GEN. MACARTHUR'S HEADQUARTERS, LUZON, Jan. 15 (AP)—U. S. sixth army troops crossed the formidable but virtually undefended Agno river 88 miles from Manila and overran scattered Japanese to expand their Lihayagan gulf beachhead 30 miles to a total of 45, Gen. Douglas MacArthur reported today.

LEGION CALLS FOR LIQUOR-BY-DRINK

BOISE, Jan. 15 (AP)—Legislation of the sale of liquor by the drink was asked of the legislature last night by the executive committee of the Idaho department of the American Legion.

The committee's approval of a liquor-by-the-drink resolution adopted by the Potlatch post No. 4 earlier this month, was the high light of the committee session and opened the way for a legislative floor battle on the subject.

The Idaho Allied Civil Forces, a dry group, now is campaigning for stricter liquor and beer laws and stronger state and local enforcement.

"The present liquor control act has proven impractical, unworkable and unenforceable," said the resolution. "The liquor situation in the state is a disgrace and blot on honest government and law enforcement."

Bale of liquor by the drink is illegal under Idaho's monopoly system, in effect since 1935.
