3-Power Deal for Germany; Parley Concluded

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12 (AP)—The big three—Roosevelt, Churchill and Stalin—have agreed on plans for shortening the war in Europe, on complete elimination of both nazism and German militarism and on cooperative action in liberated Europe.

That was announced today in a communique from the meeting of the President, Britain's prime minister and Marshal Stalin of the Soviets in the Crimea. The conference lasted eight days and resulted, the statement said, in "continuing and growing cooperation and understanding among our three countries and among all the peace-loving nations."

As for Germany there was no effort to soften the force of unconditional surrender and the three leaders declared: "It is not our purpose to destroy the people of Germany, but only to bring the German people who have been exterminated by them in the comity of nations."

"Nazi Germany is doomed," the communique said at another point. "The Germans will only make the cost of their defeat heavier to themselves by attempting to continue a hopeless resistance."

"Under the agreed plan for occupation of the German people will be set up a separate state in Germany, under a coalition government, control has been provided."

"It is our inalienable purpose to destroy German militarism and national and to ensure that Germany will never again be able to disturb the peace of the world."

YANKEE BOMBERS ROCK CORREGIDOR IN GIANT SWASH

MANILA, Feb. 12 (UP)—The fortress of Corregidor in Manila harbor, where Gen. Douglas MacArthur's Americans made their last stand against the Japanese, rocked today under the heaviest saturation bombing attack yet launched in the Pacific.

For nearly a week Japanese anti-aircraft guns on the rocky fortress have been silent, presumably knocked out by American bombs.

The terrific air attack, softening up Corregidor for an American landing, came as American tanks and infantry columns splintered the Japanese forces in southern Manila.

In the last 48 hours more than 500 bombing sorties have been flown against Corregidor and southern Luzon. In one attack Japanese fighters with Japanese troops were caught off the eastern coast and downed with their wings broken by troops.

The sudden sea-bombing prompted to close out the bloody straits battle for Manila in short order. The Japanese were breaking up their lines and retreating. They were then cut off from all contact with their commanders and facing almost certain death in a matter of days at most.

Probably the strongest remaining Japanese positions were around Fort McKinley on the southeastern outskirts of the capital and in the old walled city of Manila Bay. Elsewhere throughout the southern half of the city, small groups of enemy troops, mostly in the hands of mortars and artillery, were holed up behind street barricades and in ruined buildings under heavy attack from all sides.

The 74th Infantry's advanced spearheads already were more than a mile south of the Pasig at sunset. They were ordered to continue moving east along the main Japanese stronghold behind the bay.

PARIS, Feb. 12 (AP)

A Moscow broadcast said Berlin has been converted into an armed camp. The city is surrounded by Soviet troops and is under a strict curfew.
