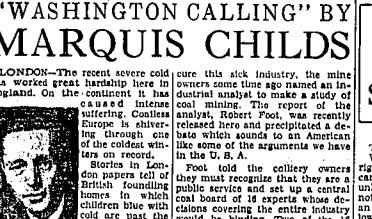

### MAC MIGHT NOT LEAD JAP DRIVE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—The Army and Navy Journal said today that reports of a current plan to send Gen. Douglas MacArthur "might be sidetracked from the command of the armies that invade Japan."

In an editorial, the unofficial publication said that "in view of the superb leadership he has furnished, the significant results obtained by purely American forces, and the low number of casualties his men have sustained, it would seem that there would be no question about his continued leadership of the military operations to be conducted in the homeland of that far eastern enemy." Then the editorial added:

"However, reports are current that the plan for the invasion which have been approved, contemplate his retention for the clean-up job in the Philippines, and the assignment of another officer as the commander of the invading expedition."

HUNT, Feb. 10.—Approximately 35,000 acres outside the camp site, including the farming lands, were returned to the bureau of reclamation during January, according to W. ### VICTORY NOT YET 'AROUND CORNER'

By DEWITT HACKBRIE  
"Success too often breeds over-confidence, and this is a good time for us to look at the things we are doing on our finger to remind us that the present gratifying allied progress in Europe doesn't necessarily mean victory is just around the corner, and that we shall reach it by any royal route."

We ought to recognize this from the fact that the Axis powers are encountering among the defenses of the Oder river, and from the fact that the western allies are finding in the inhospitable, water-logged and misty terrain of the Rhineland. The Germans are giving ground, and their resources in manpower and matériel are far from sufficient to carry on indefinitely—but there's bloody warfare ahead of us.

Call to Germans  
This column has discussed possibility of the big three calling on the German people to desert Hitler. This naturally would involve the execution of his hold on the public, and approval of this I have here some striking observations by Verles, British official military commentator. Deploring the fact that the end won't be either sudden or soon, Verles points out that the plot to overthrow Hitler last summer, provided grape-cock Himmler, now in military control of the country, with the opportunity for which he had been waiting. Since then "terrible bloodbaths" have been continuously in progress, and the victims have been drawn from all walks of life.

"How many thousands have been murdered may never be known," he has also learned from reliable sources that no less than 30 individuals are still being executed at Dortmund, and a comparable toll is evidently being taken in many other German cities. An anonymous denunciation to the effect that a person expressed doubt as to the possibility of Germany's winning the war is sufficient to send the accused to the execution squads.

"It would be misunderstanding the situation to interpret the Central masses to the frantic efforts of a gang of desperados to terrorize a brave population on the verge of revolt. It is a calculated policy to eliminate every group and individual who might be disposed to prefer surrender to accepting the devastation of the country at the price for a fight to the last man."

Means a Fight  
That's what we are up against, and it means a fight. However, it also should be noted that there are clear signs of discontent among some sections of the population, not all of whom have realized eastern. There also is a great, though at present more or less inactive, menace to national morale in the some 12,000,000 foreign slaves within Germany.

Once Berlin falls and Himmler's picked military forces have to abandon the northern part of the Reich, we are likely to see a radical change in civilian attitude.

### GENERAL SCORES THAT BLAZE RIDE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10 (AP)—Col. Elliott Roosevelt's dog "Blaze" got his now celebrated high priority ride across the country "just as a sort of a favor" to the colonel's sister, Mrs. Anna Roosevelt.

That was the report from Senator Maybank, D. S. C., today after Madison, H. I. George, chief of the air transport command, testified before a senate military committee.

George told the committee men the whole business was a "serious matter" which "cannot be justified."

A report issued today by the subcommittee of which Maybank is a member, quoted George as saying: "Establishing an 'A' priority for the dog was unauthorized under regulations relating to air priorities."

He told the senators that Col. Ray W. Ireland, assistant chief of staff for priorities and traffic at the department of war here, established the priority for "Blaze" after telephone conversation with Mrs. Boettiger at the White House.

George said Mrs. Boettiger had requested that the dog be transported from the capital to Mrs. Elliott Roosevelt, in Hollywood, Calif., but he added "no mention of priority was made in the conversation."

Maybank said he got the impression from talking to George that Ireland issued the high priority "just as a sort of a favor."

Three servicemen with low priorities were forced off the plane at Memphis, Tenn., while Blaze completed his trip to the coast.

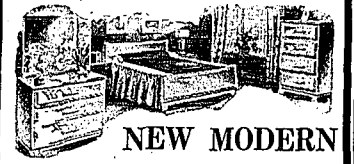

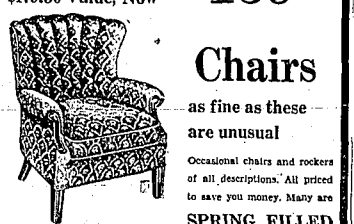
