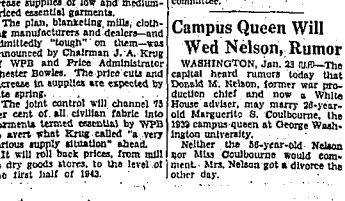
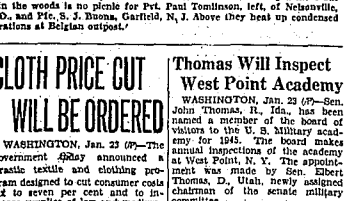
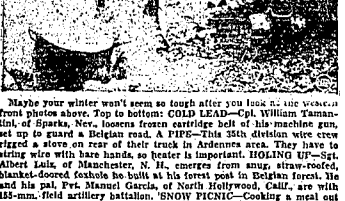

PARIS, Jan. 23 (AP)—U. S. first army tank patrols smashed today into St. Vith, last German bastion in the collapsing Ardennes salient, following air attacks yesterday which turned the enemy withdrawal into a rout.

Men of the seventh armored division, commanded by Brig. Gen. Robert W. Hasbrouck, center just a month and two days after Field Marshal von Rundstedt captured the place and thousands of Americans.

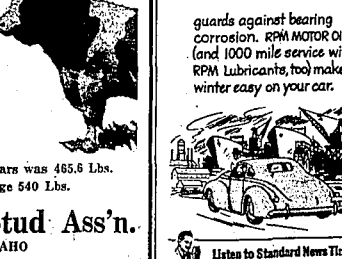

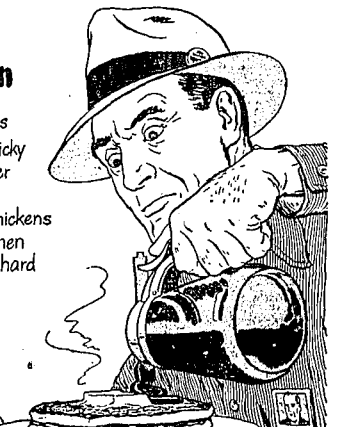

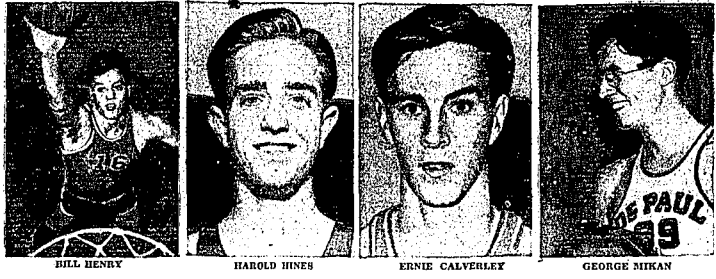

his wife, on their plantation near Savannah when I made his acquaintance.

"One evening Mrs. Miller had a lot of us in for dinner. After dinner we got talking about the difficulty of seeing the cotton. Eli Whitney illustrated it by sending a Negro out for some cotton with the seeds in it, and I remember his sitting there and pulling the lint off.

"He told me later that the idea of the gin occurred to him that evening in all its features. In a week he'd built a rough gin, and he was making a hat box. He saw that the way to handle the matter was to comb the lint cotton away from the seeds. So he put a lot of wire teeth on a roller, arranged in rows so that when the roller was turned the teeth would run through slots, and through a sort of grating. The cotton was put on the other side of the slots, or grating. Then, as the roller turned the teeth would pull the cotton from the seeds.

He invented me and some others, to see the gin work. Well, sir, in a few hours it had ginned 200 pounds of cotton. The machine didn't have any name at the time, so Whitney called it a gin, which is a contraction of the word "engine."

"I often wondered why I didn't see the gin when I was in Hatcher's, or you, Harvey, or any of us. It's the simplest device in the world, and looks like the idea might occur to anybody. But it didn't. It just took time."

He did not say what it goes to show, for Mrs. Earle, coming to the door, called the machine a gin, and said to his wife, "I think you'd better ask Mrs. Harrison to come in for a moment. We'll have to say Robert out on the sofa in here, and I want her to see that he's comfortable."

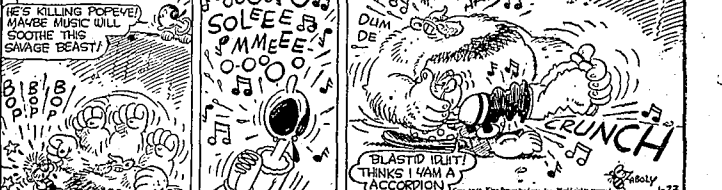

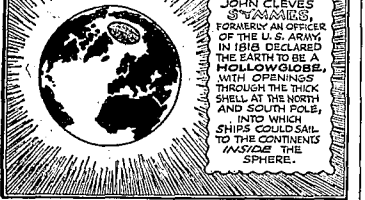

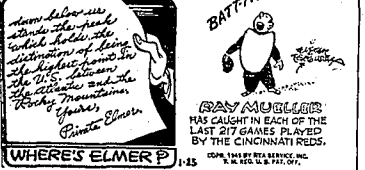
