NAZIS' 40-FOOT JAPANESE BALLOON FOUND IN MONTANA

SUPERFORTRESS ARMADA BOMBS JAP AIR CENTER

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—One hundred Superfortresses delivered the first heavy attack in nine days on Japan's aircraft center at Nagoya today and American fighters planes swept over a wide area of central and southern Luzon from 145 miles of Manila.

The new assault on Nagoya—an attempt to deal an eventual knockout punch to Japan's aircraft production—was made by huge B-29s dropping individual bomb loads hundreds of pounds heavier than ever before.

The Superfortresses lashed Nagoya and other targets on Japan's main island of Honshu almost two and a half hours in daylight.

The attack said the B-29s from Saipan bases also swept over Shikoku and Osaka, 80 miles southeast, and southwest respectively from Nagoya.

Operations of fighter planes from Mindoro only six days after American troops landed on the island was disclosed in a communiqué from Gen. Douglas MacArthur's headquarters.

The new airfield, from which U. S. planes will cover the next phase of the American liberation of the Philippines, were put into operation yesterday.

SHOSHONE, Dec. 22.—Total number of animals and the amount of wool shorn, plus the amount paid the farmers during the past year from the long sheep and wool pool has been recorded by County Agent Milton Weston.

Beet Growers Get Nearly a Million

BURLEY, Dec. 22 (Special).—Cassia and Minidoka beet growers received almost \$1,000,000 in payment for this fall's sugar beet crop, announced R. O. Hatch, manager of the Rupert-Paul-Burley area for Amalgamated Sugar company.

The payments went out Nov. 15, Nov. 25 and Dec. 5, and totaled \$981,352.14 in all.

Cassia county beet growers received \$409,917.01 for 41,615.04 tons of beets.

Minidoka growers received \$571,445.73 for 58,014.19 tons.

This last payment almost fully pays farmers for the 1944 crop and something between now and June a government subsidy check will be distributed, Hatch states.

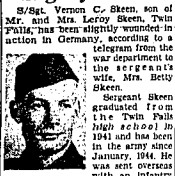

"Our soldiers are not dancing their way through this war, and it's time the people over here realized it," he told a reporter. "Ammunition is being rationed to so many rounds a day on the western and Italian fronts. The fifth army has only one eight-inch gun on the entire Italian front."

Shafter expressed belief the people at home have too rosy an outlook on the war because there has been "too strict a censorship of news overseas, while on this side the war department has neglected to give proper information."

He has recommended to Secretary Stimson that the war department issue a daily communiqué telling the people here the exact information they should have.
