Soviets Capture Ploesti, Chief Oil Area at Poesti

LONDON, Aug. 30 (AP)—Russian troops have captured Ploesti, Premier-Marshals Stalin announced tonight. "The whole Ploesti oil region is in the hands of the red army," Stalin declared in an order to the troops. "The great oil area that once supplied Germany with a great proportion of her oil needs was taken by troops of the second Ukrainian army led by Gen. Rodion Y. Malinovsky. They captured the town and main center of the Romanian oil industry, Ploesti," today, Stalin said, "by the occupation of Buzau and Ploesti the liberation of all the Romanian oil regions from the German invaders is completed."

GOODING STATE BUDGET \$222,241

BOISE, Aug. 29.—State appropriations budget requests of the Idaho state school for the deaf and blind at Gooding, the University of Idaho southern branch and the vocational rehabilitation division of education were approved today by the state board of education.

Request of the Lewiston school for the deaf and blind was approved at the 40th session. A budget recommendation of \$222,241 for the deaf and blind school was approved without change, as was a recommendation of \$25,000 for the vocational rehabilitation division.

DON'T PASS BUS, AUTOISTS WARNED

"If drivers realized that their own children might be aboard one, they hesitate before violating safety rules by passing school buses," Sheriff Warren W. Lowery declared yesterday.

With a few cases of violations already reported in the second week of the school year, Sheriff Lowery pointed out that he did not want to make arrests for passing school buses, but would if they continued.
