

LONDON, Sept. 14 (AP)—A dubious report broadcast by the French-controlled radio said today that the German army has broken through the Maginot line. One small group of soldiers was said to have retreated to the rear of the "last" elite guard and escaped.

Trains Colide Head-on: 29 Dead, Mostly Soldiers

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Sept. 14 (AP)—At least 29 persons were killed and about 65 injured early today in the collision of two Chicago and Eastern Illinois railroad passenger trains near Terre Haute. Usually all of the dead and injured were soldiers.

The trains, one the crack Blue Flyer, southbound and the other a mail and express train, crashed head-on during a heavy fog.

The engine, tender, two baggage cars and the first two of three Pullmans on the Blue Flyer left the track and piled up along the roadway. All cars of the other train were off the track.

The first two Pullmans of the Flyer carried only soldiers. A major who declined to give his name said all of the men were over-sea air force veterans. One of them was the purple heart decoration. He said they were on 30-day furloughs, after which they would have been taken to redistribution centers.

Split Open
The first Pullman, containing 39 men, split open like a melon. Some passengers were pinned in their seats, others were thrown out of the wreckage and some were killed. The wreckage was so deep at the time of the crash.

Through the wreckage and along the tracks police found decorations and air medals. Baggage of the soldiers and civilians was strewn about the wreckage. A Catholic priest rushed in to the wreckage, after which he went to the St. Anthony and Union hospitals giving first aid to everyone.

Both Wrecks Moving
The Blue Flyer pulled away to Miami, Fla., left Chicago at 10:15 p. m. Only passengers carried by the express were military employees. Both trains were moving at the time of the collision.

OCT. 31 GERMANY DEFEAT DEADLINE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14 (AP)—LONDON—Some of the members of the United States War effort had figured Oct. 31 as the "outside date" of German collapse brought from war production board officials last night in comment they were ready for master how early victory occurs.

An Associated Press dispatch from London quoted a responsible non-British source as saying the Oct. 31 date had been pinpointed by the War effort board officials with military sources in working out plans to make a partial change from war to civilian production.

J. A. House, former chairman of WPA, declined to comment on the report but other officials of the agency said they were prepared to order promptly the lifting of most government controls on industry, in accordance with the general conversion pattern announced last week.

Other government sources said army authorities recently criticized their opposition to public recovery plan planning because of a feeling that the end of the war with Germany is reasonably close. They stated the army had found that public recovery program and war effort contract cancellations had not caused mass evictions of workers from war plants, as had been feared, but did in cause a drop in production of key weapons whose output was behind schedule.

The London source emphasized that the reported WPA war schedule called for no scattering of requirements for carrying on the effort in the Pacific. The Oct. 31 date likewise was said to be tentative because of possibility that a new re-organization Hitler could shatter the war by weeks, or that the Nazis might bring out some new weapon which could delay the Allied victory.

Consistent with disclosure of the London report, Chairman Paul McCarran of the war manpower commission said the American industry is well ahead signal to put engineers and technicians to work on planning for resumption of civilian production. He cautioned that the assessment of such experts must not interfere with urgent war output.







Federal Grip Hampers Idaho, Bottolfsen Tells GOP Here

By O. A. KELKER

Federal control of radio activities is keeping Idaho from "sitting on top of the world," Gov. C. A. Bottolfsen, Republican candidate for the U. S. senate, said here Wednesday night as he delivered a campaign address in the high school auditorium.

The session was sponsored by the Twin Falls County Young Republican club and Harold A. Bryner, club president, presided. The governor was introduced by W. H. (Bill) Detweiler, Hazelton, the party's candidate for governor.

The governor professed his remarks by declaring that he was not criticizing President Roosevelt personally but rather "the philosophy of Roosevelt that he represents."

Gov. Bottolfsen said that "in our little state" the federal government has 6,000 employees against the state's 2,000 employees.

"These federal employees are trying to do the work that heretofore we have been able to do very nicely through our own government," Bottolfsen said. "If Uncle Sam would cut out the paternalistic hand he has for us, and let us run our own affairs and pay our just share of federal expenses, we would be sitting on top of the world."

The governor declared if sent to Washington by the state's voters in November that "I will go there with the avowed purpose of taking the necessary to reopen the business on Main street."

"I am interested in the Main streets of Idaho," he said, "and I want to see a change from the present philosophy which is absolutely destructive and unfriendly to business, especially to small business."

He declared he wanted to "give small business an opportunity to receive itself," and added: "I am not talking politics, but good common sense."

He said that "if you want a government depriving us of our citizenship, almost, and taking freedom from us, you'll vote Democratic." He continued by saying: "I am not anxious for a return to the fundamentalism that made our country great, you have no alternative but to vote the Republican ticket."

Concluding his address, the governor said: "When Bill Detweiler enters the statehouse at Boise, he will find the state in the best financial condition in history."

Bottolfsen pointed out that under his administration state government expenditures per month has been reduced \$64,200 with no loss in efficiency and cooperation."

He pledged himself to "leave no stone unturned" in his quest to attract attention to Idaho—the kind of attention "our state needs if it is to develop into a real business center."

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
