GOVERNOR SAVED BY LOWER HOUSE ON FUNDS TIEUP

BOISE, March 6 (AP)—House Democrats pulled Gov. Charles C. Gossett out of a hot corner today by killing with the vote a Republican-sponsored measure tying up \$2,000,000 of the state's general fund.

Gossett in a message to the house asking action to raise postwar federal highway matching funds also asked for a postwar surplus in the general fund, but he did not specify the amount or how it was to be set aside.

The house ways and means committee, headed by Majority Leader J. C. Coffey, R., however, immediately introduced the bill making mandatory a levy of \$600,000 biennially, which plus revenue from other sources of some \$1,000,000 plus \$1,000,000 in state bonds would bring the state's operating fund to \$19,000,000 in the next two years.

The large appropriation in last year's \$10,253,000 has been recommended by legislative finance, but only by the state's operating fund on hand at the end of the 1944 fiscal year.

RUSSIAN CANNON SMASH AT NAVAL BASE OF STETTIN

LONDON, March 6 (AP)—Soviet troops have thrust within 13 miles of Stettin by the mouth of the Oder river, the German high command said today, as Russians guns pounded the suburbs of the naval base of Stettin itself.

The Germans declared Marshal Gregory Zhukov's spearheads had been stopped north-east of Gollnow at a point 13 miles from the bay, Gollnow northwest Stargard, and southwest of Naugard, both seized yesterday.

Moscow dispatches said Zhukov's first White Russian army advancing steadily beyond Stargard, 19 miles east of Stettin, and Naugard, 15 miles from the coast, and tightening his flank on the Baltic coast in preparation for a new push on Stettin.

The Germans also reported local breaches by the second White Russian army. The Volhynian infantry corps, under the command of General Guderian, was reported to have broken through the German lines near Danzig.

Yank Drive Goes Deeper in Cologne



PARIS, March 6 (AP)—The fall of Cologne appeared imminent today and Berlin said the high command had ordered a general retreat across the Rhine.

Converging spearheads of three American first army divisions already had overrun more than one-third of Cologne, without meeting more than half-hearted resistance from German snipers.

Twenty-four hours after their entry into the city's outskirts, the Yanks were at or beyond the ancient wall ringing the fortified center of Cologne. First and explosions shook the inner districts, indicating the coming of German troops putting the torch to their last strongholds and preparing to flee across the river.

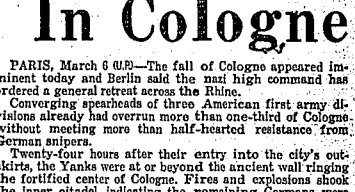
Stockholm press dispatches from Berlin said the Germans themselves were conceding defeat in the 12-day battle of the Rheinfeld.

No Sudden Easing of Pilots' Tests, Inspector Tells Class

Potential private pilots awaiting the day when no written tests will be required have one final, judging by the talk given in Twin Falls Monday night by Dwight C. Reynolds, senior inspector of the civil aeronautics administration.

The occasion of the address was the initial graduation of the Idaho Aviation ground school, held in the McCord building. An interested audience of the 20 graduates, their families, well wishers and a host of other friends gathered in the auditorium from surrounding towns heard Inspector Reynolds' talk and peppered him with questions after it.

Reynolds' appearance was especially appreciated by the group since they are to be flying solo in the snow-bound Idaho Falls, with no doubt, the weather. He said that he, however, in time to take his place on the program.

Mr. Reynolds, chief manager of Idaho Aviation, acting as master of ceremonies, welcomed the audience, congratulated those who had completed the course, and praised the work of Charlie T. Allen, who taught the course.

"In a more serious vein the inspector told them: 'As you fly you will thank your knowledge of meteorology, your navigation, etc. for getting you out of tough spots. In fact you will wish you had more.'"

"Locally, you can follow the Snake river up or down, or the main highway. Get into other territory, however, and you'll fall back on your navigation."

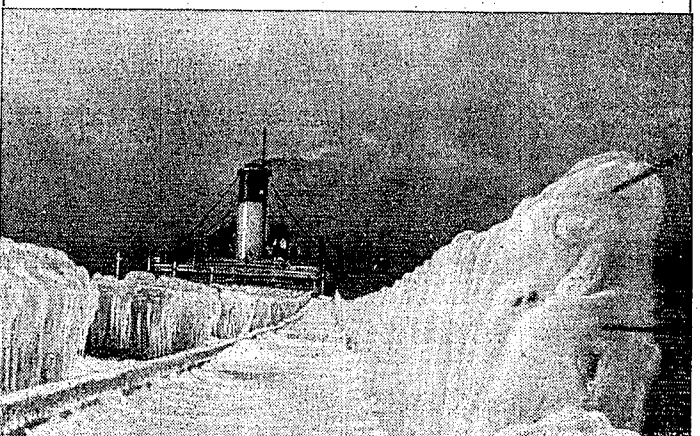

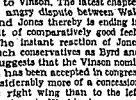

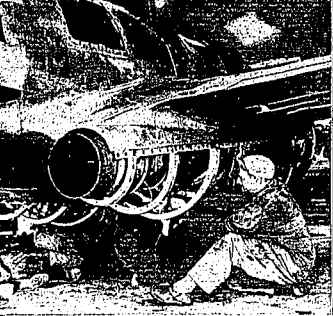
