7,000 Freed From Ruins Of Hospital

MANILA, Feb. 19 (AP)—Manila was all but back in American hands today but in there 7,000 civilians were released in a new dramatic rescue, the Japanese still clung grimly to the walled section.

The 7,000, including 100 Americans, were liberated under gun fire as American troops stormed into the ruins of the Philippine general hospital.

Maj. Gen. Oscar W. Griswold, commander of the 14th corps, delayed a showdown battle for a walled district in the hope other thousands of civilians would be released by the Japanese.

The army's seventh fleet warships steamed to the entrance of the bay to bombard Japanese on the Cavite peninsula. Gen. Douglas MacArthur, in a communique also revealing mopping up progress on Corregidor.

American troops, who landed on the island by entrance through Friday, cleared important military hills.

The communique said the east entrance of Corregidor tunnel, in which the Japanese may have hidden, was being searched for mines and other explosives.

The Japanese mainland also was blasted again today by American B-29's.

Superfortresses of the 20th air force actually burned the target in a daylight raid on the island of Honshu.

The second day on Japanese islands, military and communications facilities on the Malay peninsula were bombed by Superfortresses.

From Manila, Tinian, Forthress from bases at Soloman and Tinian in the Marianas under Maj. Gen. Curtis E. LeMay, 21st bomber command, carried out the raid on the mainland.

Details of the two attacks will not be released until operations reports are received in Washington.

ABOARD A NAVY LIBERATOR BOMBER OVER IWO JIMA, Feb. 19 (AP) (Via navy radio)—Tiny, tough Iwo was ablaze front end to end today as our bombers dropped down into its battle smoke to watch wave after wave of marines plough ashore from a 800-ship invasion armada for a showdown fight in the enemy's front yard.

Even the mighty battleships, cruisers and destroyers circled endlessly, sending crushing salvos into the volcanic slopes of the island, I could see marines dashing for cover on the rocky southeastern beach.

Some were far inland toward the airstrip.

However, the Japanese certainly were fighting back from their underground defenses.

Two as we swung over Mt. Suribachi's crater at the south end of the island and toward the northern wooded section, the Japanese gave us bursts of anti-aircraft.

With our defenses were being riddled by offshore bombardments, some twinkled at us from the Wilson field approach.

As we approached the island, hundreds of small anti-aircraft flares bursted, and a number of large bursts of marines followed within minutes.

Smoke and dust covered the island and we looked like a cat's paw on a sizzling skillet as carrier planes swept in under the beach, and a number of our fighters circled in the air.

One fighter crashed in flames just inland from where the marines fought. It was the first of several to be seen.

The invasion armada had spread out in a line from the beach to the island. There was no mistaking the fact that the Americans arrived to find a beachhead.

SCANDAL—A sweeping senate investigation of certain alleged big-time liquor violators has been quickly squelched by administration leaders because a congressional committee is already at work on the same campaign checks and has a close link with influential politicians in the White House, Washington, New York and California.

The death sentence killing a full and complete disclosure of prices, rates and bribes and bowing of dealers escaped publicly because it took the form of an additional committee report and was not a report of duty by the department of justice and deliberate wink at the front by politicians.

Two years ago, on the unanimous recommendation of the senate judiciary committee, the senate authorized a judicial subcommittee to study widely spread liquor violations.

On one year ago the senate extended the life of the examining unit, and in the summer its agents assembled the entire record of judicial action against at least one of the large distilling corporations. The subcommittee was largely told open hearings that first mentioned them in the opening declaration of the request of Democratic national chairman, Hannegan, who feared the political repercussions.

In making for an extension a few weeks ago, subcommittee chairman Pat McCarran pulled out from some of the findings already noted. His revelations convinced the full judiciary committee that the situation demanded a far-reaching investigation.

LIQUOR—When Senator McCarran presented his report for consideration of the probe, it was unanimously referred to the senate committee. This organization, headed by Sen. Scott W. Ladd, a loyal alcoholic, was to investigate with decided vigor or not the senate would have investigations is warranted by the facts.

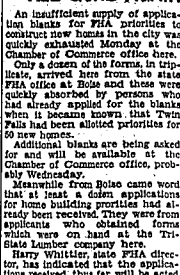
