Kin of Far East Captives Told They Will Get Direct Cables

Within a few weeks, next of kin of American prisoners being held by the Japanese in military and civilian camps in the far east, may expect to receive cablegrams from their captives.

This encouraging information was given an attentive audience by Mrs. Claude B. Mickelwait, Washington, D. C., volunteer Red Cross worker, in an address given at the information at the Idaho Power auditorium Thursday night.

"The cables have not yet set up making this communication possible. We hope that the cablegrams will start coming through in the next few weeks," Mrs. Mickelwait said.

Kin of Prisoners Present Most of the men and women in the audience were relatives of men held as prisoners of war or reported missing in action, both in the European and far east theaters of war. Several others were relatives of civilian internees in the far east.

"As far as the Red Cross is concerned, none of these internees are forgotten people," she declared. "Mrs. Mickelwait's speaking tour is strictly on a volunteer basis. She receives no salary from the Red Cross, and requests the work in which she is vitally interested."

Mr. and Mrs. Col. Claude B. Mickelwait, judge advocate at General Omar Bradley's staff now in Europe, and Mrs. Mickelwait, former resident of Twin Falls, who has been affiliated with the army since 1917, recently was awarded the Legion of Merit. Their three sons are also serving in the armed forces.

Stratford Picture Mrs. Mickelwait presented a brilliant picture of what the Red Cross is doing for prisoners of war, being done by the International Red Cross for prisoners of war in Germany, under the provisions of the Geneva treaty, as well as giving them a not-to-be-forgotten account of conditions in Japanese camps, as they have been restricted by the Red Cross.

She was introduced by Vivian Kimbrough, Boise, state representative of the American Red Cross. Earlier in the day, Twin Falls Red Cross chapter met at a luncheon at the Park hotel, sponsored by Mrs. Helen Bailey, executive secretary of the chapter.

The three major concerns of prisoners of war, as told by Mrs. Mickelwait, are mail, food, and clothing. She described in detail the different types of food packages being sent to European camps by the Red Cross.

Parade Supplement Food The food parcels supplement the rations supplied by the Japanese. The food is distributed in different types of food packages being sent to European camps by the Red Cross.

Seed packages containing 100 varieties of vegetables, fruit, flowers, seeds and sundries, are also being sent to prisoners, the vegetables to vary the monotony of prison fare; the flowers to remind them of home and the time they will return to America.

As soon as next-of-kin of prisoners in the European war zone receive the proper labels from the International Red Cross, they can send one package each month. Mrs. Mickelwait explained.

Return of Prisoners in US Far East Mrs. Mickelwait said that she did not have the same privilege because of the difficulty of transporting packages from the United States to the far east.

Prepared cake and bread mixes, bouillon cubes, small name labels, vitamin and milk tablets, small cooking utensils of unbreakable material, scented after-shave powder in unbreakable containers, and other necessities are included in the packages.

Miss Mickelwait emphasized, cautioning relatives of men in European camps to write only once a week, so that a "bottle-neck" of mail can be avoided.

Outgoing mail from far east camps is more reduced and less frequent, because the communications in each camp limits the amount of mail that can be sent.

Marine Seeking Parents of Buddy Killed in Pacific

A marine wounded on a Pacific island was seeking today to find the parents of a comrade who was killed on the same island.

The marine, now at the naval convalescent hospital at San Valley, asked the help of the Twin Falls Red Cross in locating the parents of his friend, Erickson (or Elfron). He told the Red Cross that since his friend was not completely conscious when private Polk was dying, he could remember his comrade's name in full.

But because the dying youth kept repeating "Twin Falls," and asked the driver to take a message to his parents, the survivor assumed that the dead boy was from Twin Falls.

Red Cross officials asked any Marine Valley family named Erickson or Elfron, and having a son in the 10th marine, to contact the Twin Falls office at once.

Mail that each prisoner can send. "We will find out from now on the European prison camps will be more crowded, because of the planned bombing by the German communication and transportation facilities, it will not be easy to move prisoners as in the past," Mrs. Mickelwait reminded her audience.

"But remember that when we bomb transportation supplies, we are helping ultimate victory soon, and are bringing the men home that much sooner."

She said that while plans have been made to bring our prisoners safely out of Germany, once the war in the east is ended.
