York.

3. "What causes the blue-black curtain which gradually comes up in the eastern sky a little after sunrise?"

This is the twilight arch, or the shadow of the earth on its atmosphere. When the sun is just below the horizon, the light rays strike the upper edge of the arch is usually tinged with pink.
