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CASSIA REAPERS WELL IN CROPS

Improvement in the grain, better sugar beet and hay crops of Cassia county are among the major activities of farmers, according to the annual report of George W. Clelland, county agent.

Not only are these crops a great source of cash income, but they are crops that work into a good rotation program for improving farm lands and make for a better economic farming system, he points out.

The production of small grains has increased in Cassia county. In 1944 there were more acres of wheat planted than has been planned for 1945. Over 8,000 acres of new land were broken up in the last two years in the drylands of the county. This new crop land is mostly around the irrigated and flood lands and will be planted in wheat and barley.

Total acreage of wheat in Cassia in 1944 was 20,975 acres, and an additional 15,000 acres in barley and oats.

The wheat yield was often as high as 90 bushels per acre on the irrigated farms, and 60 bushels per acre on the dryland farms was especially good, often going 30 bushels to the acre.

Harvesting of the crops is well advanced. The yield of wheat is good and pure varieties. Last year farmers' equity purchased 4,000 pounds of bannock oats and 4,000 pounds of lamont oats and 6,000 pounds of bannock oats and 6,000 pounds of lamont oats.

The bean crop is growing in importance in this area. In 1944 the crop was the largest on record, with 11,000 acres. The yield was 11,000 bushels, in part, to the government's demand for more beans and the need to create more profitable farm labor. Although the acreage was up, the yield fell for several years. Certain fields are certified for the crop and are free of insect pests. The program was so successful that farmers will be able to secure more seed this year.

Milnerette 4-H Club Makes Splendid Win-War Showing

The following feature is taken from the annual report of County Agent George Cleveland, dated Dec. 10, 1944, and is called "A 4-H Club That Did Its Part."

One of the outstanding examples of what a 4-H club can do to help win the war is shown by the 1944 record of the Milnerette 4-H club. This club was led by Mrs. J. E. Norman, who is a high school senior, and the club members included the following girls and their mothers: Betty Johnson, Betty Bradshaw, Dorothy Simpson, Eleanor Bradshaw, Carol Dickinson, Betty Stephenson, LeVina, Fernway, Betty Jean Vassant and LeVina Newman.

All of these girls live in the Milnerette community and carry on the regular work of the average 4-H club farm girl. Their 1944 4-H achievements, which are above average, is outstanding. These girls organized their club in the fall of 1943 and carried 4-H club work through the entire year. They worked during the winter months on the following projects: Clothing, health, nutrition and war activities.

By the time the year was out in the spring, most of the work was done on their winter projects, and the girls enrolled in new summer work. These projects were victory gardening, canning, war activities, fire, stock, crops. The value of their war bond campaign sale was seen when they turned in \$1,000 in bonds during the fifth war loan drive. In the sixth war loan drive these girls sold more than \$1,000 in bonds. They prepared 168 meals during the summer. They made 45 articles of clothing; they took care of babies and the sick; they led in community recreation; they made a community farm fire hazard check-up, besides growing and processing much food. They worked 450 hours in war activities. They raised 22 chickens, 80 chickens, eggs, sheep,

Big Timber Stand Will Be Utilized

HAYLEY, Jan. 12.—During November an intensive timber survey was made on a block of merchantable timber situated on Grouse creek in the western portion of the Sawtooth national forest. Although the computation of volumes of merchantable timber to be made available for cutting within the next few years has not been completed, the figure will exceed 30 million feet, board measure.

The Grouse creek area lies just east of Prisco Hot Springs about midway between the towns of Prisco and Hayden. The Sawtooth national forest completed the construction of a four-mile timber road in the area in 1943. The plan is to make this excellent block of virgin ponderosa pine and Douglas fir timber readily accessible so that it could be utilized in the war effort. The bulk of the timber as opened up by this road offers an excellent logging chance. Timber will be marked in accordance with forest service standard cutting policies and conditions in order to insure a sustained yield, which requires the planting of new trees to replace growing trees for future crops.

BITTER LUZON FIGHTING AHEAD

While we made a most auspicious beginning of the Luzon invasion and the final thrust continues so far as appears from news dispatches, which are lagging because of security considerations, it is only the preparation for some of the most bitter fighting of the whole Pacific war.

The Secretary of Defense remarks, although the headlines make much of the fighting, that only the beginning is showing. We shall see more of those things which are the sacrifices by the Japanese soldier.

