Scores in the rifle match are as follows: Roberts, 384; J. O. Clark, 365; Ralph Gilme, 363; L. Gillespie, 359, and Clarence Peterson, 353.

Scores in the match were "out of a possible 400 shots," and were fired in three positions, kneeling, standing and prone. Distance of the range is 200 feet.

STRENGTH AND PRESTIGE Since the invasion of Normandy the United States has born the brunt of the war. The liberation of France, the invasion of Germany and the halting of Rundstedt's counteroffensive have been the work of our boys fighting almost alone in the East. East, where Mountbatten's long-promised operations have never started.

Yet at this same time our political prestige has declined badly. Russia and Britain have gone their way in redesigning Europe by the old, war-breeding patterns. And lately American correspondents in London have reported a Russian-American friendship on the other side of the Atlantic.

According to them, the English people are beginning to disapprove our war contribution, and are inclined to give credit to the Russian existence as reason why no American voice should be raised in criticism of British policy.

The influential English magazine, The Economist, has advocated British playing the game of European politics according to Russian rules rather than gambling on promises of American postwar collaboration. It has spoken scornfully of our "lofty, moral grandeur" and our "unwillingness to get down in the dust of the arena."

Russian popular opinion is, of course, the government's, and favorable toward American. Russian aims and operations coincide. It is a great misfortune that American influence should be deteriorating at a time when American strength and effort are at their peak. For it is most unlikely that with the Russian effort, we shall command from our allies anything like the respect that is potentially ours today.

Part of this deterioration seems to result from the attitude of the Russian quarters to disclose the facts to excuse their own actions. There can be no serious doubt of this country's eager willingness to collaborate in a new international security organization.

Our "lofty, moral generalities" have been necessary. But it is true that our government has avoided "the dust of the arena" too long. Foreigners and our own people are interested in domestic interests before the November elections, though it provided a shining example of democratic freedom in wartime, injured the cause of freedom.

During the campaign, policies contrary to our desires and beliefs took shape in Europe. And when the new secretary of state finally made a tentative move to restate, the new map had hardened in the mud. There was nothing for us to do then that would have damaged allied military unity.

Whether we like them or not, present arrangements are being made between the Balkans and the Baltic States and Italy will have to be accepted. But at least we may hope that our government will take no more time, while we are still in the mud, to make more specific policies and in taking the lead to continue the course that was charted at Dumbarton Oaks.

"WRITTEN IN HISTORY" "We have stopped cold everything that has been thrown at us from the north, east, south and west," said the Christmas edition of the Idaho Herald, "and the entrenched American outfit at Bastogne. How effectively this was done will be written in history, not alone in the history of our glorious units, but in the history of the world."

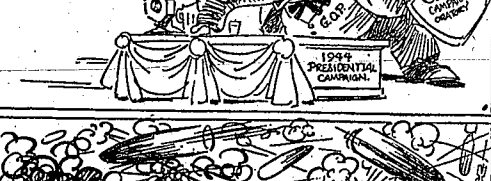

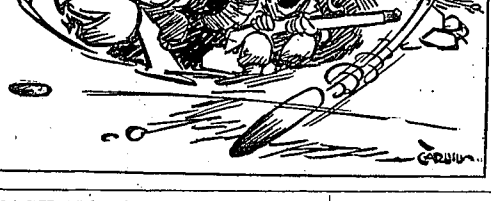

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117 AT MEETING OF CREDIT GROUP

GOODING, Jan. 11.—More than 100 stockholders of the Idaho Production and Distribution Credit Association met yesterday in Fynn's banquet hall for their 11th annual meeting. There were 117 in attendance. George L. Watt, vice-president of the association, who presided in the absence of A. L. Hanke, president, described the progress which has been made in membership and also told of the increase in the volume of loans from the time of the organization of the association in 1934.

Services held 8:30. H. Kemp Spokane, Wash., field man for the production credit association, Spokane, pointed out that production credit served the need for short term credit to farmers and stockmen. 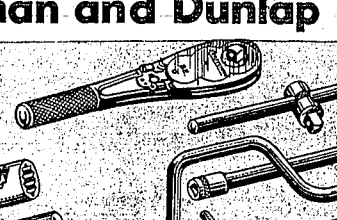

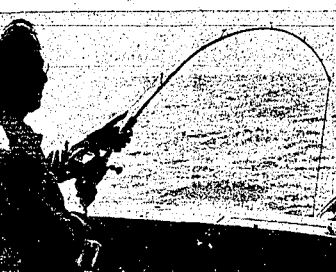

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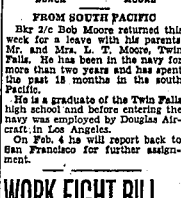

# The Way Our People Lived

**WHEN NEW YORK WAS YOUNG**

In 1790 the home of Maj. Daniel Lawrence, a sturdy house of Dutch pattern, stood on William street, near the corner of Wall, New York, as quiet as a country town in those days. There were shade trees about the place, and the air was sweet, during the summer nights the air was full of the chirping of katydids and the hum of cicadas. Awakened in the morning by the piping of birds.

Behind the Lawrence house, and belonging to it, there was a garden, an orchard and a stable, a stable for a making cider. A dovecote and a dozen beehives were just beyond the garden. It was a quiet place, with nothing to break the silence but the loud talk of the servants in the kitchen and the clatter of plates. Now and then Miss Lawrence or her daughter, Elizabeth played the spinet in the sitting room and his tinkling notes ran upstairs through the air.

The family had a part in the social life of the town, and occasionally the house was full of company. Then the chatter of old-fashioned women and the masculine jawbreaker ran all over the house and garden.

**EDEN**

Though it stood almost in the center of the city of New York the Lawrence place had a rural air. Every day the cows were driven through the streets to a common pasture which was a short distance west of Broadway, and were milked in the relation in the morning. There was always work to be done in the garden, the stables and the orchard, and the women were to be gathered, horses to be curried, and the chickens to be tended, and the ground cleared of weeds.

Take all other streets in this colonial town, William street—despite a muddy or dusty road—depending on the state of the weather—and there was no alternative, nor was there a street-cleaning department in the town administration. But every Friday the year round the streets had to be cleaned by the householders in the afternoon, and into the river. Each resident cleaned only that part of the street which lay in front of his house.

The street lighting was done by the light from a lantern before his residence, and six of his neighbors shared with him the expense of keeping the light burning.

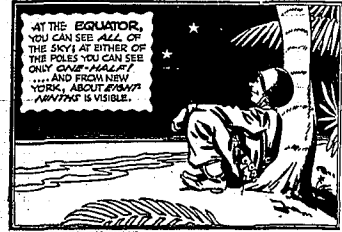
The Lawrence house was nearly 80 years old. Major Lawrence's father had built it in 1705, and the major had lived in it all his life. It was as rigidly rectangular as a barn, without any projecting windows, or architectural frills of any kind. But the windows were porticoed, and the bricks used in building it were of various colors, such as purple, brown, blue and red, arranged in curious designs. This decorative brick gave the house a certain air of lightness and charm.

Following the Dutch fashion, one of the narrow ends of the house faced the street, and was right on the thoroughfare. Before the front door there was a little porch called a stoop, a word which comes from the Dutch stoep.

On warm summer evenings it was the custom for everyone to sit on the stoop, and the street had a lively appearance with all the rickety front-door parties laughing and singing, and talking and smoking.

On the ground floor the house had four rooms—parlor, dining room, library and kitchen. Above on the second floor, there were six bed-
