State FFA Opens Sessions; Gossett Awarded Degree

The 14th annual state convention of the Idaho Association of Future Farmers of America opened this afternoon with its business sessions at the Idaho Power company auditorium.

Presiding over the sessions was Milan Bush, Malad, the president. Prior to the opening of the convention this afternoon, members of the executive committee met Wednesday and approved a list of 100 persons who will be awarded honorary State Farmer degrees at a special dinner at the high school Friday night.

The eight to receive honorary degrees are Gus Chubb, 50 miles Idaho Commissioner of Agriculture George Hervey, formerly of Idaho Falls, C. B. Bly, manager of the Idaho Pulp Lumber Company, and Frank Adams, a live stock man—also from Idaho Falls; A. F. Purkin, vocational agriculture teacher at Blackfoot high school; Charles Heath, farmer and former instructor at Nigby high school; John A. Bantz, novice expert of agricultural education at the Boise high school; and H. H. Jones, farmer and president of the Jerome Cooperative Creamery.

Most of those to receive the honorary degrees will appear in person. The governor has advised members of the committee for the award to attend.

The State Farmer degrees will be awarded to those F. F. A. members who can qualify. They will be selected from a list of 200 names. Those to be awarded include the following: Stanley S. Nicholas, state supervisor of vocational education, Boise.

How Near Is Victory?

PARIS, March 29 (AP)—When will the war in Europe end? The nearest thing to an expert opinion available at supreme allied headquarters is that the final collapse of German resistance is still a considerable distance away.

How far away will depend upon our ability to keep supplies flowing across the Rhine—on which not a single permanent bridge remains—and streaming through a hostile countryside to our speeding armored spearheads.

"The Germans' worst problem is transportation. Largely because of allied air raids, German railways are broken and unusable. Gasoline shortage hampers use of motor vehicles.

What is the pattern for crushing Germany? The best answer in the cloudy crystal ball at this moment seems to be the systematic destruction of the remaining German resistance—the gradual hammering of the diehard thugs and Nazi outthroats into the southern Alpine redoubt and then turning loose upon them the concentrated power of the allied air forces.

Lieut. Gen. Courtney H. Hodges U. S. First Army advanced 20 miles along a line from north and east of captured Glessen, 33 miles north of Frankfurt.

The Americans drove 16 miles north of Glessen along the Lahn river to capture the highway center of Marburg, and wheeled 60 miles eastward to take Ansbach. There they were 200 miles southwest of Berlin and advancing almost without opposition to the northeast.

The fall of Glessen gave the Americans one of the main German supply centers of the central front, but there was no immediate indication as to how much enemy equipment was in it at top speed.

Front troops of the high-velocity fliers as saying the Germans were fleeing the area at top speed, abandoning everything that was left of their flight.

At least 13,000 prisoners were rounded up by the first army's armored spearheads and infant units mopping up the highway center of Glessen. It was one of the biggest one-day gains reported by the rampaging first army since it broke into the West.

Purple Heart Vets Give Seats To Wounded; Civilians Sit

A local navy man didn't much believe it when he read in the Times-News that passengers on a bus here let a one-eyed veteran aboard.

Three soldier veterans boarded the bus at Ogden. They were all on crutches and had to be helped aboard. An elderly lady about 70 stood up and offered her place to one of them. He naturally refused. Then an army first lieutenant with European duty crutches and a civilian veteran of the Pacific, also wearing the purple heart, did likewise.

The two veterans of the purple heart—the first lieutenant and the marine—together with the soldier on crutches stood up the entire 30 some miles between Ogden and Brigham City. A majority of the bus passengers—many of them women—were cheering and waving.

As a sidelight on the trip, the navy man reported that all the bus stations he visited on the trip, the local one is the only one where the veterans and their wives are permitted on the bus. At all other places he touched, he said, the servicemen—wounded or not—take their chances in the crowd and many are left behind after the bus is filled.

"The group embarked aboard a destroyer on Jan. 30, and at evening next day arrived opposite the emergency field."

Gasoline saved "The gasoline drums were put over the side in rafts which the ship's boats attempted to tow ashore, but due to extremely rough seas the plan was abandoned after losing the first boat."

"The gasoline drums were then dumped into the sea outside the breakers and the volunteer detail swam ashore with the gasoline drums after the destroyer had left the area for security reasons. All but 20 drums were rescued and finally placed on the emergency strip three-fourths of a mile from the beach, with the aid of natives and an Australian flying officer."
