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NEW ONSLAUGHTS PRESAGE ATTACK ON JAPAN ITSELF

WASHINGTON, March 26 (AP)—Japanese broadcasts reported today American amphibious forces were "attempting to invade" two of the Ryukyu islands, in the center of an area of announced attacks by the Japanese navy and air.

The Japanese invasion report said sea-borne Yanks struck at Toka and Aka islands about 15 miles west of Okinawa, major island of the Ryukyu chain.

Japanese propaganda said the islands were being attacked as prelude for an assault on Japan proper, 350 miles north.

Admiral Chester W. Nimitz announced the Ryukyus were shelled by the 16-inch guns of America's most modern battleships today and Saturday while carrier planes swept over half a dozen islands, centering their attacks around Okinawa.

Sea-borne planes reached to the waters off the Ryukyus where they slipped out an eight-ships convoy consisting of three cargo vessels and five escorting warships.

Japanese ground troops in central China advanced as much as 25 miles in a 40-mile front, while the Japanese in Burma and the Philippines suffered further setbacks.

Japanese columns seized Ichang, 145 miles northwest of Hankow and only 50 miles from the U. S. air base. British forces captured six towns in central Burma and in one 15-mile advance further south.

Japan's vast "people's volunteer army," being mobilized to meet the war situation, will include "graduates" of the elementary school of the national school who are over 14 years of age, men below 60, and women younger than 40.

MANPOWER BILL HITS COAL FIGHT

WASHINGTON, March 26 (AP)—Compulsory manpower legislation, which in some quarters as a potent anti-strike measure by the War Relocation Authority, changed the vacation plans of many housewives.

They were summoned back to the capital to begin considering the bill in the House of Representatives today.

Very individual not in the armed forces had an obligation to work in the war effort, the bill provided, however, to allow a reasonable salary for a secretary for the commissions.

As now drawn to adjust sharp differences between the two chambers, the manpower bill gives War Relocation Authority power to fix employment ceilings for any plant or industry, control the use of labor, and transfer workers, these employees in their jobs.

Employers and employees violating the bill are liable for penalties ranging from \$100 to \$500. Unlike the original house bill, the legislation contains no provision for the government to force men who leave their jobs or refuse to work in violation of the bill today by the National War Relocation Authority.

The act does not restrict the penalties to employers alone.

Nurse Drafting Opposed by WCTU

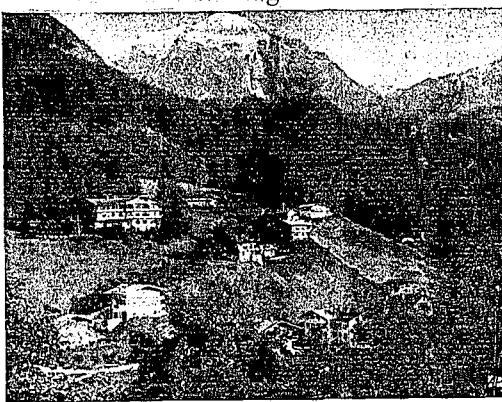
WASHINGTON, March 26 (AP)—Nurse draft legislation was opposed today by the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union as a measure for the enslavement of women.

Asserting the army has not yet made up its mind as to the induction of nurses, Miss Elizabeth A. Smart, Washington representative of the WCTU, told a senate military sub-committee.

She said the act would be a legalized slavery, as a civilian, that enforces a duty on nurses because no nation rises higher than the ideals of its mothers.

It would, in her judgment, be more profitable for the government to acquire a few hundred or a couple of thousand nurses to break the terrible problems of the nation, the conception of women.

8 Paratroopers Land in Wrong Spot; Have to Dodge Nazi Bullets

WITH BRITISH PARATROOPERS, March 26 (AP)—This is the story of eight paratroopers who jumped in the wrong place. When our planeload of young British jumpers took off from an English airfield this morning, a general commanding the British airborne division told us we were jumping squarely on strong forces of first class German troops.

But paratroopers are born optimists, or they wouldn't be paratroopers. We were all highly confident, that is except for the usual fears we would be killed either in jumping or by the ground.

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Plunge Through Broken Nazi Forces Over Plains; Miss Are 250 Miles off

PARIS, March 26 (AP)—The American third army closed within six miles of Frankfurt-on-the-Main today and sent its tanks racing through broken German lines on the central German plains within 250 miles of Russian lines.

The first army to the north exploded north or broke through of decaying German defenses comparable to the victory at St. Lo, advancing three miles near Berlin overnight from the Remagen-Bonn sector. A dozen villages fell.

The American ninth army advanced five miles deeper into the rubble heap of the Ruhr past outlasted Duisburg, deepening its lower Rhine front to at least 10 miles. The British second army with at least one famous Canadian division pushed 10 miles east of the Rhine on the flat Westphalian plains.

More than 80 miles of the east Rhine banks are firmly in allied hands. The final campaign to crush Germany was being launched by massive victories all the way from Wesel to below Frankfurt.

Nowhere is the bewildered and severely bleb wehrmacht able to check the mighty tide of more than 1,250,000 shock troops General Eisenhower had massed on the western front for the first time.

Lieut. Gen. George S. Patton's third army made new crossings of the upper Rhine. SOLOMONS VICTOR TAKEN BY DEATH

WASHINGTON, March 26 (AP)—Major William H. Rupertus, 32, of the marine corps, who commanded the first landing on the island of the Solomons campaign, died suddenly last night at the Washington navy hospital.

A native of Washington, Rupertus was in the marine corps since 1912. He was commissioned second lieutenant. Advanced to brigadier-general when the invasion of the Solomons began in August, 1942, he led the marines who captured Tulagi and the island of Guadalcanal. When Lieut.-Gen. A. Vandegrift was recalled from the island, Rupertus became commander of the marine corps. Rupertus succeeded him as commander of the first marine division, and directed the campaign that resulted in capture of Cape Gloucester and three islands off New Britain island. Gen. Douglas MacArthur named him as the first service medal on Rupertus after the New Britain campaign.

During World War I he served on the battleship Florida and rose to captain. Later he served in Italy, where he won the Italian distinction service medal and the Italian Croix de Guerre. In 1928, he was assigned to the American Legion marine guard at Pekin, with rank of major.

Rupert Woman, 68, Called by Illness

RUPERTUS, March 26 (AP)—Mrs. Daniel A. MacKendrick, 68, died in her home south of Rupert after a stroke suffered three years ago. The second stroke followed shortly before her death.

Mrs. MacKendrick was born in Ohio, where she married Mr. MacKendrick in 1910. They came to Minnesota to work on a project, homesteading the place that has since been her home.

Survivors include her husband, three sons, Merrill and Leo, Rupert, and Justice, of California; and one daughter in Oklahoma.

Services were conducted at the Rupert Christian church, Rev. D. E. Allen officiating. Burial in the Rupert cemetery was directed by the Goodman ministry.

GOP Head Wants Advisory Group

BIRMINGHAM, March 26 (AP)—Proposed by State Republican Chairman S. L. Thorpe, Jerome, members of the GOP state central committee will meet tonight to plan for the organization of an advisory council to the state chairman.

The council would be composed of a representative from each of the party's six districts, the national committee chairman and the state chairman.

The proposal is an alternative to the offer by the GOP central committee for creation of a 150 member advisory committee. Both proposals will be discussed at a meeting of the state central committee in Boise April 22.
