Governor Vetoes Horse Racing Bill

BOISE, March 21 (AP)—Pari-mutuel betting or any other kind is still illegal in Idaho today as a result of Gov. Charles C. Gossett's last-minute veto of the measure which would have permitted the practice after the federal ban on horse-racing is lifted.

The governor signed into law the measure placing a two-cent tax on every pack of cigarettes sold in the state. Gossett quoted Attorney General Frank Langley in his veto message on the racing bill, saying the measure would have been unconstitutional because it permits a three-man racing commission to expend racing taxes collected without appropriations or without approval of the board of examiners.

"The commission would have collected five per cent of the betting machines' take, under the bill, and 20 per cent of that would have been used by the commission to administer the law," the governor said.

Gossett also pointed out that it would be impossible for the commission to operate immediately because of the federal ban on racing. No appropriation was provided for in the bill.

Provisions of the new tax commission, created by constitutional amendment in the last session, would be subject of a court case to be argued in the next session of the board of examiners.

Other measures vetoed by the governor in the last few days before all bills passed would have become law. A significant one would have been to increase the tax on diesel fuel to create a small income tax on the distribution and sale of diesel fuel, to allow withdrawal of funds from century clauses.

Provisional interpretation of the diesel fuel law was given by Gov. Charles C. Gossett, who said the purpose was to increase the tax on the present tax which is the same as that on gasoline. The governor said it might have been interpreted to place an additional tax on the fuel.

Gossett signed the finance bill which increases the size of district courts and increases equalization funds to help counties. The law provides that school districts and counties make levies of three to five per cent, but that they may participate in the equalization fund.

BOY, 13, WOUNDED IN RIFLE MISHAP

DONALD DAY, 13-year-old son of Earl and Helen Day, 1228 Sixth avenue east, was shot and critically wounded shortly after 10 a. m. today when a .22 caliber rifle he was cleaning at his home accidentally discharged.

The boy, who is a Times-News carrier, had remained out of school for nearly a week because of a cold. He had been reading a book in his bedroom when he decided to clean his rifle, his father said.

In some unexplained manner a bullet discharged from the rifle struck him in his leg and as he was leaning over to load it, the bullet struck his chest, he said. He was taken to the hospital for treatment.

The short, stout, eight-year-old boy, who is the youngest of six children, was with his mother, who was cleaning his rifle from the residence, heard the shot and ran to her son's side.

She found him unconscious and bleeding badly. An ambulance was called and he was taken to Twin Falls county general hospital for treatment.

Early Wednesday afternoon surgeons were X-raying in an attempt to locate where the bullet had lodged. It was understood either blood poisoning or a transfusion was to be administered.

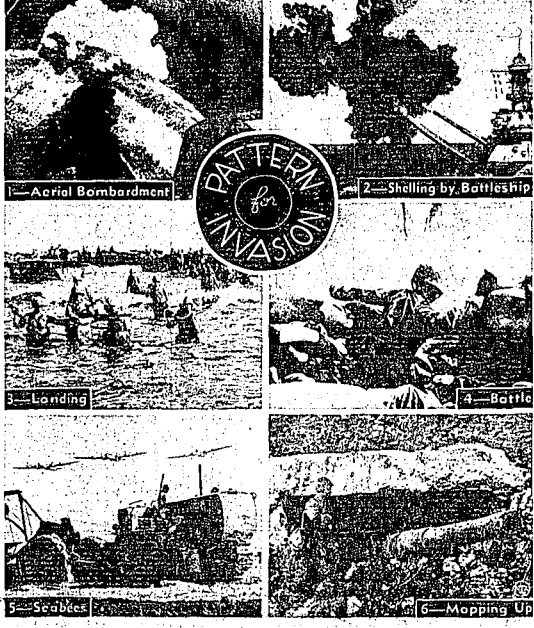

AMERICANS NEAR HESSIAN CAPITAL

PARIS, March 21 (AP)—Third Army columns moved within six miles of the great city of Wiesbaden and the Hessian capital of Kassel today in the whirlwind conquest of the Saarland and Palatinate which already has cost the Germans 80,000 casualties.

The Saar valley, with its steel mills and vast coal deposits, was won from Germany the third largest industrial area.

Important cities such as Saarbrücken (population 370,000), Kaiserslautern (61,000), Worms (50,000), the Saarland steel center of Voelklingen (41,000) and Zweibrücken (110,000) were captured by the American 8th and seventh armies.

Destruction of the German forces was so complete it seemed doubtful that Hitler's army could rally for a stand in strength east of the Rhine, where earlier offensive areas in the Saar valley.

Already the lack of punching power east of the Rhine was apparent in German ranks. Prisoners plodded dejectedly in the rear in uncounted thousands. The enemy had thrown the best troops from the first parachute and sixth panzer armies at the Remagen bridgehead and failed to check its advance.

Gen. Alexander M. Patch's Seventh Army captured nine cities before forcing the trap around the Saarland in conjunction with Patton's Third Army 12 miles west of the Rhine. The two armies were squeezing German stragglers in a double-headed pincer.

General Eisenhower told civilians and foreign workers to flee the Saar valley. The evacuation of civilians and military staff as well as five or six picked armies opposite the Saar valley and to back up its warning.

SEARCH GUARANTY SOUGHT BY FDR

WASHINGTON, March 21 (AP)—The government wants to find out whether American wage-earners can be held back from their war jobs for 40 hours of work every week.

President Roosevelt late yesterday asked the advisory board on war mobilization and reconversion to investigate the subject.

The board chairman, O. Max Gardner, promptly appointed a committee to get the job started. Its members are President Eric Foner, labor lawyer Arthur J. Altmeyer, and labor relations Commissioner, President Philip Murray of the Congress of Industrial Organizations.

The president directed the inquiry into the subject of a general recommendation made at the time it denied a demand by the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America that its members be employed to guarantee their 40-hour week.

FOOD FIRM GETS LARGE CONTRACT

JEROME, March 21—The Jerome Food Products company yesterday announced that it has just been awarded another government contract which calls for a half million dry pounds of dehydrated potatoes.

The plant, which works "round the clock" has already run 17,500,000 raw pounds of potatoes. It was announced by Fred Bruckner, company plant manager, who stated that the plant has been in operation this season since September, 1944.

The recent contract awarded the company will keep it in operation until June 1 of this year, he declared, and further stated that the plant has an approximate eight million raw pounds on hand to be completed this season.

"Up to date we have run twice the amount that we processed last year as a result of the fact that we installed new and better equipment," Bruckner went on to state that last year's crop operation was from November to June 20.

According to word just received from the quartermaster department of the army, the plant will now have to produce more than 100 million raw pounds this season over the period which lands have been over by the enemy.

The plant at Jerome furnishes a payroll of approximately \$100,000 per week. Mr. Bruckner pointed out.
