

OFFICER BANKS ON NIPPON STUPIDITY

PHILIPPINES AIRBASE, April 5 (AP)—"I have complete confidence in the stupidity of the Japanese," That was Brig.-Gen. Frederic Smith's reply when he was asked his opinion on Nippon's ability to bolster her toppling air force for the final assault on Japan proper.

The youthful commander of the 15th air force fighters does not think the Japanese have either brains or ability to stage a comeback in the air.

"They have lost their potential to train personnel in the numbers needed, to build up the necessary reserve of aircraft, to fight off devastation of their aircraft factories," said Smith, a Virginia regular army man and a veteran of aerial combat in the P.O. Mustang.

"They never were very good and they're getting worse fast. When it comes to aircraft—production, organization, combat—the pace out here has been too fast for them since the tide of the war turned."

He doubts that the Japanese ever again will be able to fight as furiously as they did at Rabaul, Truk, Wakea or even Iwo Jima.

"The pilots and ground crews they need are either dead or bolted back in the Gilberts, Marshalls, Carolines, Solomons and New Guinea," he said.

WOMEN PLANNING GARDEN PROFITS

SHOSHONE, April 5—Farm women cooperating with FSA in Bingham county expect to add \$125 to \$200 to farm income this year by gardens reports Mrs. Ruth B. Robinson, farm security home management supervisor.

FSA home-makers are particularly stress laying out a garden large enough to meet the family food needs for summer and winter use. Location of the garden in walking distance of the kitchen door, a good fence to keep out livestock and poultry, early ordering of seed and fertilizer are being emphasized in this year's plans.

Another garden practice growing in popularity is to set aside a corner of the plot for a herb garden. While many families grow dill and parsley, other herbs such as sage, thyme, sweet marjoram, chives and mint usually do well. Most of the herbs can be used fresh or dried for later use.

While the size of gardens usually depends on the type of soil and types of vegetables, fruits and berries raised, it must also be based on the needs and preferences of the family, Mrs. Robinson said. One family, she said, raised all its vegetables and berries in a garden less than an acre.

Hog Price Ceiling Boost Plea Denied

POCAHELLO, April 5 (AP)—Price Administrator Chester Bowles has turned down a request for a \$225 per 100 weight increase in the ceiling price of hogs raised in Idaho.

Alfred C. Gordon, counsel for the Idaho Farm Bureau federation, has received a letter from Bowles stating that any increase to eastern Idaho growers would unbalance the market.

"It would be extremely difficult to hold the line against inflation if such a ceiling were granted in livestock markets in one area, unless prices were so low there as to defeat hog production," the letter said.

Bowles received resolutions from the federation and Gaylord Larson, president of the Franklin County Livestock Marketing association, asking a boost from \$14.75 to \$17 per 100 weight.

"Although the memories prompted by the scenes in this book may not all be pleasant it is believed that this volume will serve as a memento of a job well done. In the future years may it also serve to remind you that your hardships and sacrifices of the past two years have helped immeasurably to win the war—and save the lives of fellow Americans."

BERNARD BARUCH HOLDS BIG STICK

LONDON, April 5 (AP)—Bernard M. Baruch, adviser to President Roosevelt, said today that "one reason why over here is to hold a big stick over the big boys to make damn sure they're not going to fool up the peace."

Baruch, who has found a parallel—his time in 1934 in Paris—held forth with American soldiers, brushed off a call from Prime Minister Churchill to give an interview to a team and stripes reporter.

"We've got to de-industrialize Germany and Japan—at least for a generation," Baruch said in an interview with Victor Lasky, the army newspaper reporter. "So they won't report to war again. Also we've got to see that those subsidized slave-labor countries do not again flood the world with their cheap products, lowering the standard of living here in the United States."

Baruch predicted there would be such a wave of prosperity in the United States after the war that none of the service men overseas would have to worry about a job.

Cows were steady at \$10.50 to \$12.

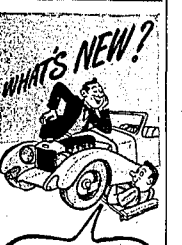

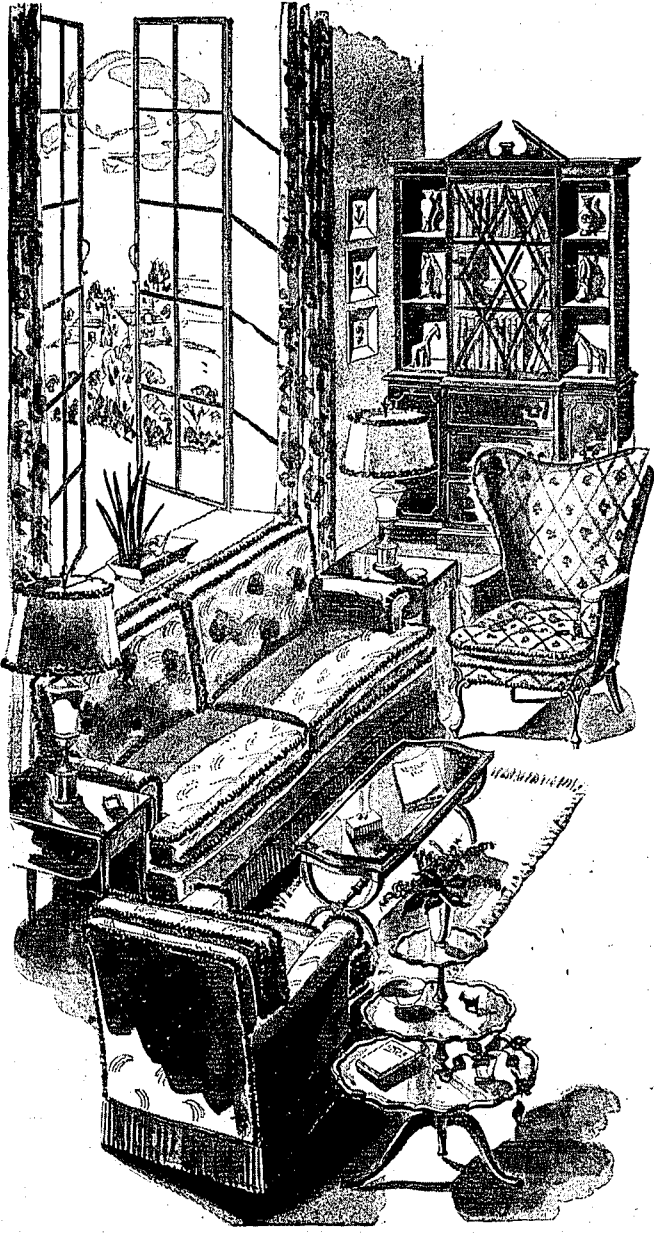
