**NEW TASK FORCE CUTS ITS WAY TO HIT PHILIPPINES**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4 (AP)—Hundreds of carrier planes and Superforts smashed for the second successive day in a transport convoy and took forces cut through Philippine waters to effect new landings. Tokyo reported 900 sorties in two days against Formosa on the heels of a blazing B-29 raid on homeland industries and expansion of the American spearhead in the Philippines by a doubling landing on Iloilo, Iloilo.

### FARM PRICES IN IDAHO INCREASE

BOISE, Jan. 4 (AP)—Idaho's farm price index has advanced four points since Nov. 15 to 191 per cent of parity, according to the U. S. department of agriculture.

Fruit and vegetable and animal listings both advanced nine points, showing the largest gains. During a corresponding period last year an average loss of one point was recorded.

Apples were listed 10 cents a bushel higher, potatoes five cents higher, cattle were up to cents per hundredweight, and lambs up 50 cents per hundredweight, during the period.

Average prices quoted are: Wheat \$1.25, up .01; corn \$1.20, unchanged; oats \$1.00, up .01; apples \$2.40; potatoes \$1.15, up .05 (all bushels); dry \$1.40 ton, unchanged; alfalfa seed \$24.40 bushel, up .20; red clover seed \$19.50 bushel, unchanged; hogs \$13.70 cwt., unchanged; beef cattle \$10.70 cwt., up .01; real cattle \$11.50, up .20; sheep \$3.10 cwt., up .50; hams \$12.80, up .20; butter 47, down .01; butterfat 21 pound, unchanged; whole milk \$3.00 per cwt., unchanged; live chickens 22 pound, up .001; eggs 47 dozen, unchanged; wool \$1.00 pound, unchanged; milk cows \$101 head, unchanged.
