FREEZE BUDGETS

OPA Starts to Cut Cost of Living; Freezes Clothing-Furniture Prices

WASHINGTON, March 20 (U.P.)—The office of price administration moved ahead today in a program to cut living costs by changing drastically the method of fixing price ceilings in the retail clothing and furniture field.

Under the new order, some 300,000 retail stores are to be "frozen" their mark-ups—the difference between what they pay for an article and what they sell it for—about where they were yesterday in each general class of goods. Hereafter, retail ceiling prices for furniture and clothing were frozen at the highest price charged by the seller in March, 1942.

Price Administrator Chester Bowles explained that the new set-up was intended to pass along to consumers the lower prices expected to take effect under the government's new low-cost clothing program and under similar low-cost furniture and house furnishings programs now being planned.

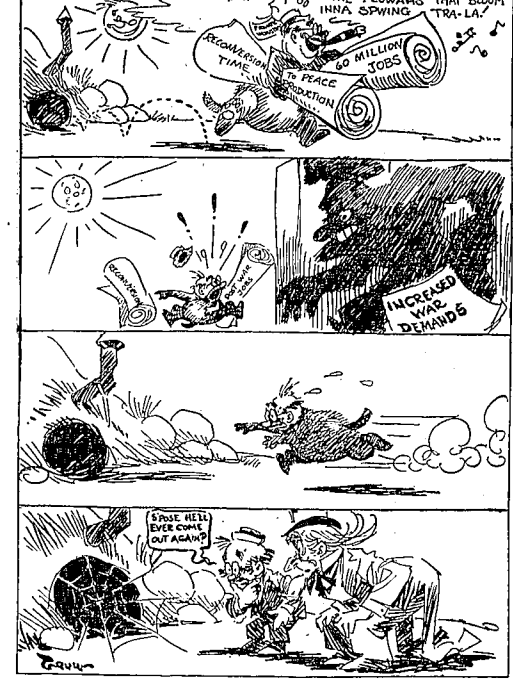

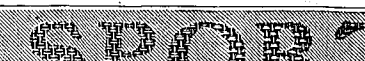

LIGHTS APPROVED FOR NEW AREAS

City councilmen Monday night approved a street lighting plan for the newly-annexed areas of Twin Falls as submitted by the Idaho Power company following a survey that had been made of the area during the past 90 days.

The installed officials of the power firm to proceed with the installation of lights in the new areas as soon as possible. The city will not purchase the lights but will purchase the necessary equipment for installing the additional to the present street lighting system.

Present plan

Ralph W. Carpenter and Fred M. Ingraham, district manager and sales manager, respectively, of the power firm, presented a sketch of the city showing the present lighting system and the proposed additions.

Under the plan submitted, 118 street lights would be placed in the area added to the city. Power firm officials along with Mayor Bert A. Sweet, Truman T. Greenhugh, commissioner of streets and public improvements, and City Engineer John Haver also had a survey of the city this week to see if any changes should be made in the intersections that have been surveyed for lights.

Questioned by Mayor Sweet as to when installation could be expected, the engineer said he could not be fixed time due to the difficulty encountered in obtaining equipment and manpower to do the job.

However, it was decided that main thoroughfares in the city would be given first consideration in the new lighting installation program. These streets include Locust south, highway 20, Kimberly road, east Addition, Lewis boulevard, west Addition and north Washington.

Of the new lights to be installed under the present plan, 48 would be of the 250 lumen type and would be used on the principal thoroughfares while 70 lamps of 1,000 lumens each would be placed in the new residential areas.

Cost Estimated

Cost of the lights in the new areas will amount to \$242.50 per month under the plan submitted by the power firm.

It was also suggested that the city replace some of the present 1,000 lumen type bulbs on main traffic lanes within the city with lights of 2,500 lumens. This could be done at an increased cost of 75 cents per light each, Ingram said.

This would afford 100 per cent more light to the areas where the change was made, the power firm official said, at a cost increase of only 42 per cent.

While the council generally approved the plan, there was no action taken on the matter at this time.

Sewer Plans

Only other major business to come before the council was a report by Engineer Haver as to progress on plans for sewer extensions in the new areas. He exhibited maps showing proposed mains in the new sections and plans for tying into existing lines.

Building permits were granted to William S. Thietter, 236 Elm street north, for a breakfast room addition costing \$186, and to W. F. Sweet for construction of a 4 by 14 foot frame house on lot 17, block 2, South Park, at a cost of \$400.

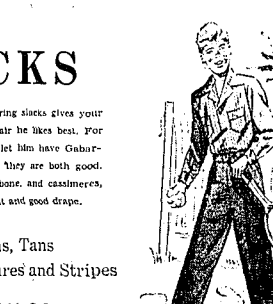

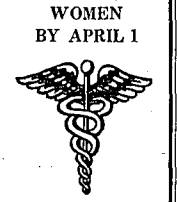

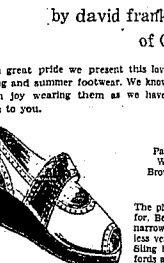
