NAZI DRIVE GAINS GROUND

Nazis Land in Maine; Hoover Warns of Spies

NEW YORK, Jan. 2 (AP)—A desperate third Nazi attempt to send saboteurs ashore on the east coast had been thwarted today, the FBI said, with the arrest of two men, one an American who landed by U-boat Nov. 29 near a lonely Maine fishing village.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover said the men, arrested several days ago in the New York area, came ashore in a rubber boat at night after the German submarine had lain off the Maine coast for a week.

The men, Hoover said, carried \$60,000 in American money, automatic pistols, compass, camera, secret keys and a variety of draft papers and discharges from the navy.

Hoover identified the alleged espionage agents as William Curtis Colepaugh, 26, a United States citizen of Niagara Falls, N. Y., and Erich Gimpel, 35, a German who was a radio engineer in South America.

The landing was made at Hancock on the Frenchman's bay, Maine, Hoover said, adding that the men had supplied a full story of their activities since coming ashore.

Hoover said the two men sailed from Kiel, Germany, in U-boat 123 on Sept. 26. The trip across the Atlantic took 54 days, he added, as the submarine was in the water 177 hours and surfaced only at night.

The FBI chief said he was certain the other agents landed. The men had forged Connecticut birth certificates, obtained American registration and classification cards and navy discharge papers.

Hoover said one of the purposes of the men was to frequent taverns where they might obtain information for transmission to Germany.

Although Hoover declined to say how the FBI learned of the men's activities, Deputy Sheriff Dana McDonald of Hancock, Pa., said the 17-year-old man, Harvard, spotted the men walking near his home. He became suspicious and reported the matter to the FBI.

Commenting on the arrests and recent discoveries of Japanese balloons in Oregon and Montana, Hoover said that might have carried spies instead of explosives, Hoover declared that there were evidence of an explosion at the latter place.

Enemy Springs Into Fresh Activity From Bitch to the Rhine

PARIS, Jan. 2 (AP)—Supreme headquarters said today that a new German attack in the Bitch area of France had gained a mile and a half, but was continuing, with enemy forces now active all the way from Bitch to the Rhine.

Gordon Fraser of the Blue network said the spearhead of the attack, which burst into action before daybreak, seemed to be aimed at Wulterdingen, about 13 miles southeast of Saarbrücken.

The Germans are pulling out of the western half of the Ardennes salient at top speed today after American third army forces crushed a naz counter-attack on Bastogne and wheeled north into the sagging enemy flank on a front of 15 miles.

Apparently alarmed by the growing threat of Lieut.-Gen. George S. Patton's third army assault on their southern flank, the nazis were believed gathering their crack panzer units in the center of the Ardennes in preparation for a new attempt to break through the American ring—perhaps north toward Lige and Antwerp or south toward Bastogne's troops.

Coincident with the reported German withdrawal in the Ardennes, supreme headquarters announced a sudden flare-up of enemy activity on both sides of the focal battleground.

Nazi patrols stabbed aggressively at the American and British lines to the north while considerably stronger enemy forces counter-attacked on the U.S. seventh army front along the Rhine plain in a pattern very similar to the opening stage of the Ardennes offensive.

DEATHS IN UTAH WRECK TOTAL 48, 76 ARE INJURED

OGDEN, Utah, Jan. 2 (AP)—Traffic was resumed today over the Southern Pacific following the worst wreck in western railroad history, early Sunday, in which 48 persons were killed and 76 injured, many of them soldiers.

The disaster occurred when a mail train derailed and plunged into the rear of the Southern Pacific's Pacific Limited, 18 miles west of here.

Plans are being made for an autopsy on the body of Eugene McDonald of the second train. The body of the second train's engineer, Alvin G. Corcoran, 47-year-old, was also recovered.

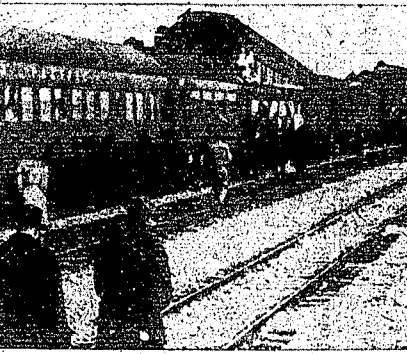

4-F Draft for Essential War Work Asked

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—An administration request for new laws to mobilize and conserve manpower, including a draft of 4-Fs for essential war work, faced its 70th congress today on the eve of its opening session.

The request, together with other recommendations to bolster the war effort on the home front, was made by the War Relocation and Recovery Director James P. Byrnes in a 2,000-word report to new congress members which began his two-year experience at noon tomorrow.

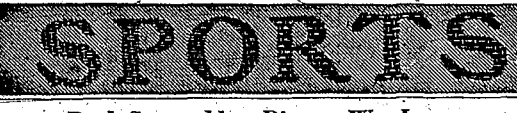
