FDR Says Start Now Preparing 60 Million Jobs

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9 (AP)—President Roosevelt, reminding congress that there will be need for 60,000,000 jobs after the war, called today for an immediate start toward an adequate postwar social and economic program.

He emphasized in his fiscal 1946 budget message that full employment constitutes part of this country's stake in postwar world stability and prosperity and that other nations are fully conscious of that international cooperation cannot succeed unless the United States is prosperous.

Roosevelt proposed a \$338,812,000 general public works program. Most of the money would be spent by the army corps of engineers, the veterans' administration, the federal works agency and the department of interior.

Of this proposed total, only \$200,000,000 is to be spent in newly-appropriated funds. The remainder would come from previously-appropriated but unspent money.

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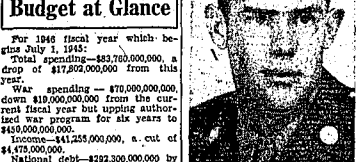

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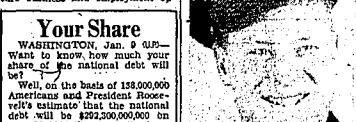

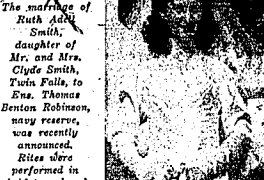

TWIN FALLS, WAC CHEERS WOUNDED

ALLIED FORCE HEADQUARTERS, Wake Island, assigned to clerical jobs in Italy helped to make it a cheery Christmas for sick and wounded soldiers in American and Canadian hospitals near their stations by letting the soldiers on Christmas day and distributing colorfully wrapped gifts.

Many of the WACs, like staff Sgt. Charles S. Landry, 128 Fifth avenue north, Twin Falls, Idaho, are constant visitors to the Canadian hospital and often bring gifts of candy and cigarettes to the soldiers.

Staff Lt. Landry worked on Christmas day and wasn't able to visit the hospital but she is well known among the Canadian soldiers and all asked about her.

To the Canadian soldiers, the visit of the American women meant more than a mere Christmas call. Very few Canadian women are stationed near them and it was heartwarming to them to know that they were remembered during the Christmas season.

And to the American soldiers, the visit of their sister soldiers was like a brief furlough at home. If they found someone from their hometown, they would let them depart until they had remitted about "good old" Colorado, Georgia, or Wisconsin.

For weeks the WACs had saved their candy and cigarette rations as well as extra candy and cake parcels from home, and a few nights before Christmas they wrapped each gift individually to present to the American and Canadian soldiers.

Corporal Laycock will leave Jan. 14 or 15 to report Jan. 17 at Santa Barbara, Calif., for reassignment. Private Laycock will leave about the same time to report at Camp Joseph T. Robinson. Pfc. Brown will leave on Jan. 20 to report at Wright field. In Hansen they are visiting their mother, Mrs. Thelma F. Laycock and Pfc. Brown's son, Stanley Brown.

BRAVERY-MEDAL TO SGT. FRAZIER

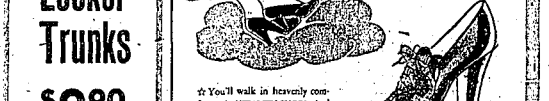
