

YANKEES PLOUGH DEEP INTO REICH

Czechoslovakia and a complete severance of north and south Germany. The aerial army of the United States, the 15th Army, is now in the process of ploughing deep into the Reich.

Street fighting raged in such places as Elsenach, Sulpheim, Ebnat, Hainbach, Weibronn, Linz, Lutzen and Doeburg.

Canadian patrols crossed the Neckar River into the Reich, near Arnheim, where allied hopes for an early victory were dashed. The 15th Army, which reached to within 45 miles of the North sea, menaced several second largest cities, from positions 35 miles away.

Back in Germany, the capture of Almeda in Holland and movement 18 miles southeast into Germany. The Germans offered some opposition on the Elben-Rhein, but the British division pushed five miles toward Balingen.

The 6th (Thunderbird) division of the Seventh Army in southern Germany gained up to 20 miles in an area beyond Sinsheim and from 12 to 17 miles southeast of Fulda, following a major breakthrough on the 14th armored division.

The 13th armored (Steel) division, which is moving toward Nurnberg against dogged resistance, is 100 miles from the Rhine. Division fought into Kitzingen, 25 miles southeast of fiercely defended Fulda.

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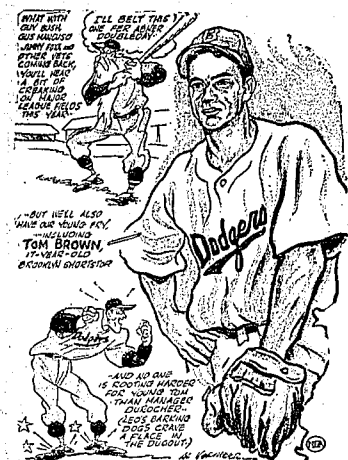

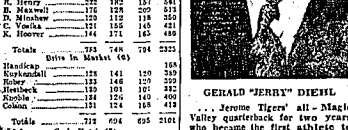
