America Won't Police Germany, Says Roosevelt

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8 (AP)—Announcement of the big three conference raised great hope here today that the meeting in the Black sea area is reaching real agreement on Europe's postwar future and the style of Germany's post-surrender straightjacket.

President Roosevelt, Prime Minister Churchill and Premier Stalin have agreed on strategy to insure Germany's military defeat. Now they have begun political and economic talks. These latter are the key to the future, perhaps the most important conversations in the memory of any living person.

The world will pay for any mistakes made on the Black sea shores and benefit from wise decisions.

Roosevelt is believed to have told Churchill and Stalin the United States prefers not to participate in the ultimate, long-range policing of Germany. That task is to be assigned to Britain and Russia with possible assistance of France.

Only compromises by all three toward mutual agreement in some form generally are expected. Assurances that United States troops will not be among the semi-permanent European police detail, could count heavily in winning American acceptance of the proposed arrangement as the President may have to make.

Plans for Germany are: Destruction of Germany's war-making potential in heavy industry; destruction of her synthetic industry.

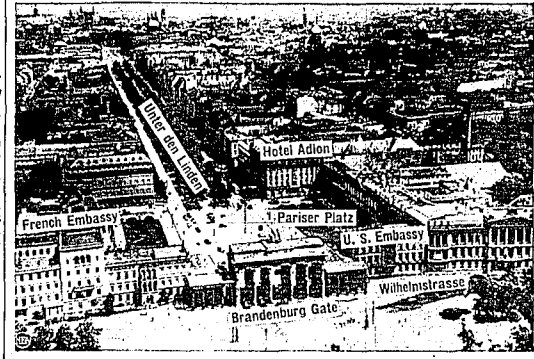
Holland Objects To Postwar Plan

WENDELL PLANT EXPANDS SET-UP

WENDELL, Feb. 8.—Another plant expansion program, the second in the past year, will get underway this spring as the Gates Brothers machine shop to permit the addition of a new line of manufacturing and employment of more men. It was announced by Charles and John Gates, partners in the firm.

Already contract has been let for pouring concrete for the floor of the building on lots recently purchased east of the present plant and fronting on Idaho avenue between the Boise Fayette Lumber company and Bernard super-service station.

Until materials are available for the building itself, the brothers said men will work outside during the favorable weather and fall operations. Gasoline and oil tanks and some lines of specialized farm machinery will be manufactured in the new plant. Machine tools already are on order.

The payroll will be increased to 25 men, mostly skilled machinists and welders, with starting of operations in the new addition.

Contract for the work has been let to Tom Gates, Wendell contractor, who has been associated in the machine shop but recently sold his interest to return to his previous profession of building.

Buhl Aviator Back From Search Duty

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—Lieut. (j.g.) Thomas M. Kendrick, USN, Buhl, Ida., has returned from a month's tour of duty in the Pacific with VP-34, a navy search-plane squadron.

He flew in a four-motored Consolidated Commodore flying boat on patrols over thousands of miles of the Pacific to protect shipping and shore bases from enemy action. He participated in patrols and special flights during the Kwajalein and Eniwetok campaigns in the Marshall Islands, and in the squadron's daily bombing of Ponape in the Caroline Islands last August.

Lieutenant Kendrick flew from a Hawaiian base from October, 1943, until last June. Later he flew from Eniwetok and Saipan for three month periods.

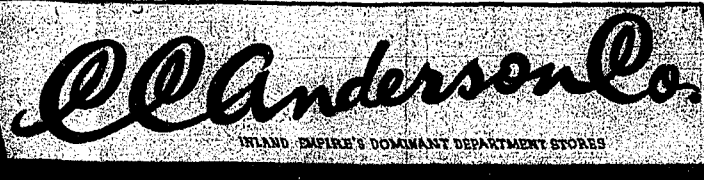

UNIVERSAL TRAINING

It seems incredible, though it is true, that the world at large is being trained to oppose universal military training for able-bodied young men after this war.

Every year in American history has found hundreds of thousands of young men who have been trained through and survived in spite of themselves. For this there have been three reasons.

One, that our early wars were fought under conditions which were so completely unmechanized that it was necessary for the individual man to be a premium.

Two, that until World War I our foreign wars were fought either on our own soil—or that our enemies had all the handicaps imposed by the wide Atlantic ocean—or against vastly inferior opponents.

Three, that until World War I our enemies in Europe were attacked first, and they managed to hold our enemies until we could repair some of the damage done by our failure to prepare in advance.

In the present war our allies, the British, almost didn't succeed in holding out long enough to save us. Only Adolf Hitler's errors—his failure to invade while Britain was helpless and his attack upon the Russians—gave us time to conscript, train, arm and send troops overseas.

We can not count upon such good fortune forever. We must be prepared to meet any such time—in
