3,000 FREED AS LAST JAP STAND IN MANILA ENDS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24 (AP)—The three-weeks old fight for Manila ended Saturday with complete defeat of the Japanese garrison. Already more than 12,000 enemy dead have been counted.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur announced the conclusion of the bloody street-by-street fight, climaxed in overwhelming enemy troops in the Intramuros, the old walled city. Three thousand civilians, many of them women and children, were liberated in the final onslaught.

On Luzon island more than 2,000 prisoners of the Japanese—most of them Americans—were freed today, liberated by the soldiers of Philipina in another of the Pacific war's daring and dramatic reverses.

"God Was With Us"—M'Arthur

MANILA, Feb. 24 (AP)—"God was certainly with us today," Gen. Douglas MacArthur said today as American troops rescued more than 2,000 prisoners from the Los Baños internment camp today.

Immediately after announcing the dramatic rescue, MacArthur said: "Nothing could be more satisfying to a soldier's heart than to see his fellow prisoners freed. God was certainly with us today."

The liberating force struck from the air, over land and across water, for the last time the Japanese lines. The 21st Army, women and children, were rescued from the Los Baños internment camp today. The Japanese were held in a camp southeast of Manila.

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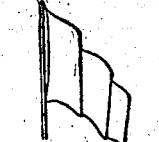

WAR GROWS MORE DEADLY

In a compilation of war casualties suffered in nine European nations since the year 1100, an Oklahoma weekly statistical review has depressing conclusion. The number of men killed in the wars of the past centuries more than they lost in all the 82 years up to 1914. Russia, as a semi-Asiatic nation, was not included.

In the 25 years after 1800, these nine nations sent into battle more than 100 million men into battle. In these, slightly more than 22 million were casualties, raising the 82-year total to more than 33 million. Now, the same nations are expected to suffer approximately 40 million casualties, excluding deaths from starvation or in epidemics during the present war.

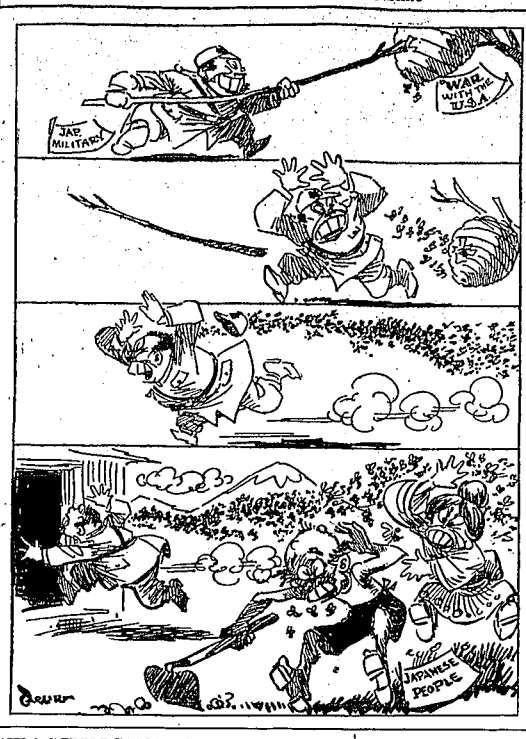

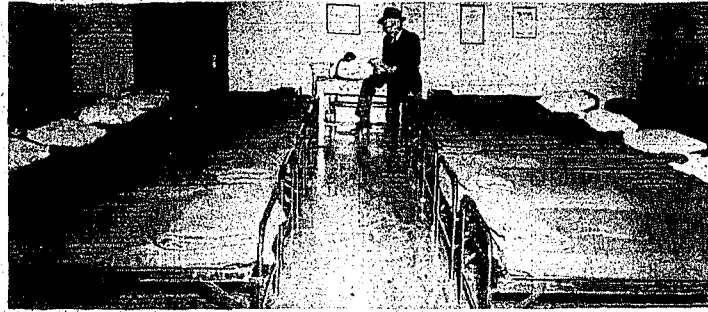

"Hey, soldier, your rank doesn't mean a thing down at the Legion hall—well at least not on Saturday nights or early Sunday mornings. . . . Shiny bars mean nothing to local Legionnaires who operate it—we will call it a housing project, down at the hall. They figure that when a man's tired, and there's no place to sleep, it's a case of first come, first served."

While back Jack Therpe, the local post's commander, had a brain storm. And out of the storm came an idea which has caught on and which is causing no end of favorable comment among the servicemen.

No rooms for them
Therpe and other Legion members learned that on one Saturday night there were no more hotel beds left. And out of the storm came an idea which has caught on and which is causing no end of favorable comment among the servicemen.

There was a large room at the Legion hall. Cots were secured, blankets picked up, sheets were found and pillows and pillows were begged. Soon everything was ready.

Now, each Saturday night, there are from 14 to 16 beds available for servicemen and they don't cost a cent.

Here's how it works:
Through cooperation with the USO and local hotels the following night place a soldier or sailor's marine can't find a hotel room, either can the USO find anyone on a long "availability" list who still has a private room left, so the Legionnaire is referred to the Legion hall.

