HOW TO CONQUER REICH ON MAPS

As the western allies throw their mightly forces into the trans-Pennine assault which marks the opening of the final decisive battle, we shall be better prepared to follow this historic engagement if we pause now to check on the general strategy and objectives of the combatants.

So if you turn to your maps you shall work the thing out together. (Editor's note: Map of Germany is on this page.) And let's amplify it by direct question and answer, like this:

Question: What are the immediate allied objectives? Answer: (1) To capture the great industrial Ruhr, which has been Hitler's number one source of war manufactures, (2) To force the six German armies or remnants of armies) to make a stand, with the purpose of annihilating them. (3) To prevent the route to Berlin and the heart of the Reich for a junction with the Russians.

Question: What are the purposes of the Hiltelites? Answer: To do exactly what they are doing for long months, namely, continue to wage a defensive war. What general strategy will the allies follow? Answer: Your map will show that the Ruhr stretches back from the Rhine in the Dusseldorf region. The Ruhr is densely covered with factories and towns, and presents a tremendous obstacle for an attacking army. This being so, why should the allies make a frontal attack? The answer is that they may not be willing so but may be choosing the alternative of thrusting out on both sides of the Ruhr and dealing with it after they have it in a sack.

Question: What is the relative strength of the opposing forces? Answer: The Nazis are badly smashed and disintegrated. The bulk of the front. The allies have numerical superiority in troops, and a vast superiority in tanks, planes, other equipment. They also are going into battle with the greatest air forces ever put together to oppose the ghost of the once huge Luftwaffe.

JEROME OFFICER IN FAMED SQUAD

JEROME, March 24.—Lieut. Walter B. Henry, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bryan Henry, Jerome, is a member of the famous "Long Beach" squad of the AAF, which recently celebrated their second year of combat in the Pacific in the south and southwest Pacific.

Frequently referred to as "the suicide boys," they are credited with having struck more than 100 targets, made more than 800 sorties, completed almost 500 missions, and have shot down nearly 500 enemy aircraft.

Planes Destroyed
In addition they have destroyed 169 planes on the ground, have sunk 17,275 tons of enemy shipping, damaged 100,000 tons of supplies, 13,200 tons of bombs over targets, participated in eight major campaigns and participated in the Philippines liberation.

This is the longest flying outfit in the world, and is the most traveled "heroic" in any theater.

Lieutenant Henry, a member of the group which has just completed 31 missions, bombing important targets, has been overseas since last September. He is now in the Molokai Islands.

Daylight Attacks
The air force bent its every effort early in the Pacific to night missions, but is now "specializing" in daylight attacks.

At Truk, which was the night target in the Pacific, the fighters shot down 31 Jap planes and destroyed 40 on the ground. This was considered the hottest air battle of its kind in the Pacific at the time.

The air force group received the presidential unit citation, which is the first ever conferred, and "blew the hell out of it."

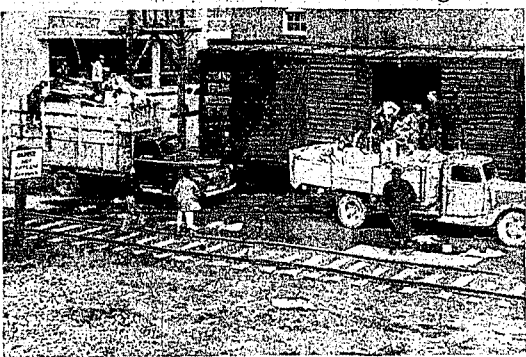

TWO CARS FILLED WITH OLD PAPER

Thousands of pounds of waste paper—in fact enough to fill two railroad box cars with a little left over—was realized as a result of a week's drive by Scouts and Cubs in the Magic Valley. The Magic Valley officials in charge announced Saturday evening.

The first plan was to fill one car parked on a siding behind the Pacific Diamond—B. B. company garage, but by early afternoon that car was overloaded. Another car was spotted near the freight yard, and before evening this too had been completely filled.

Loading of the initial car was slowed Friday by rain, snow and a high wind but on Saturday everything but the high wind had disappeared and the work speeded up. Scores of trucks brought the paper to the loading areas.

Boy Scouts and Cubs as well as Scouters from the following communities combined to fill the car loaded here:

Ketchum, Bellevue, Carey, Fairfield, Hagerman, Gooding, Blitzen, Dietrich, Shoshone, North Shoshone, Jerome, Halley, Buhl, Castelford, Filer, Zeton, Kimberly, Hansen, Mullan, Hazelton, Wendell and Twin Falls.

For their work in the campaign, Scouts or Cubs who collected 1,000 pounds of paper will receive a special medal from General Eisenhower while each unit (troop or pack) averaging 1,000 pounds of paper will be appropriately engraved.

Ray Blainforth, area Scout executive, said that the paper drive, because of its success, would continue until April 1 and that an attempt will be made to load two more cars by that time. Details will be announced later. He also said that paper collected by Scouts and Cubs in the balance of the drive will go toward the awards and medals and the shell cases.

