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### MEAT SITUATION GROWING WORSE

CHICAGO, March 19 (AP)—The meat shortage will get much worse before it gets any better, and members of the armed forces as well as civilians will feel the pinch, the American Meat Institute warned today.

On the basis of a nationwide survey conducted at request of OPA, the institute reported a growing shortage of meats of all kinds—ranging from famine in many parts of the country.

Blame for the current aggravated shortage is laid on the government, which, the institute charges, failed to take necessary steps despite warnings.

The institute charged that price controls which do not reflect the cost paid for livestock coupled with regulations which discourage feeders from fattening cattle to maturity have brought about an "uncontrolled, extensive and growing black market in all kinds of meat."

Principal reasons for the shortage are listed as:

A growing black market in all kinds of meat.  
Diversion of large quantities of meat from normal, legitimate commercial outlets.  
Regulations which have the effect of discouraging cash feeders from bringing more than a range animal to the maturity and weight of finished beef.  
Government price controls which have resulted in wholesale selling prices, insufficient to reflect the prices currently paid for livestock.

### Milk and Butter Shortage Defined

BUTTE, March 19.—A. H. Berg, who attended the recent convention of the Idaho Dairy association in Chicago, addressed the Butte Rotary club. He said that subsidies are controlling milk and butter production and accused them of discrimination.

He declared the dairy situation is critical. The shortage of milk has caused many farmers to sell and dairy cows for the market which would increase their income on other products. He said a survey of the eastern dairies showed that few food cans are in use.

Another proof that marketable cattle are being sold is the fact that in an over abundance of corn is in storage in the midwest, he said. Cpl.
