NEW WORK-ELSE PLAN SUPPORTED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—Three senators, two Democrats and a Republican, today proposed to amend pending work-else legislation in favor of a new manpower bill carrying on provisions for draft workers.

The substitute was introduced by Sen. Robert F. Wagner, D., N. Y., Harry M. Kilgore, D., W. V., and Homer Ferguson, R., Ill., as the Senate military affairs committee was holding hearings on the bill. The substitute would give for work under threat of fines or imprisonment a certain number of men to find considerable backing among committee members. There is a prediction a majority of the 88-man committee will give behind it rather than support the principle of compulsion represented in the work-else bill.

The substitute would give the force of law to manpower commissions governing employers. It also would offer inducements, such as traveling expenses, to workers who accept work away from home.

WALLACE—The Roosevelt-Wallace proposal of 60,000,000 postwar jobs has been taken so seriously and the executive labor unions have reacted so furiously that it may become a troublesome slogan in politico-economic history as Mark Hanna's "trial dinner" or Herbert Hoover's "two chickens in every pot."

Wallace insists his philosophy of government, as declared by the Texas, would give his amount of money to the state and would not be a backer, taking their cue from him, and that Uncle Sam carry out this administration program. 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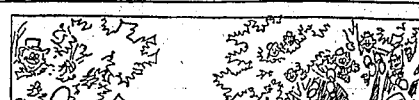

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"CHEAPER" WITH A JOKER

Rural electrification administration cooperatives have a clearly-cut record of victory in the Idaho legislature, and unless their proposed measure authorizing county commissioners to convey tax land to the federal government without compensation finally passes, the state will witness another blow to private enterprise.

The bill allowing the federal government to receive county lands free of charge was accompanied by a companion measure allowing the government to construct power lines without furnishing the customary heavy bond.

Two opposing views, expressed by members of the legislature, brought out the whole issue in a nutshell.

"The federal government should be made to bid on the rights-of-way in competition with private individuals. The money thus derived would go in support of activities which would outlive if the lands were given away."

"I am sticking by the farmers on this. I favor getting electricity for the farmers and then I favor getting it as cheap as possible."

"We do not ordinarily go out of our way to champion the cause of any business, but whenever government intervention threatens to compete with individual initiative, we feel it our duty to help them, as we can, and all legitimate private enterprises."

Idaho has long ranked as one of the foremost states in the union in rural electrification, a distinction for which the Idaho Power company deserves the credit. Not only has the company proven itself one of the most progressive private utility firms in the country, but its service and rates have been in direct keeping with the high standard.

When we say the Idaho Power company is progressive, we feel that it is progressive to the extent that it would electrify any community in the state where rural electrification is economically feasible.

If the government chooses to expand such a program into areas where rural electrification is not economically sound, there is only one conclusion to be drawn. Someone will have to pay the deficit for unworkable operation. And that someone, as everyone knows, will be the taxpayers.

If we are lured into permitting the government to go into business in competition with private enterprise, without buying land, posting bonds, and paying taxes and rents, we are only kidding ourselves.

By the same faulty logic, why not turn all of our marginal lands over to the government, much as we do to the state, and designate into highly productive soil, all at the taxpayers' expense. If the government didn't have to pay taxes on such land, or share crops with or pay rent to the farmer, it would be what it produced from that land at prices that would make the individual farmer look like a robber.

It's all just as simple as that. Everything that the Japanese do, the Japanese do. They pay the taxes to maintain our schools, state government, and everything else that lives off the public.

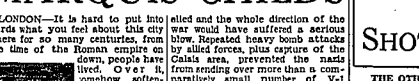

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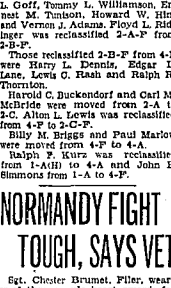

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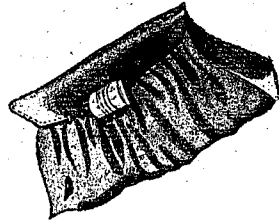
