In a pitched battle the house previously killed the proposal to eliminate the direct primary election as the same measure was introduced in the senate, passed and pushed back on the house.

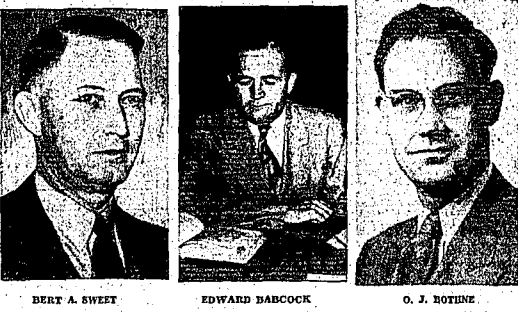

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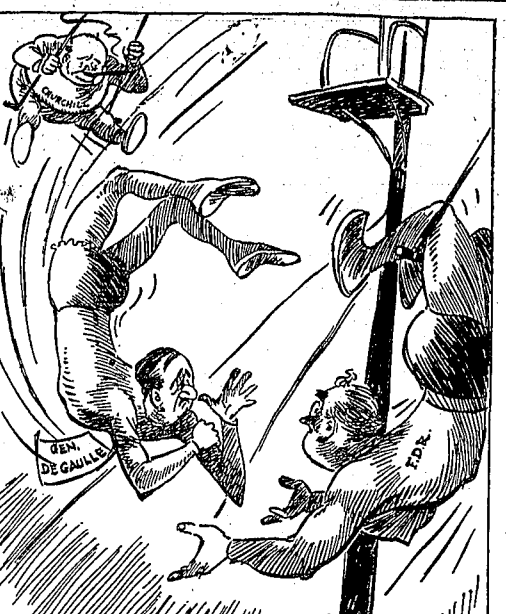

Fun Menus Planned For Children's Meals

Many mothers are likely to duplicate breakfast at the evening meal for children and prepare such foods as cereals, eggs and fruit. Through their breakfast and the noon meal, they may find it difficult to plan, research proper dinner. Here are some ideas from M. Shapcott, nutritional consultant of the Visiting Nurse association of Brooklyn, N. Y.

In her book, "Feeding Our Kids," Mrs. Shapcott says that the best breakfast for children is a simple one. It should include a cereal, a milk, a fruit and a buttered roll. She has found that all the children draw loved to draw once they found an easy-to-do subject.

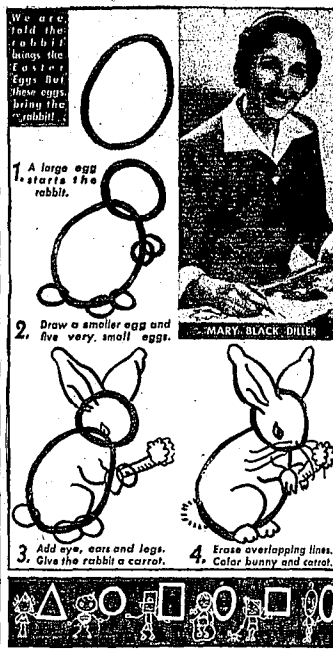
That's why Mrs. Diller decided to create a drawing book that would be fun for the child and would make an adventure of drawing for children.
