Trains Colide Head-on; 29 Dead, Mostly Sodders

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Sept. 14 (AP)—At least 29 persons were killed and about 65 injured early today in the collision of two Chicago and Eastern Illinois railroad passenger trains near Terre Haute. The trains, one the crack Dixie Flyer, southbound and the other a mail and express train, crashed head-on during a heavy fog.

Leave Tracks
The engine, tender, two baggage cars and the first two of three Pullmans on the Dixie Flyer left the track and slid up onto the roadway. All cars of the other train held the track.

Split Open

OCT. 31 GERMANY DEFEAT DEADLINE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14 (AP)—LONDON—The United States war effort had figured Oct. 31 as the "outside date" of German collapse brought from war production board officials last night the comment they were ready for the end of European hostilities—no matter how early victory occurs.

An Associated Press dispatch from London quoted a responsible non-military source as saying the Oct. 31 date had been pinpointed by the U.S. after consultation with military sources in working out plans to make a partial change from war to civilian production.

J. A. House, acting chairman of WPB, declined to comment on the report but other officials of the agency said they were prepared to order promptly the lifting of most government controls on industry, in accordance with the general conversion pattern announced last week.

Other government sources said army authorities recently satisfied their opposition to public conversion planning because of a feeling that the end of the war with Germany is reasonably close. They stated the army had found that public conversion planning and war effort would be hampered by a continued conversion of workers from war plants, as has been feared, and that it caused a drop in production of key weapons whose output was behind schedule.

The London source emphasized that the reported WPB war schedule called for no serious reorganization for carrying on the conflict in the Pacific. The Oct. 31 date likewise was said to be tentative because of possibility that a new treaty against Hitler could shorten the war by weeks, or that the date might bring out some new weapon which could delay the Allied victory.

Concluded with disclosure of the London report, Chairman Paul McCarty of the war manpower commission said American industry is prepared to put resources and technicians to work on planning for resumption of civilian production. He cautioned that the assessment of such experts must not interfere with urgent war output.

Federal Grip Hampers Idaho, Bottolfsen Tells GOP Here

Federal control of radio activities is keeping Idaho from "sitting on top of the world," Gov. C. A. Bottolfsen, Republican candidate for the U. S. senate, said here Wednesday night as he delivered a campaign address in the high school auditorium.

The session was sponsored by the Twin Falls County Young Republican club and Harold Bryner, Elmer, club president, presided. The governor was introduced by W. H. (Bill) Detweiler, Hazelton, the party's candidate for governor.

The governor professed his remarks by declaring that he was not criticizing President Roosevelt personally but rather "the philosophy of government that he represents."

Governor Bottolfsen said that "in our little state" the federal government has 3,000 employees against the state's 2,000 employees.

"Three federal employees are trying to do the work that heretofore we have been able to do very nicely through our own state government," Bottolfsen said. "If Uncle Sam would cut out the paternalistic feeling he has for us, and let us run our own affairs and pay our just share of federal expenses, we would be sitting on top of the world."

The governor declared if sent to Washington by the state's voters in November that "I will go there with the avowed purpose of taking steps necessary to reopen the business on Main street."

"I am interested in the Main streets of Idaho," he said, "and I want to see a change from the paternalistic philosophy which is absolutely destructive and unfriendly to business, especially to small business."

He declared he wanted to "give small business an opportunity to receive itself," and added: "I am not talking politics, but good common sense."

He said that "if you want a government depriving us of our citizenship, almost, and taking freedom from us, you'll vote Democratic." He continued by saying:

"On the other hand if you are anxious for a return to the fundamentalism that made the country great, you have no alternative but to vote the Republican ticket."

Concerning state business, the governor said:

"When Bill Detweiler enters the statehouse at Boise, he will find the state in the best financial condition in history."

Bottolfsen pointed out that under his administration state government cost per month has been reduced \$64,500 with "no loss in efficiency and cooperation."

He pledged himself to "leave no stone unturned" in his quest to attract attention to Idaho—the kind of attention "our state needs if it is to develop—and to aid in breaking off the shackles" of the new deal.

He expressed himself as being "impressed" with Dewey and Bricker when he met them in St. Louis recently, and said that their program was such that a cabinet member—perhaps the secretary of the interior—would be a man from the west, "instead of someone who has never been west of the Mississippi and who has never seen an irrigated field."

Bottolfsen plans to return to Twin Falls again between now and the Nov. 7 election date.

GAS FIRST FOR NEEDY-B DRIVER

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14 (AP).—When money becomes available, some time after gasoline, food, clothing, medicine and the necessities of life will be distributed to needy drivers.

"A" drivers can't expect more fuel in the gas tank until they are able to pay for it. The gas rationing board has decided that the "A" drivers must be able to pay for the gas they use.

And even after that, "A" rationing may not be increased for awhile, said the office of war information in the petroleum report.

OWI put it this way: Any increase in "A" rationing will depend on the general state of the automotive system of transportation.

The explanation of that is found in another part of the report. To the office of defense transportation is attributed the view that any increase in "A" rationing will be made only when automobiles are being junked. And the more cars that are junked, the heavier the burden on public transportation lines.

The scrapage rate now is between 10 and 15 percent a day, says OWI. This is only half the present rate in the past few months. There were about 20,000 new passenger cars in the country in 1943. Now there are about 25,000.

The OWI has increased public transportation in the future, but the OWI report says that the OWI will not want the scrapage rate increased any faster than necessary.

The police of the office of public administration has been to ration and to control the use of automobiles.

Though the OWI report doesn't say so, the OWI-barring clause in the rationing law would insist on distributing any increased supply of gas to "A" drivers.

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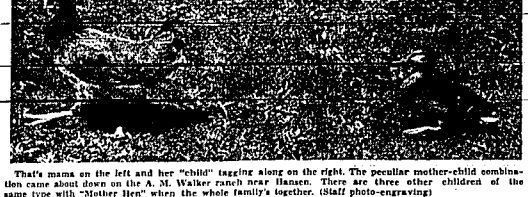

CLEVELAND, Sept. 14—A Harvard University study has shown that cancer kills more Americans than die in combat but that annual funds to fight it amount to less than one-tenth of the cost of a major football game.

Calling upon Americans to unite in "body wars" and devote as much energy to combating disease as they have to fighting human enemies, Dr. Harold H. Huggins, internationally known astronomer, addressed a group of 100 persons at the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

"The first 11 days of the invasion of Normandy took an average of 400 American lives a day," Huggins said. "In the last 10 days of the invasion, 12 million deaths in America from cancer."
