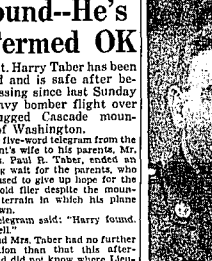

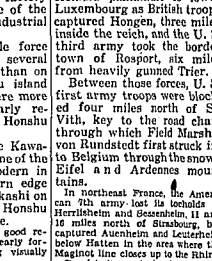

In a companion move, the war food administration ordered 40 per cent total lard production set aside to meet military requirements.

Retention value of two points a pound was set for all of the commodities affected.

Free ration stamps will be used hereafter for the purchase of lard and other cooking oils and fats.

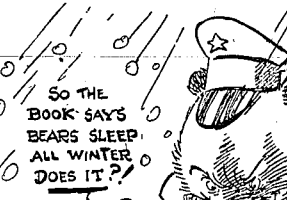

WASHINGTON—Senator Vandenberg has performed a major public service in his recent speech on foreign policy.

It was a statement and not a politician who said: "I have always been one of those who has believed in our own self-reliance."

That is no different from Senator Wheeler's attitude toward Germany as consigned to the "Wheeler Without a Veto" put it, any remote suggestion of appeasement, we could make it clear to our enemies that the quicker they unconditionally surrender, the better for them.

Wheeler's statement, urging terms for Germany if only Hitler is removed, is a far cry from Goebbels' propaganda. Noting that Vandenberg said could serve as a new program for the United States, and yet a program of peace and a doubt in the minds of

many—that our policy may have been calculated to make the German people rest longer than they would have otherwise.

# The Way Our People Lived

A GEORGIA TOWN IN 1837

The name of Major Earle's wife was Katherine, but she never used it in addressing her or in talking about her. To her friends and relatives she was Kitty, and those who did not know her so well called her Mrs. Earle in a most respectful tone.

If she were living now, in our time, there is no doubt that she would be looked upon by her acquaintances as a mild, colorless person, without ideas or outstanding traits. Moreover, she would be considered incredibly ignorant. But in our time women were not judged by the standards of today. A lady was not thought to have a flick of noisiness fluttering around inside her head, or to be able to discuss the differences between Federalists and Republicans, or the intrigues of Aaron Burr, or the doings of the upstart Napoleon. Nor was she supposed to know the distance of the earth from the sun, or who Louis Braille was or who invented the art of printing. The women of that day, if they were well-bred, did not have an interest in anything except husband, household, a small circle of friends, and the duties of a mother.

There were no women's clubs. The ladies took part in politics, but in any public movement, even if it had a charitable object. This applies not only to politics, but to the country as a whole. One never encountered a woman in an office unless she was a secretary, bookkeeper, or stenographer. Businessmen and statesmen had secretaries, but they were men.

Women were on the stage in those days, and some of them were celebrated actors. But the women of that time there were seen only in the role of a mother, or in any woman's exhibiting herself before a crowd in a theater, not exhibiting herself, but even according to the role she was playing. The ladies and gentlemen might enjoy the performance, as they frequently did, but the best part of the performance did not raise the status of the actors who took part in it.

A few women in every community were in business despite the rigid prejudices of custom and public opinion that women's place was the home. There were women tavern keepers, for instance, and some of these hostesses of jaded travelers attained a wide and favorable renown. And, of course, all the dressmaking establishments were carried on by women. Women owned small shops of various kinds, ranging from bakeries to shoe stores. But all places of power and distinction in commercial life were occupied by men.

Marriage was the first objective of all womankind. It was generally believed that something was wrong with a girl if she never married, something wrong morally, or mentally or physically, but a young woman could do very little about it. Consider that it is considered mildly flirtatious today would have been characterized as indecent in the eighteenth century. A girl who was "necking" would have served to exclude the lady in the case from good society. All a girl could do in getting a husband was to look her best, be shy and modest in company, and need in a manner.

Every young lady was expected to play the piano and the guitar, and much time was devoted to this form of education. Dancing was also one of the proper lessons on the list of things that a well-bred girl has to learn. Every city and town of im-

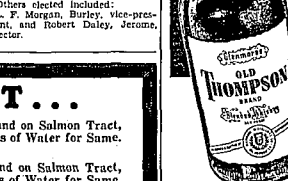

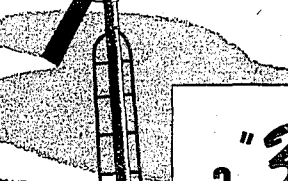
