WASHINGTON, April 19 (AP)—A guy who milks a cow by machinery isn't a farmer, according to leaders of the leasors' union; he's a mechanic who's got to pay dues.

The issue is being raised, being different. It's only a farmer and least one, like the cow, isn't interested.

Dairy farmers now tangle with the leasors' figure if the two spreads all farmers eventually will be punching time clocks. A tractor is a machine too and so's a plow. "These people said that so long as we milked cows by machinery, the men who operated the machinery, chisels and the place had to be unionized," Jeffers testified.

He refused to sign up, the leasors' declared a boycott against those who milked by machinery. Plainfield and way points, and at the end of two weeks there was so much milk piled up and soured at Plainfield that Jeffers put his name on the dotted line. He wasn't happy about it.

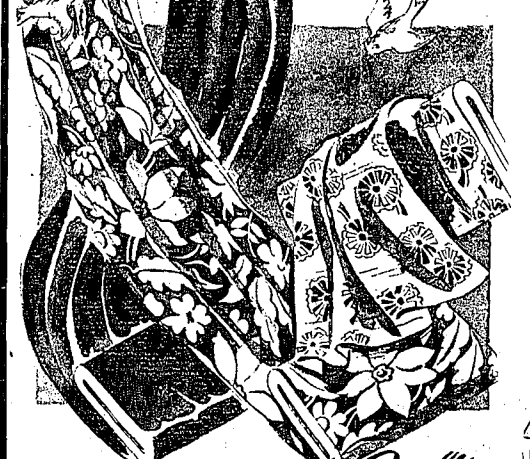

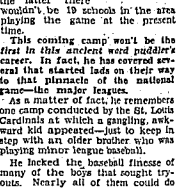

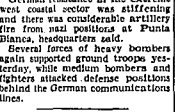
