FDR Says Start **Now Preparing 60 Million Jobs**

OU INLINOID JOOSS WASHINGTON, Jan. 6 UED-Fresident Rosevelt, remind-ing congress that there will be need for 6,000.000 jobs after the war, called today for an immediate start toward an adeguate postwar social and economic program. He emphasized in his fiscal 1946 budget message that full employment constitutes, part of this country's stake in postwar world stability and prosperity and that other nations are fully couscius "that international cooperation cannot succeed unless the United States is prosperous." Rosevelt proposed a 5309,812,000 general public works program. Most of the money would be spent by the army oracia and the department of interior. 