Bodies Counted

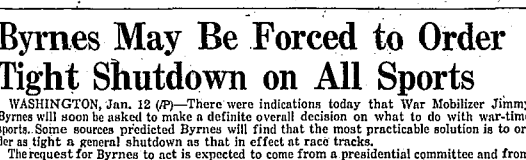

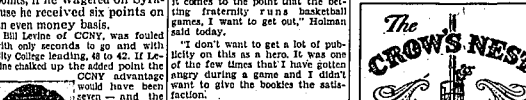

WHEN NEW YORK WAS YOUNG

It snowed heavily on the night of the fourth day of December of the year 1780. On the morning of the fifth, Major Lawrence walked to his office.

He wore a plum-colored sequent coat which reached to his knees and flared out from the waist downward. His knee breeches were of dark yellow silk with flowery designs on them. There were fur ruffles on his shirt front and at his wrists. He wore a three-cornered hat with a high crown and a feather, buckled around his waist, beneath his coat. As a protection from the weather he carried over his shoulders a white or silver.

The major was an important, he had correspondents in the West Indies, and on the African coast. From the islands of the West Indies came molasses to be made into rum, raw sugar, and various tropical fruits. From the coast of Africa his ship brought slaves—not to New York, but to South Carolina and to that period black slaves had become so numerous in New York that their prices had collapsed and the trade in them was no longer profitable.

He did not have much to do at his place of business on this snowy day, so he returned home shortly after noon and had his dinner. As soon as the meal was over he went into his study, having no visitor, he was not to be disturbed by anyone, as he had much work to do. He remembered, however, that on the fifth of the month, so he turned to Dykiss, his man servant, and said, "This does not apply to Miss Fraser, if she comes bring her in at once."

The major had no work to do in the library and Dykiss young ascension for two or three attendants a week on the pretense of attending to the personal affairs was one of the polite fictions of the household. It was accustomed to spend these quiet afternoons in pipe smoking or in reading, or in playing solitaire. Sometimes he would sit on the sofa.

In the course of the afternoon the major wrote a great deal of drinking.

On this windy day a fire of cedar logs blazed in the huge fireplace. In that era grates were unknown, so the fire was laid directly on the square stones that formed the surface of the hearth. Above the fireplace there ran across the chimney a thick, heavy mantle. At each end of it stood a candle in a silver candlestick.

The major and his wife had a handsome and valuable collection of silverware which they kept in a locked closet on the second floor. In colonial times silver did not exist in America, and the unexcused absence of silverware in the homes of the well-to-do took the place of bank accounts. It could always be turned into money quickly.

Besides the bookcases filled with solemn-looking tomes the library contained the major's desk, a mahogany table, a sofa covered with flowery designs, and six chairs.

The desk was so typical of the 18th century that it might as well be selected as the most representative piece of furniture of that era. It was the kind of desk that was used by Washington, John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Jonathan Edwards and thousands of lawyers, doctors and men of business. It was narrow and tall. The writing surface was hardly wide enough for two sheets of paper. The upright portion

rose to the height of about six feet. It had glass doors and several shelves for papers and books and drawers in the lower part of the desk could be hoisted.

The materials for writing lay in a recess on the same level as the writing surface. There was an ornate inkwell of brass, a metal holder containing three quill pens, and a silver shaker of blue and red ink used in blotting the freshly written sheets. Blotting was unknown and sand was used instead.

On the finely polished mahogany back of the seat of the room stood a bowl of long-stemmed pipes, a silver tobacco box, and a large candlestick with branches for six candles. Also a fine-and-large firearm, which was used occasionally for hunting wild game when the weather was not yet lighted and there was no fire on the hearth. The firearm consisted of a piece of flint fixed immovably in place by metal prongs. The flint could be struck by a hammer like that belonging to a musket, by cocking the hammer and pulling a trigger. The spark thus created, fell into a little metal box filled with cotton, or lint, or fine wood shavings. The smolder then transferred the burning lint to the bowl of the pipe.

Dykiss knocked at the door, opened it a few inches and peeped. "Miss Fraser has come," he said. It was then about 3 o'clock.

The major replaced the book he was reading and took another from a bookcase near at hand. He had been reading Adam Smith's novel, "The Nun, or the Perjured Beauty," and the book he took from its place said, "This does not apply to Miss Fraser, if she comes bring her in at once."

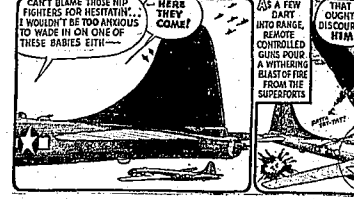

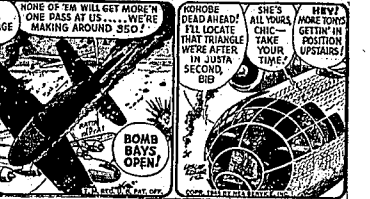

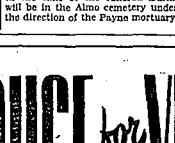
