## MEN IN INDUSTRY GIVEN WAR JOLT

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16 (AP)—Draft-age men in industry were told today to "meet their war responsibilities" on the production front, or face swift induction.

Translating the government's recent "produce or fight" edict into "you can" and "you can't" regulations, selective service predicted that a much larger proportion of men in the 25-37 age group will be inducted after Feb. 1.

The war isn't a young man's war but everybody's war, said a selective service memorandum last night to local draft boards. The critical situation requires, it added, that civilians remain in war-supporting industries or obtain war-supporting employment if not already so engaged.

Local boards were directed to fill calls for the armed forces by reclassification as it becomes necessary of men from the older groups. The order does not add up to an outright "freeze" in the present jobs of occupationally deferred workers in the 26 through 37 bracket. However, it might well mean unless they can show that a change would promote the war effort.

This means that a worker who changes jobs without permission runs the risk of losing the occupational deferment classification, as selective service phrased it. Actually, he's inviting induction.

Local boards were directed to place a "mild" stricter interpretation on the rules for occupational deferment.

As of Nov. 1, 426,000 registrants were classified in 2-A and 2-B (deferred occupational) and 1-A (deferred military). This is the first time since September, 1943, that the number of 1-A's had dipped below a million.

Private Driessel will have been in the service three years next April, has been overseas two and a half years and has never been home of furlough.

He took part in the invasion of north Africa and island of Italy. He is now in France. He wears the combat conduct medal and the campaign pin from the Sicily invasion. While in Africa he was a cousin, Sgt. Clifford Driessel, also a Jerome youth. He also visited for sometime with Charles L. L. Jerome, who has been killed.

**Taxes in Lincoln Come in Briskly**  
SHOSHONE, Dec. 16.—Lincoln county taxes are being paid more briskly than in previous years, according to County Treasurer Myron Johnson.

Fully \$77,000 has now been taken in on the real property taxes. Deadline is Dec. 23 for the first half of the current year's taxes; after that date a two per cent penalty will be put on and eight per cent interest then will accrue on the unpaid tax.

The second half payment must be made in June.

Personal property taxes, Treasurer Johnson explained, are payable in full with no provision by law for partial payments. Penalty is the same as on real estate taxes.

Due to date in addition to the big general payments, the county expects a \$30,000 check from the Union Pacific railroad, which is obligated to pay about 60 per cent of the total tax in Lincoln county.

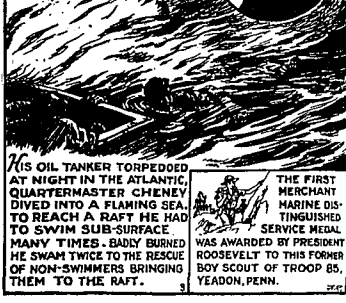

**Looking Things Over**  
With J. R. CRAWFORD

Much has been said and written about the shortage of ammunition on the European battle front, most of which was gunpowder, and some was dollars. There is no attempt to sneer at the money, but the United States and the fellows who are making the ammunition and munition is not the healthiest job on earth. In fact it is much better, though I question the effect on the health, to pound out a submachine gun every day in which everybody connected with the administration, or anyone who supports the administration, is vilified. That a column, the sole purpose of which is to smear, under a ready-made evidence of a ulterior motive of the purchasing agent, at least to me, is a little bit of a puzzle. General Eisenhower comes forth with the statement that there is no shortage of munition, and the shortage is the shortage alone mentioned, but that the size of the task was unestimated and the schedule was upset. I wonder if Pegler will be gracious enough to admit that he was mistaken.

**Better Fortified**  
Another thing that is being found out is that the Germans were better fortified within the reich than we are. I am sure that the Germans had a great deal of the war material, or even most of this work was done by forced labor, taken from the occupied countries, and did not interfere with the war effort of the Germans in the field. It is said that much of the war material is underground and is almost impenetrable to attack from the air. If this is so, there is no doubt a large supply of material, stored in these underground places, and the task of overcoming Germany may be harder than anyone anticipated. Certainly there is no doubt that they will cut up without a fight.

I still feel that advertising the severity of the peace treaty was a mistake, bolstering the morale of the Germans and making them feel that in the defense of the reich it was hard to appeal to the youth of a country, who seem to be a bit more patriotic than some of the older folks. At any event, the youngsters are putting up a fight, and many would have thought impossible after five years of grueling war, and the cost to tax in men and material is going to be costly.

**Bound to Er**  
That mistakes were made, goes without saying. Anybody who tries to do anything, is bound to err somewhere along the line. But to continually harp on them and say that all one can do is to wait, is to give confidence in our war efforts or to induce men to do their best, are plans on the far side of the moon.

If anybody believes Pegler's story, he would be discouraged from trying to do anything. It is a deliberate destructive, and the wide circulation could be of more detriment to the nation than the CIO, the IAG, the threat of communism, or any other of the things he howls so long and loudly about.

The world is in a state of upheaval, socially, and it takes wise counsel to prevent widespread and permanent injury to our social structure. It seems that every group is trying to do by force what can never be permanently accomplished by force, that is make the world good. We are about to enter the Christmas holiday season, during which we will celebrate the end of what with hilarity and know-nothing of various types.

Let's be sober. This year, we might well be a little more sober than usual, with civilians loitering along the streets, a chance that might easily engulf us all. Maybe we could see some good about us that we might do with great amount of money that will be given to us.