No Partial Navy Demobilizing When Nazis Fall, Says King

WASHINGTON, March 24.—There will be no partial demobilization of the navy when Germany is defeated, says Fleet Adm. Ernest J. King, because "all naval forces are required to prosecute the war in the Pacific."

King, chief of naval operations and commander-in-chief of the fleet, said yesterday:

"It is the intent to shift to the Pacific all naval power now devoted to the war in Europe and in the Atlantic as soon as may be. This shift must be made as expeditiously as possible, to the end that the war in the Pacific may be brought to a successful conclusion at the earliest possible date."

King emphasized that "it is most important for the people of the country to understand clearly that the navy must use every ounce of its strength to hasten the end of hostilities against Japan. Any half-hearted measures will result in prolonging the war and increasing the loss of American lives."

IDAHOAN "SAVES" SCHOOL LUNCHES

WASHINGTON, March 24.—By a one-vote margin, 89 to 88, the House refused today to eliminate the \$50,000,000 school lunch program from the \$33,000,000 agriculture department appropriation bill.

The vote was by tellers and was 89 to 88. Rep. Compston White, D-Ida., rushed out of the cloakroom and lumbered between the official counters just as the tie was about to be announced. His was the vote that defeated the amendment.

Rep. Taker, R. N. Y., offered the amendment to eliminate the fund. He contended it was unnecessary because parents are able to pay for the lunches their children eat at school.

Democrats insisted the program, which the government finances most of the cost, is necessary in many localities for the health of children.

The problem began when Probate Judge C. A. Bailey, on Oct. 8, 1943, decreed a one-quarter interest to each of the heirs.

The plaintiffs stated in their complaint that "the selling price had not been agreed upon; that plaintiffs have refused an offer for the action and agreed to pay him \$300; that each of plaintiffs and defendants be decreed owner of undivided one-quarter that a partition of the estate be made, or if partition cannot be made without prejudice, then a sale of said premises and a division of proceeds should be made."

District Judge J. W. Porter gave the following decree in final settlement of the four-cornered puzzle: "The four people concerned appear not to be able to equitably divide and it would be to the best interests of the parties involved for the property to be sold and proceeds divided as to their best interests."

Three commissioners, J. H. Barker, W. L. Hawkins and George L. Layne, were appointed by the court to sell the property.

J. W. Taylor, Buhl, attorney for the plaintiffs, was awarded \$250 attorney fees.

Family Grateful to MacArthur For Aid in Finding Daughter

GOODING, March 24.—The confinement of a father in the ability of Gen. Douglas MacArthur to help locate his Jap prison-held daughter was revealed when Mrs. Stanley L. Smith, sole of rearing word from her sister, Miss Bernice M. Cornelson. The father had addressed a letter to the general at Manila some time before the Philippines were reentered by the American army, asking his assistance in locating his daughter, who had not been heard from since the fall of the city. A former Idaho man, whose name was not revealed, tracked the child of duty recognized the name and wrote to the family, but failed with Miss Cornelson for 15 minutes.

When Manila was occupied by the Japanese army on Jan. 2, 1942, Miss Cornelson was first interned with other Americans at Santo Tomas and later, about three weeks ago and 40 other missionaries were released and permitted to reside at the Harris memorial training school in Manila, where they had considerable freedom and were not under guard.

In the spring of 1942, however, the Japanese military cut off all direct charging that some of the missionaries had engaged in espionage activities for the Americans, favored the entire group to a prison camp, presumed to be Barro Colorado, about 45 miles northeast of Manila.

The only direct word Mrs. Smith has had from her sister was from letters which she wrote in August and September, 1942, but which were not received until October, 1942, being brought to the States on the Orizaba. One of the letters was Miss Margaret Evans, roommate of Miss Cornelson at the Harris school.

Miss Cornelson was graduated from the University of Idaho in 1921. She is a charter member of Morant Board at the university. She spent 12 years as a Methodist missionary in South America, six years at Lima, Peru, and six at Rosario, Argentina, which she returned to the States with the Hing-rank army officer, who wrote to the family of Miss

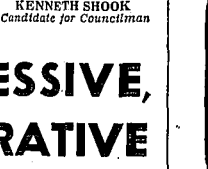

An advertiser who believes the way the traditional bunny does is Gaynor Madison, who has composed delicious menus of vegetables and fruits to eat on Easter.

She has planned delectable morsels to eat "them" during the try-on day that breed the token services followed by breakfast, dinner and supper.

The cooking expert suggests that Easter dinner be built around four or five fish, one of the steaks, salmon, aspic, salad with lemon honey French dressing, roast quacking with peas and onion stuffing, sprouts, green peas, fresh or quick frozen peas, and cauliflower with sauce, corned beef, and maple nut sauce, coffee, milk.

Six onions, 1 tablespoon powdered sage, 1 teaspoon poultry seasoning, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup onion pepper, 2 cup crumbed bread.

Peel onions, boil until tender, then chop finely and mix with remaining ingredients and mix thoroughly. If bread is very dry soak it in water before crumbing. When squeezed as dry as possible.

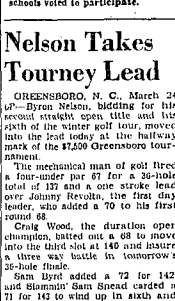
