

Soviets Complete Vienna Conquest

LONDON, April 11 (U.P.)—An Austrian broadcast says the last three Nazi-held districts of Vienna have been cleared, completing liberation of the Austrian capital.

Russian forces are driving along the east bank of the Danube less than eight miles northwest of Floridsdorf. They have narrowed the German escape gap from Vienna to 10 miles, already spanned by artillery fire.

The German DNB agency said the Russians were thrown back to the famous Ringstrasse, a boulevard in the heart of Vienna and just west of the Danube canal. Bitter street battles developed between the parliament building and the Vienna castle.

Liberation of Vienna tops the strongest bastion athwart the back door to Germany and the most hotly-fought defense zone in the Austrian and Bavarian Alps.

Russian forces, without waiting for the trap Vienna had driven beyond 68. Polesen, 33 miles west of the Marzfa Valley, 30 miles from the Danube, 10 miles east of Munich, 14 miles from the Danube, 10 miles from American third army spearheads.

Soviet forces liberated all but three of Vienna's 21 municipal districts in the first week of the offensive. 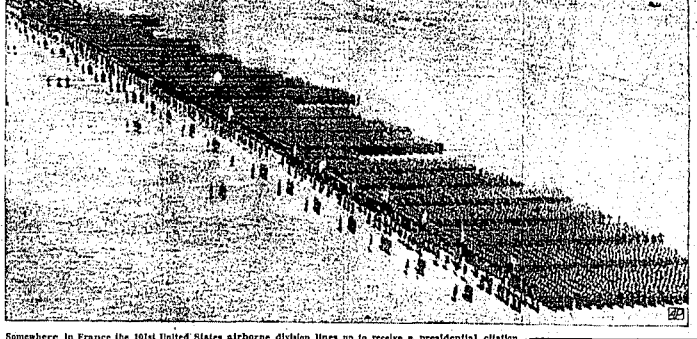

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GRAIN RAIL RATE GIVEN BIG SLASH

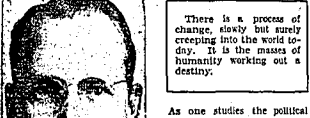

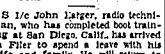

Wheeler stated that although it is impossible to forestall the coming situation, the organization in the west is ready for "almost anything," he particularly stressed the need of camp sites with entrances and hostesses to attend at the camps and hospitals.

It was suggested that the local officials contact commanding officers at the nearest military base and see out a plan which would be of the most aid to the service men and the morale of the patients. It should be coordinated with the doctors there.

Wheeler commented that one of the most desirable things the USO could do was work with the returning veterans in aiding them back into civilian life.

"This," he stated, is the most difficult job and will become more difficult with increasing casualties. Many of the girls have no other ways to entertain boys who may be suffering from complainers after having led such a hard life in the front lines. The volunteers are the backbone of the USO, not the directors or officials.

Aid Station Planned
Some of the new facilities being installed include travelers aid stations for servicemen and their families and laundry rooms where they may do their washing when living in a room. Bath rooms are being installed in the Boise club, the officials reported.

INTERVIEWS FOR DEPENDENTS

Two representatives of the field investigations branch of the war and government office of dependency benefits will be in Twin Falls, April 17 through 18, to interview relatives of service men who are now receiving family allowances. Brig-Gen. J. M. Gilbert, director of the office of dependency, announced yesterday. Officers who will conduct interviews are J. E. Hunsley and Capt. Philip J. Hurwitz. They will be in temporary headquarters here in the civil service room, on the second floor of the post office.

General Gilbert urges that those who have appointments with the interviewers be prompt and also bring with them all evidence listed in the request, including their application number and the soldier's army serial number.

May Depend on Family Allowance
Continuation of appointments payable may depend upon the individuals concerned keeping their appointments. General Gilbert said. These interviews are conducted to determine whether families of service men are receiving proper family allowance payments.

Anyone receiving appointments with the two officers who are coming to Twin Falls should not become careless. General Gilbert said. These interviews are conducted as a matter of course to determine existence and degree of current dependency. General Gilbert stated.

Increase Often Justified
In many instances the interviewers have disclosed facts which justified an increase in the amount payable. Those who are asked to keep an appointment or who desire to contest the interviewers are asked to bring with them a record of their income, including all available financial data and also a statement of their living expenses.

It is recognized that misunderstanding of the law rather than an attempt to obtain erroneous payments accounts for many family applications. General Gilbert said. The reason Major Lundley and Lieutenant Hurwitz are coming to Twin Falls April 17 through April 18 is to clear up any misunderstanding on the part of applicants from this area.

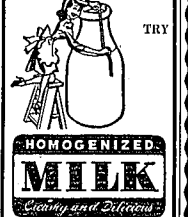
Jerome Marine Home On 30-Day Furlough

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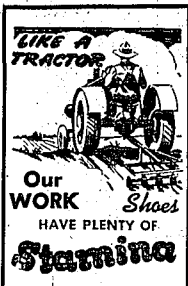
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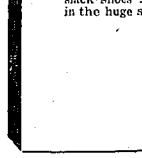


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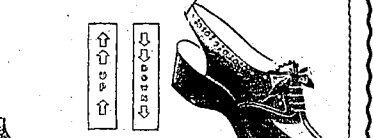
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