There he registers and goes to bed. There he rests and goes to bed. There's all there is to it. Soldiers staying there are offered to pay, but no other accommodations are available.

Right now the emergency housing committee is headed by U. N. Terry, assisted by E. P. Parry. John Day used to be a member but he now lives in Boise. The two remaining committee members find that there's plenty of work to do. Of course, Legionnaires volunteer for night duty at the hall and two are active throughout the night hours.

You fuck privates are lucky. There's three officers sleeping on the floor just outside this door." The privates were stirred.

TWO EXCEPTIONS TO CURFEW LAW

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24 (AP)—The war manpower commission today announced a policy of strict enforcement of the midnight curfew for night spots with only two general exceptions.

In instructions to its field offices the agency applied War Mobilization Director Burnett's order to shut down edgic to all public and private places providing entertainment, beginning Monday. This includes establishments serving liquor, wine and beer.

YANKS ROLL OVER COLOGNE PLAINS

PARIS, Sunday, Feb. 25 (AP)—The American first and ninth armies plunged nearly five miles across the Cologne plain beyond the shattered Roer river defense line yesterday, capturing towns and villages and capturing thousands of the German west bank Hitler force which General Eisenhower declared he was going to destroy.

At dusk on the second day of the powerful push by German account "the greatest offensive Eisenhower ever staged," American spearheads were 12 miles from the western Ruhr basin and 18 from Cologne, and had won half of the Roer River line of the

The battle lasted around a 22-mile front. German soldiers in the path of the surging ground force, and battle planes bombed and machine-gunned columns of German trying to reach the front. Rail traffic was stopped. German tanks on the continent flew 3,315 sorties during the day, destroying thousands of German aircraft. German highways and hundreds of locomotives and freight cars on railways behind the front.

War Kitchen

By GAYNOR MADDOX (NEA Staff Writer) By adding great chunks of milk and eggs to a vegetable dish, you give it enough protein to serve in place of a meat or fish main dish.

Vegetable Souffle (Serves 4-7) Three tablespoons fat, butter or fortified margarine, four tablespoons cream, one cup milk, one-fourth teaspoon salt, four tablespoons grated cheese, three-quarter cup cooked peas, three-quarter cup uncooked tomato, three eggs separated.

Melt the fat and add the flour, blending well together. Add the milk or cream, stirring constantly until the sauce is thickened and smooth. Continue cooking about 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Cool until lukewarm, add the salt, pepper, grated cheese, cooked peas and uncooked chopped tomato. Beat the yolks until thick, add to the vegetable mixture. Beat the egg whites until stiff and gently mix in the ingredients and pour into a nine-inch round heat-resistant glass cake pan. Beat in the milk (315 deg. F.) about one hour and 15 minutes. Serve this vegetable souffle in the same dish in which it was baked, to keep the food piping hot and to help prevent the souffle from falling.

Poached Eggs With Mushrooms One-half pound fresh mushrooms or one cup canned mushrooms, three tablespoons butter or fortified margarine, three tablespoons cream, one-half teaspoon salt, one-fourth teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, two eggs, four eggs, toast points.

Heat mushrooms and butter in rather small pieces. Melt butter or margarine, add mushrooms and cream, cook until slightly tender. Place mushrooms in bottom of well-seasoned heat-resistant glass utility dish, leaving mushroom liquid in sautepan or skillet. Add flour, salt and Worcester sauce to mushroom liquid, making a soft paste; add milk, stirring constantly until the sauce is thickened. Pour the sauce over the mushrooms; break eggs and drop egg gently into the other ingredients in the utility dish. Place toast points under the egg and milk in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) about 10 to 15 minutes until the eggs are cooked firm. Serve hot with hot muffins, a crisp salad and tea.

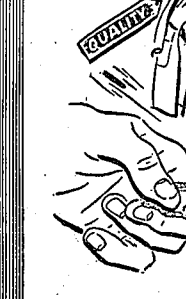

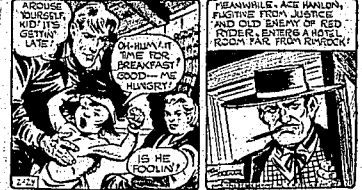

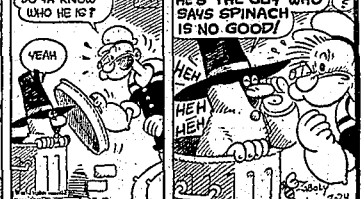

Silence is a distinguishing feature of the hurried slipping of a small shooting star across the night. But when a dazzling speeding fireball tears the sky overhead, there is almost anything except silence after one to three minutes, the time required for the glowing gutters to rumble in someones described as terrifying.

It is true that explosions are often heard by those unfortunates, but only as snapping noises of minor importance. An observer near the light of the Yakima fireball of April 20, 1933, saw three rapidly occurring bursts, then after a minute later (sound travels one-fifth of a mile per second) heard three light cracks.
