WAR SAYS TO CONSPIRACIES EVEN

Yank Drive Cuts Reich Into Halves

CONTACT! PARIS April 16 (UP)—Aerial vanguards of the American and Russian armies made their first contact above the Leipzig-Dresden corridor today, barely 40 miles ahead of two great United States tank armies plowing through the shattered defenses of central Germany.

PARIS, April 16 (AP)—Third army infantry advanced through eight miles of Czechoslovakian today and a d bisected Germany, whose western front already had been split into northern and southern commands.

The Germans rushed troops and tanks from the eastern front and Berlin to oppose the grave threat to their ruined capital, 45 miles from the ninth army elements north of Magdeburg. The new divisions stamped out the original Elbe river bridgehead at Magdeburg, but another east bank salient at Barby was defended for four and a half days by 50,000 Germans.

The British opened an assault on Bremen and moved to within two and a half miles of that port. The U. S. third army met the German Army of Chemnitz from the same distance, while the first army moved to within 10 miles of the cleared northern third of Halle, 70 miles from the German capital, Dessau, 55 miles southwest of Berlin.

Canadians and Poles reached the North Sea within five miles of Zandvoort, pocketing perhaps 200,000 Germans. The first and second armies, (Continued on Page 3, Column 1)

B-29s Put Torch on Seared Tokyo

WASHINGTON, April 16 (AP)—Four hundred Superfortresses put the torch to Tokyo again today by dropping a second load of incendiary bombs on the city last Saturday's holocaust while the Japanese said, carrier and land-based American aircraft made their second successive joint raid on Japan.

Rank amphibious troops scooped up four more small islands—one near Okinawa, 235 miles from Japan, and three in the Philippines. Ground forces broke up repeated Japanese counterattacks on Okinawa and closed in from three directions on Baguio, Japanese military headquarters in the Philippines. Still blazing fires guided B-29 pilots to Tokyo on the latest attack which began before midnight and continued into the early morning hours. The raid included the 10th and ninth largest city of Japan, was also hit and left burning "like all hell or nothing of earth above."

TRUMAN VICTORY ALREADY SCORED

WASHINGTON, April 16 (AP)—Appearing before congress today in the fourth full day of executive responsibility, the new President already has announced a notable diplomatic victory. That came when the White House marked that Stalin had decided to sign the European conference April 23 by sending Foreign Secretary V. M. Molotov.

Molotov's earlier announcement that Molotov would not attend was a diplomatic reverse in the few days of the Roosevelt administration. It had been noted at the time that the big three foreign secretaries would attend.

Fifty men and others today were counting Stalin's change of mind as a good omen for the Truman administration.

The President himself will not attend the San Francisco party. Our delegation will be headed by Secretary of State Edward R. Stettin. James C. Byrnes will be able to advise Truman on San Francisco problems, and on many other matters. Byrnes accompanied Roosevelt to Yalta. He retained only this month as war mobilization director. He has intimate knowledge of foreign and domestic problems.

Most indisputable to Mr. Truman, and he is a veteran of congress and a member of the supreme court.

It all adds up to near-certainty that Byrnes will have an important place in the Truman administration. The fact that he travelled to and from Hyde Park yesterday, the Truman railroad car and stood with the Truman family at yesterday's luncheon—these guests in the Roosevelt villa—was not lost upon the political conscious anywhere.

If crucial cabinet changes extend to the state department, it is not unlikely that Byrnes will become secretary of state.

He recently returned from somewhere in the south Pacific, where he was stationed for the past 14 months.

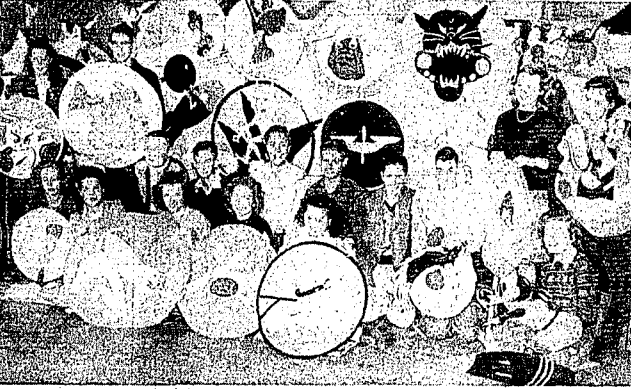

SPRING ASSAULT IN ITALY STARTS

ROME, April 16 (AP)—Gen. Mark W. Clark announced today that the "big offensive in the Mediterranean theater has begun," with the U. S. fifth and the British eighth armies striking in operations along the entire Italian battlefield.

The British eighth army struck on the eastern end of the front a week ago and the U. S. fifth jumped the fifth today along the central and western sectors.

The fifth's attack was preceded yesterday by Leap bombers of the U. S. 15th airforce which blasted German targets south of Bologna. At places the carpet of bombs fell within five and a half miles of fifth army lines.

The experience of the eighth army in its week-old offensive indicates the fifth will face bitter and bloody fighting in its efforts to break out from the mountains south of Bologna and into the broad Po valley.
