

WIPONENSE LOSE THIRD LARGEST POST IN BURMA

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5 (UP)—The Pacific offensive blazed from the Asiatic continent to the Japanese homeland today, as British troops invaded and occupied the port of Myittha in Burma and one or more American convoys, according to Tokyo, sailed through the Philippines before invasion-marked Luzon, where U. S. warplanes sank another 35 Japanese ships.

Enemy broadcasts reported that four B-29 Superfortresses from the Mariana made nuisance raids on the Japanese islands of Kyushu and the other two apparently on reconnaissance.

The southeast Asia command sent the largest combined force ever launched against the Asiatic continent to seize Akyab, Burma's largest island, in opposition.

The Japanese said the convoys landed in the vicinity of Myittha, on the western coast of Burma, southeast of Mandalay.

Confidentially, Admiral Chester W. Nimitz said that carrier-based planes hit Formosa islands for the second time today.

The Japanese carried out five raids today on the island of Myittha, and caused some damage.

Canadian forces are reported to have landed on the coast of the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

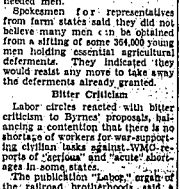

A DAY IN A VIRGINIA PLANTER'S LIFE (1112)

All the Randall family except Lucy, the eldest daughter, was at the breakfast table when Swain joined them.
