Doughboys Slash Mikado's Stolen Empire in Half

MANILA, March 2 (AP)—American troops, landing upon the Palawan island in the Philippines, virtually cut Japan's stolen empire in two today. Elements of the veteran 41st division seized control of the 276-mile long island, fifth largest and westernmost of the Philippines, with the capture of Puerto Princesa and three nearby airfields on the coast.

The invasion was the 17th by American forces in the Philippines. It enabled the Americans to throw an air and naval blockade across Japan's shipping lanes to the south and opened the way for a two-way aerial assault on the Malaya peninsula.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur's command noted significantly that the Philippines bases "leads to cut the enemy in two and condemn all his conquests to the south to recapture."

The troops, commanded by Brig. Gen. Harold G. Honey, landed on the beach at Puerto Princesa after a heavy bombardment by cruisers and destroyers laid the island's capital and largest city. Amphibious tractors carried the landing craft into the beach and unloaded at a freight pier.

MacArthur's return to Corregidor came less than two weeks after U. S. paratroopers spearheaded the landing on the island which guards the entrance to Manila Bay.

Control West Side of Ruhr as More Towns Go in Bag

PARIS, March 2 (AP)—The American ninth army fought to the Rhine and into the suburbs of Dusseldorf today in spectacular 16-mile advances which won control of the western edge of the Ruhr.

Tanks and infantry of Lieut. Gen. William H. Simpson's mighty shock force fought in the streets of Neuss, west bank suburb of Dusseldorf, administrative center of the great Ruhr arsenal basin. They also spurred miles to the north, capturing the Dutch bastion and rail center of Venlo on the Rhine, and came within 18 miles of forming a trap, with the Canadian first army, on thousands of German troops.

Town after town on the western edge of the Ruhr fell and the iron and rail center of Krefeld was only two and a half miles away.

Within sight of Krefeld, the ninth army was less than nine and a half miles from Duisburg—grawling steel basin Rhine port and chief outlet for the Ruhr. It is the size of Cincinnati.

The smash was the greatest American victory since the Berlin breakthrough 18 1/2 months ago.
